## INLRODJCTION

The expansion which marked the leather glove and mitt industry in Canada during the years 1924 to 1927 was continued in 1928. Production in this last year had a total value of over 5 million dollars, an increase over 1927 of nearly half a million dollars and an increase over 1924 of over 2 million dollars. The volume of output has increased proportionately, the quantity of leather gloves, mittens and gauntlets manufactured during 1928 amounting to over half a million dozen palrs, an increase over 1927 of 60 thousand dozen pairs and an increase over 1924 of 200 thousand dozen pairs.

ESTABLISFRNMS. - The factories engaged in the manufacture of leather gloves, mittens and gauntlets in 1928 totalled 49, located by provinces as follows: Quebec, 17; Ontario, 28; Manitoba, 3; and British Columbia, 1. Compared with the preceding year quebec shows an increase of 3 factories and Ontario an increase of 2 , while British Columbia had 2 factories less than in 1927. Although Quebec has fewer establishments than Ontario, the value of output is nearly double that of Ontario's product, due chiefly to the much larger production of dress gloves in quebec; Ontario's production of working gloves is only slightly less than that of quebec.

PRODUCMION:- The total ouantity of leather gloves, mittens and gauntlets made in Canadian factories in 1928 was 528,707 dozen pairs, comprising 123,637 dozen pairs classed as "dress" gloves, etc., and 405,070 dozen pairs classed as "working" gloves. The total value of the former amounted to $\$ 1,941,985$ and of the latter to $\$ 3,219,584$. The average selling price at the factory for dress gloves in 1928 was $\$ 15.71$ per dozen pairs, and for working gloves, $\$ 7.95$ per dozen pairs. Dress gloves are shown as lined ard unlined and as made in sizes for "men" and for "women and children", while working gloves are shown accoraing to the classifications of "men's" and "hoys' " in lined and unlined. In the section of dress gloves, the product made in sizes for men accounts for 80 per cent of the total quantity of output.

The principal kind of leather entering into the manufacture of dress gloves is sheepskin, the gloves made from this leather accounting for 66 per cent of the totai output of dress gloves. In the manufacture of working gloves the item of "horsehide and pigskin" comprises the chief kind, gloves of these two leathers making up 45 per cent of the total output.

The quantity and value of product for the years 1921 to 1928 are given in Table 1 , and itemized production for the years 1926 to 1928 in Table 2, which follow.

7 CAPIIAI.- The capital investment of the industry in 1928 had a total value of $\$ 3,845,708$, apportioned as follows: land, buildings and machinery, $\$ 890,251$; materials and products on hand, stocks in process, etc., $\$ 1,871,212$; and cash and operating accounts, $\$ 1,084,245$. The total amount shows an increase over 1927 of $\$ 614,307$.

GMPLOYEES AND SALARIES AND WAGES.- The industry gave employment in 1928 to 1,721 persons, of which 217 are classified as salaried employees and 1,504 as wagem camers. The number of female employees makes up 58 per cent of the total number of wage-earners and 30 per cent of the number of salarled employees, or 55 per cent of the total number of all employees. The total amount paid in salaries and wages during the year was $\$ 1,459,658$, distributed as f0110ws: to wage-earners, $\$ 1,110,036$, and to salaried employees, $\$ 349,632$. The number of employees shows an increase over the prem ceding year of 143 , and the amount paid in salaries and wages an increase of $\$ 137,434$. The monthly record of wagemeamers shows employment to have been at its lowest in jaruary, when 1,200 persons tere on the paymroll. The number rose each month until the highest record was reached in November with a total of 1,751 wagevearners.

TIME IN OPRRATION AND HOURS OF WORS.- The total number of days worked by all factories during the year was 13.829 , or an average of 282.2 days per factory, compared With a total of 13,093 days and an average per factory of 284.6 days in 1927. The average number of hours worked by wagemearners in the industry as a whole was 8.6 and the average number of hours per week, 47.7. Quebec averages are the highest, with 8.9 hours per day and 49.3 hours per week, while lanitoba and British Columbia averages are the lowest with 8.6 hours per day and 45.5 hours per week.

MATERIALS USED. - The principal kinds of leather used, in order of quantity, were sheepskin, $4,778,398$ sq. ft.; horsehide, $3,394,074$ sq. ft.; muleskin, 2,078,602 sq. ft.; and cowhide, $1,708,517 \mathrm{sq}$. ft. All of these 1 tems show increases over the preceding year. Other kinds of leather used were pigskin, deerskin, kid and lambskins, moosehide and elkhide. There was also a quantity of leather used ( $1,392,449 \mathrm{sq}$. ft.) classified as "splits", for which the kind of leather is not given. The total value of all materlals used was $\$ 3,150,901$, compared with $\$ 2,576,604$ in 1927 .

## INPORTS AND RXPORTS

Both the imports and exports of leather gloves and mitts show incrgases over the preceding year, although the latter trade is still so small as to be relatively little importance. The values of leather gloves and mitts imported into Canada for consumption durirg the calendar year 1928 was $\$ 975,396$, compared with $\$ 854,009$ in 1927. France fumishes the largest proportion of the imports, the total value of gloves from that country in 1928 represerting 55 per cent of the total value of imports. Belgium is next with 19 per cent, and the United Kingdom third with 15 per cent. Leather gloves and mitts of Canadian manufacture exported in 1928 had a total value of $\$ 38,561$, compared With $\$ 23,862$ in 1927. The Thited Kingdom is the chief mustomer for Canadian made leather gloves, taking in 1928, 51 per cent of the total export. Newfoundland was second with 18 per cent and New Zealand tinird with 9 per cent.
