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The Highway, the Motor Vehicle and the Tourist in Canada

The highway, the motor vehicle, and the tourist in Canada are so elosely related that it is thought advisable to discuss them, as in former years, concur-

rently

The statistics contained in this pamphlet relate principally to motor vehicles and revenues derived therefrom. The increased use of the automobile (Canadian and foreign tourist) has demonstrated the popularity of road improvement throughout the provinces generally. The type of road improvement carried out under the Canada Highways Act, and as a matter of fact all Canadian road improvement, was and continues to be influenced by information similar to that contained in this circular. In 1927 federal, provincial, and municipal expenditures on the improvement and maintenance of Canadian roads amounted to \$45,750,000. The number of persons employed in road construction during 1927 reached a total of 34,230, and was higher than in any of the last eight years. In many districts this work is supplementary to the occupations ordinarily followed by the nearby residents, particularly agriculturists, during slack periods on their farms. A total of 6,020 miles of road was constructed during 1927 and 44,416 miles were maintained under provincial patrol or gang maintenance systems.

The method of progressive improvement followed under the Canada Highways Act is being largely adopted by the provincial and municipal authorities with regard to secondary, as well as main trunk, highways. Gravel is often the first type of improvement, followed by surface treatment and, as traffic increases

and economy demands, higher types of surfacing are applied.

SPEED LIMIT

Careful thought is being given by provincial authorities and members of meter leagues and associations, together with safety organizations, as to the speed at which motor cars should be permitted to operate. The Ontario Government last year extended the limit of safety speed to thirty-five miles per hour. A large mileage of roads in Ontario has been built to a width and firmness to withstand a greater speed than the legislation allows.

REGISTRATIONS

The total registrations of passenger and commercial vehicles, of autobuses and taxis, of motor cycles and dealers, allotting one car in stock to each, in 1927, numbered in all provinces in Canada 946,858, representing an increase of 107,933, or 13 per cent over the total registrations for 1926, as compared with 15 per cent in 1926 over 1925. Registrations of passenger vehicles numbered 827,518 in 1927, an increase of 98,613, or 13.5 per cent over 1926 registrations, while the registrations of commercial trucks reached a total of 101,421, an increase of 14,239, or 16 per cent over 1926. In 1927 the registrations of motor cycles showed an increase of 75, or 1 per cent over 1926.

The makes of vehicles that were imported into the Dominion from the United States, Great Britain, France, and Italy, and sold and registered in

Canada, as well as those representing wholly or in part, primary production in the Canadian automotive industry of 1927, are included in the statistical information. Upon such importations, vehicles, motor cycle and motor vehicle parts and tires, the federal Government collected in 1927, through import duties and excise taxes, \$21,649,778.68.

REVENUES FROM REGISTRATION FEES, LICENSES, ETC.

In 1926 the gross revenue from registration of motor vehicles, fines, etc., and gasolene taxes in Canada amounted to \$21,324,086 (using an estimate of \$3,319,919, the figures supplied in 1925 for the province of Quebec). Again using the figures supplied in 1925 by the province of Quebec as an estimate of the probable revenue collected in 1927, the gross revenue collected in the Dominion of Canada on account of motor licenses, registrations, fines, etc., and gasolene taxes is \$22,994,424.

The extent to which gasolene is a factor in trade and commerce throughout the Dominion is indicated by the following schedule of the approximate quantities of gasolene that were consumed by motor vehicles during 1927, as shown

by gross revenues from the gasolene taxes collected in that year:-

All of the provinces, with the exception of Saskatchewan, impose a tax of from 2 to 3 cents per gallon gasolene consumed by motor vehicles. The tax has been raised during 1928 to 5 cents per gallon in the province of Quebec.

TOURIST TRAFFIC

In 1927 returns were received from 145 customs ports at which entries of American cars were recorded, as compared with returns from 129 in the previous year. Owing to a change in the customs regulations permitting tourists to remain sixty days, instead of thirty as formerly, a decrease is recorded in the number of American cars obtaining permits up to six months, the 1927 figures being 3,315, as compared with 4,168 in 1926. For the period not exceeding sixty days an increase is noted of from 550,906 in 1926 for the thirty-day period to 740,398 in 1927, or 34 per cent; while for the twenty-four-hour period an increase

of from 1,521,151 (in 1926) to 2,410,087 (in 1927), or 58 per cent.

