
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## SOAPS AND SYNTHETIC DETERGENTS

Factory shipments of soaps and synthetic detergents by principal Canadian producers were valued at \$5,076,551 during February, 1954. Soaps accounted for \$2,417,259 or 48 per cent of this total, while synthetic detergents accounted for \$2,659,292 or 52 per cent. The shipments for February, 1954, included 1,279,345 pounds of bar laundry and household soaps at \$217,416; 756,441 pounds of soap chips and flakes in household packages at \$134,414; 2,958,313 pounds of toilet scaps in bars at \$943,820; and 4,801,489 pounds of scap powders in household packages at 393 / 638. Shipments of synthetic detergents in household packages totalled 9,299,388 pounds at \$2,562,134 during the same period.
