STATISTICS OF THE HARNESS AND SADDLERY INDUSTRY, CANADA, 1926.

ERRATUM

Since issuing the report on the Harness and Saddlery Industry of Canada, 1926, it has been found that the returns of certain establishments in the western provinces included under the head of single harness the quantities of both single and double harness. A division of these items has now been made by the firms concerned and the following changes are therefore made necessary in the report.

Page 1: In table of production for the year 1926, for the item of single harness, read 13,157 sets, value \$298,079, in place of 24,838 sets, value \$649,001. For double harness read 31,414 sets, value \$1,477,395 in place of 22,641 sets, value \$1,126,473.

Page 6, table 11: In column of Prairie Provinces and British Columbia, for single harness read 802 sets, value \$20,140 in place of 12,483 sets value \$371,062, and for double harness in the same column read 12,810 sets, value \$521,041 in place of 4,037 sets, value \$170,119. HARNESS AND SADDLERY, LEATHER BELTING, TRUNKS AND VALISES, AND LEATHER GOODS, N.E.S.

The present volume contains reports on the industries of Harness and Saddlery; Leather Belting; Trunks and Valises; and Leather Goods, n.e.s., for the year 1926. The general tables give statistics by provinces for 1926, while a summary of the principal data, with comparative statistics for the preceding year, is given in the introduction to each report. The combined product of the four industries is shown, by items, in the table on page 17.

HARNESS AND SADDLERY


The value of production of the harness and saddlery industry in 1926 was \$5,315,629, an increase of \$704,527, or 15 per cent, over the preceding year, and an increase of \$962,191 or 22 per cent, over the year 1924. The output of harness, saddles, saddle parts, halters, whips, whip lashes, horse blankets, and sweat pads in 1926, had a total value of \$4,103,147, an increase over the preceding year of \$547,478, or 15 per cent. All of these items show increases in quantity, excepting horse collars (separate from the harness) and whips. The two items of luggage, viz., trunks and valises, suitcases and club bags, had a total value of \$475,808, compared with \$254,366 in 1925. Handbags and satchels, and purses, pocketbooks and folders, had a total value of \$231,162, a decrease of \$131,683 from the preceding year. The following table gives quantity and value of the different items of production of the harness and saddlery industry for the years 1925 and 1926.

THE HARNESS AND SADDLERY INDUSTRY, CANADA

ESTABLISHMENTS.— The number of harness and saddlery establishments in Canada decreased from 278 in 1924 to 267 in 1925 and to 246 in 1926, a decrease of 32 in the two-year period. Nearly all of the establishments which discontinued operations were of small capacity. The following table shows the number of establishments in operation in each of the several provinces in 1926 and the two preceding years.

CAPITAL.— The capital investment of the industry was valued at \$5,989,288, divided as follows: land, buildings and machinery, \$2,298,683; materials on hand, stocks in process, etc., \$2,172,343; and cash and operating accounts, \$1,518,262. The total capital shows a decrease of \$179,074 from the preceding year.

EMPLOYEES AND SALARIES AND WAGES.— The total number of persons employed in the industry was 1,211, an increase of 24 over the year 1925; and the amount paid in salaries and wages, \$1,299,311, an increase of \$104,965. An increase over 1925 is shown in the number of wage-earners and a decrease in the number of salaried employees. The month of highest employment for wage-earners was November with 1,039 persons employed, and the month of lowest employment, July, with 892 employees.

TIME IN OPERATION AND HOURS OF WORK.— The total number of days in operation in 1926 by all establishments was 73,490, an average of 298.7 days per establishment, compared with a total of 79,397 days and an average of 297.3 days in 1925. The average working day consisted of 8.9 hours in 1926 and 9.0 hours in 1925. The classification of wage-earners according to number of hours worked per day in month of highest employment in 1926 shows 257 employees working 8 hours per day or less; 618 working 9 hours; and 240 working 10 hours. In 1925 the numbers were 193 working 8 hours per day or less; 654 working 9 hours; and 207 working 10 hours.

CLASSIFICATION OF ESTABLISHMENTS ACCORDING TO VALUE OF PRODUCTION AND NUMBER OF EMPLOYEES.— The first of these classifications shows a decrease in the number of the smaller plants. In 1925 the number of establishments having a production valued at less than \$5,000 was 203, while in 1926 the number was 175. The number of establishments with a product valued at \$30,000 and over in 1926 was 23, compared with 22 in 1925. The establishments with less than 5 employees in 1926 numbered 97, compared with 102 in 1925, while the establishments with 5 employees and over numbered 31 in 1926 and 32 in 1925. There were 118 establishments with no employees in 1926, compared with 133 in the preceding year, the work in these establishments being performed by the operators themselves.

MATERIALS USED.— The total value of all materials used in manufacture during the year was \$3,135,518, harness leathers accounting for \$1,515,331, or 48 per cent, of the total. The value of all materials used in the preceding year was \$2,653,839, the value of the harness leathers amounting to \$1,279,635, or the same percentage of the total value as in 1926. The other items of leather were fine leathers, pigskin, sheepskin, splits, unspecified, and miscellaneous kinds of leather.



THE LEATHER BELTING INDUSTRY, CANADA

ESTABLISHMENTS.—The establishments engaged in the manufacture of leather belting in 1926 numbered 10, of which 5 were located in Quebec and 5 in Ontario. Ontario has one more plant in 1926 than in the preceding year, while for Quebec no change was recorded.

