The present volume contains reports for the year 1929 for the following industries: (1) Earness and Sadiery; (2) Leather Belting; (3) Trunis and Bags; and (4) Leather Goods, n.e.s. Dach report gives detailed statistics, by provinces, for tive year 1929, of the industry thich it covers, tith introductory notes in which tire mrincipal data of 1929 are compared with the preceding year. A table at the end of the volume combines tine products of tize four industries and sinoms tine total quantity and value of the principal items of manueacture of these industries. The volume also contrins statistics of imorts and exports of miscellaneous leather goods and a list of the operators of tie establishnents, arranged according to the 'rizd of industry.

## EARISSS AID SADDIERY

A decrease is again recorded in the value of production of this industry, the total value of output of the factorios classified as harness and saddlery esteblishents mounting in 1929 to $\$ 3,383,195$ comored with $\$ 4,894,298$ in 1928 and $\$ 5,117,452$ in 1927. The production of the articles phich give the name to the industry, namely harness (sinele, double, collers and harness parts), and saddles and saddle parts and halters, had a total value in 1929 of $\$ 2,232,790$, compared with $\$ 3,398,107$ in 1928. The amount received for custora rork and reopairs drowed from $\$ 259,964$ in 1928 to $\$ 182,233$ in 1929. Other leinds of goods made in triese estabilshraents, such os trunks, suitcases and club bags, hand baga, etc., al so shom decreased production, compared rith the precering roar. The folloring tables shom (1) quantity and value of products in 2926 and 1929 , and (2) principal statistics of the industry for the years 1921 to 1929.

ESTABLISHLITS. - The number of establishments decreased from 214 in 1928 to 195 in 1929, the decreese of 19 being divided among the group of plants arranged according to nuraber of employees, as follows: plants with fiive employees and over, 27 in 1928 and 26 in 1929; plants with less than five employees, 85 in 1928 and 73 in 1929; and plants with no employees (the worl being performed by the operators themselves) io2 in 1928 and 96 in 1929. The classification of establishments according to value of output in 1929 places 14 ? piants in the group of those having a product valued at less than $\$ 5,000$; 21 in the group of those producing goods to the value of $\$ 5,000$ to under $\$ 10,000$; 16 in the group of those mith a product valued at $\$ 10,000$ to under $\$ 30,000$; and 16 producing goods vitued at $\$ 30,000$ and over. The following table gives the number of establishrients, by urovinces, for the years 1925 to 1929.


CAPITAI. - The amount of capital IVesuec wit this industry in 1929 was $\$ 4,111,709$
compared with $\$ 5,304,020$ in 1928. The total so: 1929 cumprises (1) land, buildings, machinery and tools, $\$ 1,474,959$; (2) materiels, products, fuel and miscellaneous supplies on hand and stocks in process, $\$ 1,784,794$; and (3) cash, trading and operating accounts and bills receivable, $\$ 911,956$. All of these $i t e m s$ show decreases comoared with the preceding vear.

INPLOYNSS AND SALARYES AND WAGYS.- The industry gave employment in 1929 to 800 persons, of winich number 163 are classified as salaried amployees and 637 as pageearners. The salaries oaic Auring the rear amountel to $\$ 234,529$, and the wages to $\$ 599,589$, a totel of $\$ 834, \ldots 18$. Compared with the preceling year the total number of employees shows a decrease of 321 and the saleries and mages a decrease of $\$ 393,003$. The statistics of monthly employment in 1929 show that there was little variation from month to month ia tho number of woce-earners on tive pey-roll. The month of highest employment ras Zebruary with a total of 697 wage-Earners and the month of lowest employment Augusi rith a total of 575. The cverage moriking day in 1929 consisted of 8.8 hours and the average working week 50.8 hours, compared with 8.5 lours daily and 49.0 hours weely in 1928.

TINE IIT OPEATION. The nưber of nays in operation by all plants in 1929 was 57.993. or an average per factory o. 297.4. In 1928 the total number of days in operation mas 63,743, and the avere, ge per factory, 257.9.

## TEE HARNESS ATD SADDLERY, INDUSTRY, CAITADA

MASRIALS USED. - The total value of all materials used in manufacture in this industry during the year 1929 was $\$ 1,949,161$, comprising $\$ 1,345,180$ for leathers of all kinds and $\$ 603,981$ for other materials, including imitation leather, felt, harness hardmare, etc. The item of "harness leathers" covers the principal kinds of leather used, Bith $a$ total in 1929 of $2,050,416$ pounds, vilued at $\$ 909,352$. The leathers included in the item of "fine leathers" had a total value of $\$ 215,884$. Other items of less importence are pigskin and sheepsikin. The total value of all materials used in 1929 shows a decrense from the preceding yenr of $\$ 893.058$.