The estimate of \$276.288,140 given as the gross estimated outlays of foreign motor tourists in Canada during 1927 is based on the assumption that each vehicle contained four persons and each person made an outlay of \$5 daily for supplies and exportable purchases, estimating that each touring party stayed on Canadian soil full time of permits for the one-day period, half time for the six-months period, and quarter time for the sixty-day period. Similarly calculated, the estimate for the previous year was \$203,197,820. On the same method of reasoning approximately \$70,000,000 would represent the amount spent by Canadian motorists in the United States during 1927, the balance being in favour of Canada.

MAINTENANCE OF ROADS

Well-constructed highways are necessary to meet the insistent demands of traffic, but well-maintained roads are even of more importance in the interest of economy. Consequently, provincial road administrative organs and engineers are devoting a great deal of thought and attention to the care and protection of roads. In 1927 the mileage of roads under maintenance in Canada under the patrol or gang system was 44,416 miles, at a cost of \$16,024,617.

*Statute provides:—The Minister of Roads may prohibit passage over a public road for such period of time as he may think necessary, either for work to be done on such road, or to protect it while thawing out or during a rainy period. During such period, no motor vehicle or vehicles drawn by animals shall pass over the prohibited road. When prohibition is on account of thawing, or during a rainy period, the following may pass—letter carriers, pleasure vehicles, at a speed not exceeding sixteen miles an hour; and vehicles not laden, drawn by animals, provided the total weight of any such vehicles, load included, does not exceed 2,000 pounds.

THE CRIMINAL CODE AND MOTOR VEHICLES

The provisions of the Criminal Code of the Dominion, having particular relation to motor vehicles, are as follows:-

- 285. Every one is guilty of an indictable offence and liable to Injuring two years' imprisonment who, having the charge of any carriage or persons by motor vehicle, automobile, or other vehicle, by wanton or furious driving. driving, or racing or other wilful misconduct, or by wilful neglect, does or causes to be done any bodily harm to any person.
- 2. Whenever, owing to the presence of a motor car on the high-Liability way, an accident has occurred to any person or to any horse or of driver of car for vehicle in charge of any person, any person driving the motor car failure to shall be liable on summary conviction to a fine not exceeding fifty stop after dollars and costs or to imprisonment for a term not exceeding thirty happens, days, if he fails to stop his car and, with intent to escape liability either civil or criminal, drives on without tendering assistance and giving his name and address.

3. Every one who takes or eauses to be taken from a garage, Unlawfully stable, stand, or other building or place, any automobile or motor taking car with intent to operate or drive or use or cause or permit the same motor car. to be operated or driven or used without the consent of the owner shall be liable, on summary conviction, to a fine not exceeding five hundred dollars and costs or an imprisonment for any term not exceeding twelve months or to both fine and imprisonment.

4. Every one who while intoxicated or under the influence of Driving narcotics drives any motor vehicle or automobile or has the care or motor car while control of a motor vehicle or automobile whether it is in motion or intoxicated. not shall be guilty of an offence and liable upon summary conviction for the first offence to a term of imprisonment not exceeding thirty days and not less than seven days, for a second offence to a term of imprisonment not exceeding three months and not less than one month, and for each subsequent offence to a term of imprisonment not exceeding one year and not less than three months. R.S., c. 146, s. 285; 1910, c. 11, s. 1; 1910, c. 13, ss. 1 and 2; 1918, c. 16, s. 3; 1925, c. 38, s. 5.

377. Every one who is found guilty of stealing any automobile Minimum or motor car shall be sentenced to not less than one year's imprison-sentence for stealing ment. The provisions of subsection one of section one thousand and automobile. thirty-five shall not apply or extend to any such person, and sentence in any such case shall not be suspended without the concurrence of the Attorney General or his agent, or of the counsel acting for the Crown in the prosecution of the offender.*

2. The maximum penalty for stealing any automobile or motor car shall be the penalties prescribed by section three hundred and eighty-six of this Act. 1921, c. 25, s. 5; 1922, c. 16, s. 4. Section 386 provides for a MAXIMUM penalty of seven years for first offence, and ten years for a subsequent offence.