PRODUCTION.-- The total value of output of the plants in 1926 was \$1,257,018, an increase of \$61,030 over the preceding year, but a decrease of \$98,569 from the year 1924. The quantity of leather belting made in 1926 was 633,549 lb., valued at \$1,145,948, an increase in quantity over the preceding year of 67,012 lbs. and an increase in value of \$20,857. Compared with the year 1924, leather belting shows a decrease in quantity of 832 lb., but an increase in value of \$49,086. A second item of production in leather belting establishments is Goodyear welting, the output of which in 1926 amounted to 53,689 lb., valued at \$59,058, compared with 43,060 lb., valued at \$45,210 in 1925.

MATERIALS USED.— The belting leather used in the manufacture of products in 1926 totalled 976,781 lb., valued at \$753,032, while other materials had a total value of \$35,594. The total value of all materials used was \$788,626, compared with \$694,826 in 1925 and \$983,659 in 1924.

The Trunk and Bag Industry, Canada

TRUNKS AND BAGS, CANADA

ESTABLISHMENTS.— The number of establishments in operation in Canada in 1926 in which the principal items of production were trunks, suitcases and club bags, and handbags and satchels, was 17, distributed by provinces as follows: Nova Scotia, 1; Quebec, 3; Ontario, 8; Manitoba, 4; and British Columbia, 1. Ontario recorded one more establishment than in the preceding year, while the numbers for the other provinces were the same in both years.

PRODUCTION.— The value of production of these establishments in 1926 was \$2,532,357, an increase over the preceding year of \$394,823, and an increase over the year 1924 of \$493,449. The number of trunks made increased by 16,676 or 19 p.c., the number of valises, suitcases and club bags by 53,349, or 19 p.c., and the number of handbags and satchels by 13,435, or 24 p.c. The following table gives quantity and value of the different items of production for the years 1925 and 1926.

CAPITAL.— The value of the capital investment of the industry was \$2,679,211, comprising \$896,553, the value of land, buildings and machinery; \$869,766, the value of materials and supplies on hand, stocks in process, etc; and \$912,892, the cash and operating accounts. The total capital shows an increase of \$443,330 over the preceding year.

EMPLOYEES AND SALARIES AND WAGES.— The number of persons employed during the year, comprising salaried employees and wage-earners, was 744, compared with 622 in 1925 and 656 in 1924, while the salaries and wages paid amounted to \$787,001 in 1926; \$652,793 in 1925; and \$687,337 in 1924. The month of highest employment for wage-earners was November when 703 persons were employed, and the month of lowest employment, January with 562 wage-earners.

TIME IN OPERATION AND HOURS OF WORK.— The number of days in operation by all employees was 5,074, an average per establishment of 298.5, in comparison with a total of 4,760 and an average of 297.5 in 1925. The average number of hours worked by wage-earners per day was 9.6 in 1926 and 9.3 in 1925.

MATERIALS USED.— The principal item under this heading in 1926 was fine leather, the value of which was \$210,034. Cowhide was next with a value of \$194,451, and sheep-skin third with \$19,050. The total value of all materials used, including the different kinds of leather, imitation leather and miscellaneous materials was \$1,222,150, compared with \$942,315 in 1925 and \$945,644 in 1924.

GENERAL TABLES





LEATHER GOODS, N.E.S.

This report covers establishments making leather goods, but whose principal products do not come within the classification of any one of the specially designated leather goods industries. The products of this industry include handbags and satchels; purses, pocketbooks and folders; belts (wearing apparel); bank books; straps; sporting goods; fancy articles of leather, etc.

ESTABLISHMENTS.- The number of such establishments in operation in 1926 was 38, of which 8 were located in Quebec, 29 in Ontario and 1 in Manitoba. Quebec had 1 more establishment than in the preceding year, while Ontario had 3 less, making a total decrease of 2 for the Dominion.

PRODUCTION.- The chief items of production in 1926 were handbags and satchels with a total value of \$710,026, and purses, pocketbooks and folders with a value of \$461,790. The total value of all products was \$2,221,706, an increase of \$292,518 over the preceding year. The following table gives quantity and value of production for each of the 2 years.

CAPITAL.- The amount of capital invested in this industry was \$1,422,594, divided as follows: land, buildings and machinery, \$402,458; materials on hand, stocks in process, etc., \$542,722; and cash and operating accounts, \$477,414. The total capital shows a decrease of \$41,420 from 1925.


EMPLOYEES AND SALARIES AND WAGES.- The number of salaried employees was 102 and the number of wage-earners, 575, a total of 677 employees, compared with a total of 636 in 1925. The salaries paid amounted to \$178,241 and the wages to \$459,041, a total of \$637,282, compared with a total of \$600,111 in 1925. The classification of wage-earners by months shows the largest number (659) employed during the month of November, while the lowest number (513) was recorded for January.

TIME IN OPERATION AND HOURS OF WORK.- The total number of days worked by all establishments during the year was 11,173, or an average of 294.0 days per establishment, compared with a total of 11,541 days and an average of 288.5 days in 1925. The average working day consisted of 8.5 hours in 1926 and 8.4 hours in 1925.

MATERIALS USED.- The total cost value of materials used in manufacture was \$1,036,668. The chief items were sheepskin with a cost value of \$381,013 and leathers classified as "fine leathers" with a value of \$326,329. These two items account for 68 per cent of the total cost value of all materials used. Other items were harness leathers, \$2,430; leather, unspecified, \$63,298; imitation leather, \$23,546; and miscellaneous materials, \$240,052. The total value of materials used shows an increase of \$114,886 over the year 1925.
