REPORT ON THE PRODUCTION OF LEATHER FOOTNEAR

IN CANADA, DECEMBER, 1931.

<u>Number of Factories</u>.- The statistics of leather footwear production for the month of December, 1931, are based on the returns of 160 factories out of a total of 164 factories in operation during the month. The operating factories were located by provinces as follows: Nova Scotia, 2; New Brunswick, 4; Juebec, 95; Ontario, 57; Manitoba, 1; and British Columbia, 5. Three factories in Juebec and one factory in Ontario failed to make return. There were also 6 factories (5 in Juebec and 1 in Ontario) whose replies to the questionnaire for December stated that there was no production in that month, the plants being closed temporarily.

Production.- The total quantity of leather footwear manufactured in December, 1931, amounted to 1,133,534 pairs, compared with 1,254,696 pairs in the preceding month and 1,064,192 pairs in December, 1930. The greater part of the production comes under the classification of "boots and shoes with leather or fabric uppers", which in December, 1931, showed a total of 919,847 pairs, an increase over December, 1930, of 42,806 pairs.

<u>Cumulative Production</u>.- The output of footwear during the calendar year 1931, according to the total of the monthly returns, amounted to 17,677,616 pairs, compared with a total of 17,087,382 pairs for the corresponding 12 month period of 1930. The annual report of the leather boot and shoe industry of Canada for the year 1930, issued in December last, showed a product of 17,646;338 pairs, or 558,956 pairs more than that shown in the total based on the monthly returns. The difference is accounted for in part by the fact that returns are lacking each month for five or six factorios, while the annual report of the industry includes a return for every factory in operation during the year, and in part by the fact that although the schedule of the annual census of industry requests that the return be furnished for the calendar year, where this would entail a great deal of extra work the operator is permitted to give figures covering his business year. Table 6 of the present report gives statistics of production for the year 1930 according to the annual report, while table 4 gives comulative production for the same year, according to the total of the monthly reports.

Imports and Exports. - The value of footwear (except rubber) imported into Canada during the month of December, 1931, was \$67,771, compared with \$100,623 in November and \$122,396 in December, 1930. The imports for the calendar year 1931 had a total value of \$1,809,051, compared with \$3,226,120 in 1930. The exports of Canadian made leather footwear in December, 1931, were valued at \$4,542, compared with \$7,907 in the preceding month and \$7,873 in December, 1930. Exports for the year 1931 had a total value of \$57,394, compared with \$245,664 in 1930.

<u>General Tables.-</u> The following tables give statistics of the production of footwear, for the month of December, 1930 and 1931, and the calendar years 1930 and 1931.






