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Taken as a whole, the leather products group of industries, which includes those shown in Table I, registered an increase of 1.4 p.c. in the gross value of shipments in 1953 as compared with 1952. The net value of shipments, or value added by manufacture, however, rose by 2.4 p.c., as the cost of materials rose by only 0.6 p.c. The volume of employment increased by 3.1 p.c. but salaries and wages were higher by 7.3 p.c. The cost of materials accounted for 50 p.c. of the gross value of shipments as against 54 p.c. in 1952 and salaries and wages accounted for 32 p.c. of the gross value in both years.

The group falls naturally into two sections, a "primary" one consisting of the tanning of leather and a "secondary" one, comprising those industries that produce consumer goods from tanned leather. This section includes the leather belting, leather boot and shoe findings, leather footwear, leather gloves and miscellaneous leather products industries.

The tanning industry recorded an increase of 2.9 p.c. in the gross value of shipments but increases of 8.5 p.c. in the cost of materials and

of 3.7 p.c. in those of fuel and electricity resulted in a decrease in the net value of shipments amounting to 5.8 p.c. The volume of hides processed, however, increased by about 9 p.c.

In the "secondary" section, the gross value of shipments was 1.1 p.c. above that in 1952, but decreases of 1.9 p.c. in the cost of materials and of 3.7 p.c. in those of fuel and electricity, together with higher prices for finished products, resulted in an increase of 4.1 p.c. in the net value of shipments. Employment increased by 3.0 p.c. and salaries and wages by 6.9 p.c.

The volume of production in the footwear industry was higher by 4 p.c. but lower by 14 p.c. and 12 p.c. in the leather belting and leather glove industries. In the miscellaneous leather products industry, where the variety of products makes comparison of the volume of production difficult, there were increases in shipments of hand luggage, hand bags of materials other than leather and of leather body belts. There were decreases in shipments of shopping bags, leather hand bags and leather washers and gaskets.
