DOMESTIC TYPE ELECTRIC REFRIGERATORS - MARCH, 1948

Production of domestic type electric refrigerators in Canada totalled 10,374 units in March compared with 10,785 units in February.

Imports of complete electric refrigerators of all types during March numbered 90 units valued at \$14,273 as against 630 units valued at \$97,920 in February.
