# REPORT ONT THE PRODUCTION OF LEATHER FOOTwEAR <br> II CANADA, MOVMIBBR, 1931. 

Number of Factories, Statistics of the production of leather footwear in Canada In November, 1931, are based on the retums of 167 factories out of a total of 172 factories in operation during the month. The operating factories were located by provinces as follows: Nova scotia, 2; Thew Brunswick, 4; quebec, 102; Ontario, 58; Manitoba, 1 ; and British Columbia, 5. Jour factories in quebec and one factor in Ontario neglected to furnish returns.

Production.- The production of leather footwear in Canadian factories in November, 1931, amounted to $1,254,696$ pairs, compared with $1,554,144$ pairs in october and $1,124,798$ pairs in l"overaber, 1930. Footwear classified as "boots and shoes with leather or fabric uppers" shows an increase over ITovember, 1930, of 113.534 pairs, or $12 \frac{1}{3}$ per cent; and slippers of all kinds an increase of 58,220 pairs, or 52 per cent. Snoepacks, larrigans and moccasins and footwear with felt uppers how decreases in the quantitien manufactured. The quantity of footwear made in sizes for women during the month of November, 1931, amounted to 513,384 pairs, or 41 per cent of the total output, and that in sizes for mon to 303,011 pairs, or 29 per cent of the total The remainder of the output is divided between footwear in sizes for "boys and youths", "misses and cinildren" and "bailees and infants".

Cumulative Production - The total production of leather footwear for the 11 months ended November 30,1931 , was $16,544,082$ pairs, or an average $c: 1,504,008$ pairs per month, compared with a total of $16,023,190$ pairs and a monthly average of $1,456,654$ pairs in the corresponding period of 1930.

Imports and Exports.- Footwear (not including meier goods) imported into Canada during tile month of November, 1931, amounted to 92,125 pairs, compared with 97.167 pairs In the preceding month and 123,395 pairs in November, 1930. The value of the friports in Irovember, 1931, was $\$ 100,623$, of which goods from the United States represented 50 per cont and from the United Kingdom, $38 \frac{1}{2}$ per cent. The quantity of Canadian made leather footwear exported in November, 1931, was 2,403 pairs, compared with 1,287 pairs in the preceding month and 2,677 pairs in November, 1930.