According to section 1035 here referred to, a person convicted of an indictable offence punishable with imprisonment for five years or less might, in lieu of any punishment otherwise authorized, be fined. But now there is no option in the case of a motor vehicle.

N.B.—The above calculations as to gross estimated tourist outlays are based on the assumption that each vehicle contained 4 persons and each person made an outlay of \$5.00 daily for supplies and exportable purchases, estimating that each touring party stayed on Canadian soil full time of permits for the one-day period and half time of permits for the 6 months period and quarter time for the 60-day period.

REGULATIONS OF THE DEPARTMENT OF NATIONAL REVENUE IN RESPECT OF TOURISTS' AUTOMOBILES AND TOURISTS' OUTFITS

Tourists' Automobiles

A non-resident of Canada visiting this country for a limited period of time for purposes of health or pleasure only may enter his automobile for touring purposes in Canada by complying with certain regulations, a summary of which is given hereunder:—

Temporary Admission—Twenty-four Hours.—At ports and outports on the frontier only, tourists' automobiles may be entered for touring purposes for a stay not exceeding twenty-four hours within the jurisdiction of the port or outport, and not proceed further upon the owner surrendering his state license card which will be handed to him on the return journey.

Temporary Admission for a Period Not Exceeding Sixty Days.—Automobiles may be entered at any Canadian frontier customs port or outport for touring purposes for a period not exceeding sixty days by filling in a prescribed form (E-50) made out in triplicate, one copy of which is retained by the tourist. The original is compared with the duplicate or triplicate when the tourist makes his exit from Canada.

An extension of thirty days may be granted by Officers of Customs at frontier or interior ports, outports or preventive stations in Canada upon presenta-

tion of the original permit granted on arrival into Canada.

Temporary Admission for a Period Not Exceeding Six Months.—Automobiles may be entered at any Canadian customs port for touring purposes for a period not exceeding six months by completing the same form referred to in the previous section and furnishing a bond on approved form in a sum equivalent to the duty and taxes on the automobile. The automobile of a tourist which is not exported within the time limit prescribed on the tourist's permit is liable to seizure, but should an unforeseen delay occur whereby the time of stay in Canada is prolonged the tourist should communicate direct with the Department of National Revenue, Ottawa.

Tourists' Outfits

General Provisions.—Persons visiting Canada for a limited period of time for health or pleasure may bring with them such articles of tourists' outfits or sportsmen's equipment as they may require while in Canada for their own use and not for gain or hire upon reporting same to the Customs Officer at the

Canadian frontier port of entry.

Guns, rifles (not including revolvers or pistols), fishing tackle, golf clubs, tennis racquets and cameras previously used by a tourist and imported by him for his personal use and actually in his possession at the time of his arrival in Canada, and dogs and other animals imported by tourists solely for hunting purposes or as pets, may be admitted without deposit on being reported at the frontier port of arrival on Form E-29. The articles referred to herein, if brought in by a tourist arriving by automobile, need not be reported on Form E-29, but may be noted on Form E-50 issued in respect of the automobile.

Canoes, outboard motors, tents, camp equipment, phonographs, radios, musical instruments, etc., brought in by a tourist for his personal use and not for gain or hire may be admitted after report on Form E-29, upon the collector being furnished with a cash deposit of a sum equivalent to the duty and taxes payable thereon, the deposit to be subject to refund on the identification and

exportation of the articles under customs supervision.

Additional Articles.—Camera outfits for taking motion pictures of Canadian landscapes and industrial activities may be admitted as tourist outfit provided the operator from abroad makes a declaration to the satisfaction of the customs collector at the port of entry to the effect that the camera outfit is for use in taking pictures of Canadian landscapes or industrial activities, and that the outfit and all the pictures taken thereby will be exported within six months from date of entry.

CANADIAN TOURISTS INTO UNITED STATES

A tourist by automobile from Canada into the United States must first secure a permit from the Customs Officer at the Canadian port (Form C-12) and sign it, in order to return his vehicle without duty. Then, at the Customs port on the United States frontier, he must secure a permit entitling him to tour for one month. Should he desire to remain for six months, he must furnish a bond of an approved guarantee company of the United States, for double the amount of duty; but no deposit is required.