## THE LTMTER BEITING IRDUSTRY

There mere nine establishments in Canada in 1929 engaed in the manufacture of leather belting, five of these plants being situated in the province of Quebec and four in ontario. The output of tine plants had a total value of $\$ 1,552,987$, compared tith $\$ 1,639,842$ in 1928 and $\$ 1,392,665$ in 1927. The quantity of leather belting made in - 1929 amounted to 560,314 poinds, valued at $\$ 1,326,880$. Other articles of manufacture include Goodyear welting, straps and miscellaneous articles of leather. The folloming table gives comparative statistics of the industry for the years 1927 to 1929.

The number of establishments engaged primarily in the manufacture of trunks and bags in 1929 was 19, distributed by provinces as folloms: Nova Scotia, l; Quebec, 4;

- Ontario, 9 : Manitoba, 4; and British Columbia, 1: The total value of output of these plants in 1929 was $\$ 2,708,193$, to which the oroduction of trunks contributed $\$ 777,235$, or 29 per cent, and the production of suitcases and club bags, $\$ 1,446,070$, or 53 per cent. The value of production in 1929 mas greater than that of any one of the preceding eight years, and exceeded the value of 1928 by $\$ 171,098$, or 7 per cent. The quantity and value of production, by items, for the years 1928 and 1929 are shown in the following table, while the second table gives the principal statistics of the industry for the years 1921 to 1929.

CAPITAL.- The capital investment of the industry in 1929 was valued at $\$ 2,890,171$, comprising land, buildings and fixtures, $\$ 1,467,373$; materials and supplies on hand, stocks in process, etc. $\$ 929,988$; and cash and operating accounts, $\$ 472,810$. The total capital shows an increase over the preceding year of $\$ 423,094$.

MIPLOYEES AND SALARIES AND TAGES.- The number of persons employed in the industry during the year was 813 , of which 100 are classified as salaried employees and 713 wage-earners. The number of salaried employees increased over the preceding year by 7, and the number of mage-earners by 7. The payments on salary and mage account in 1929 amounted to $\$ 804,709$, in comparison with $\$ 774,947$ in 1929. The average working day for wagemearners in this industry consisted of 9.2 hours, compared with 8.9 hours in 1928.

MATERIALS USTD.- The total value of all kinds of leather used in manufacture during the year 1929 amounted to $\$ 364,230$, the principal items being "fine leathers" with a value of $\$ 155,698$, and cow hide valued at $\$ 127,269$. The value of imitation leather used was $\$ 46,469$, and of miscelleneous materials, $\$ 778,795$, maling a total valus for all materials used during the year of $\$ 1,189,494$, compared with $\$ 1,154,950$ in 1928 .

The industry designated as "Leather Goods, N.E.S.", takes account of all establishments manufacturine various kinds of leather goods, but whose principal products are other than those which are specially classified. There were 40 of the se establishments in operation in 1929, the same number as recorded in 1928. The outout of the plants had a total value of $\$ 2,637,076$, an increase over the preceding year of $\$ 82,459$. The main items of production in 1929 were "hand bass", valued at $\$ 1,092,826$; "purses, pocketbocks and folders", at $\$ 298,522$; and "body belts", at $\$ 249,804$. Production by items for the years 1928 and 1929 is given in the following table, while in the second table is recorded the progress of the industry, as shown by the principal statistics, in the period 1921 to 1929.

CAPITAL.- The capital investment of the industry in 1929 was val ued at $\$ 1,507,757$, compared with $\$ 1,493,793$ in 1928. These totals represent the value of land, buildings and machinery; materials on hand, stocks in process, etc.; and cash and overating accounts.

MAPLOYEES AND SALARTES AND HAGES.- The industry gave employment in 1929 to 745 persons, classified as follows: salaried employees, 127; wage-earners, 618. The salaries paid during the year amounted to $\$ 224,946$, and the wages to $\$ 512,475$, a total of $\$ 737,421$. Compared with the preceding year, the number of employees shows a decrease of 47, and the amount paid in salaries and wages a decrease of $\$ 11,500$.

MATRRIALS USED.- The value of the various kinds of leather used in manufacture in the industry in 1929 was $\$ 736,288$, to which the value of leathers included in the $\$ 2 \mathrm{tem}$ of "fine leathers" contributes $\$ 381,593$, or 52 per cent, and the value of sheepskin, \$215, 340 , or 20 per cent. The value of all materials used durine the vear including leather and miscellaneous materials, was $\$ 1,246,771$, compared 7 ith $\$ 1,139,974$ in 1928.
