



HOTELS, 1958



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DEFINITIONS

An establishment is classed as an hotel and included in this survey only if it fits into one of the following categories:

Full Year Hotels, Licensed:

Establishments with six or more rooms providing lodging or lodging and meals for transient guests and licensed to sell beer, wine, or liquor. To be considered a full year hotel, an establishment must be operated for at least ten months in the year.

Full Year Hotels, Non-Licensed:

Establishments having the qualifications mentioned above, but which do not sell alcoholic beverages.

Seasonal Hotels, Licensed:

Establishments with six or more rooms providing lodging or lodging and meals for transient guests, licensed to sell beer, wine or liquor and open less than ten months of the year. Generally, the establishment must have six or more rooms in the main lodge. An exception is made in the case of resort hotels where the sleeping accommodation is provided in the form of cabins or cottages but a central dining room, administration, and entertainment facilities are provided in the main lodge.

Seasonal hotels include such businesses as resort hotels, hunting or fishing lodges, ski lodges or chalets, and dude ranches.

Seasonal Hotels, Non-Licensed:

Establishments having the qualifications listed for seasonal hotels above but which do not sell alcoholic beverages.

INTRODUCTION

This report covers the calendar year 1958 and is the tenth consecutive annual survey of hotels in Canada. Section 1 of the report presents the basic data collected from all hotels under the heading "Principal Statistics". Section 2 shows certain expense items supplied by the medium-size hotels (11 to 99 rooms inclusive) expressed as percentages of total receipts. Section 3 gives a detailed breakdown of expenses of large hotels (100 rooms and over), classified into general and departmental expenses, and expressed in ratio form.

When interpreting figures contained in this report, the reader should note the following points: (1) the report does not include tourist camps, cabins,

motels or other forms of accommodation which do not fall under the definitions appearing on the reverse side of the table of contents describing the type of establishments classified here as hotels; (2) the expense ratios in sections 2 and 3 are not directly comparable to those for years prior to 1956. In the case of section 2, beginning in 1956 all large hotels (100 rooms or more) and all hotels having 10 rooms or less were excluded from this section of the survey.

Throughout this report, figures for British Columbia include the Yukon and Northwest Territories.

SECTION I

Principal Statistics

This section presents statistics on receipts, salaries and wages, number of guest rooms and bed capacity based on the reports of all hotels operating in Canada during 1958. A table on room occupancy is also shown. This latter compilation is not based on complete coverage and, although not considered a principal statistic, it is presented here only because of its close affinity with other figures shown in this section.

During 1958 there were 5,088 hotels operating in Canada with a total of 151,362 rooms and bed capacity for 274,483 persons. Their total receipts amounted to \$480,295,000, exceeding the record set by 5,151 hotels in 1957 by \$10,226,000. Salaries and wages paid during the year increased to \$123,100,000 from \$117,764,000 in 1957. The sale of beer, wine and liquor accounted for 50.7% of total receipts, followed by room rentals (23.2%), meals (18.2%) and other sources (7.9%) (Table 3).

Of the total number of hotels that operated in Canada during 1958, 3,516 (3,522 in 1957) were full-year licensed (licensed to sell alcoholic beverages) hotels with receipts of \$435,514,000 (\$423,036,000 in 1957); 678 (704) were full year non-licensed hotels with receipts of \$20,561,000 (\$21,952,000); 194 (202) were seasonal licensed hotels with receipts of \$12,137,000 (\$12,882,000) and 700 (723) operated as seasonal non-licensed hotels with receipts of \$12,083,000 (\$12,199,000).

The distribution of hotel receipts by room categories is shown in Table 6. Hotels with between 11 and 25 rooms still continued to be the most numer-

ous. These numbered 2,200 in 1958 (2,234 in 1957) and had receipts of \$119,061,000 (\$118,689,000 in 1957). This group was followed by hotels with 26-50 rooms of which there were 1,197 in 1958 reporting receipts of \$113,772,000 compared with 1,207 in 1957 with receipts of \$117,022,000. Hotels with 51 rooms and over showed higher receipts in 1958 ranging from \$80,913,000 for hotels with 51-100 rooms to \$38,397,000 for those with 201-500 rooms; hotels with 26-50 rooms and those with 10 rooms and less reported decreases both in number and receipts.

Percentages of room occupancy for all hotels having 11 or more rooms are presented in Table 8. These percentages are not comparable to those computed for years prior to 1956 because of the inclusion in those years of hotels in the 10 rooms or less category. With a national average of 52% (excluding hotels in the 10 rooms or less category), the occupancy rate was lower in all categories than in 1957 and varied from 37% for hotels with 11-25 rooms to 66% for those with 201 rooms and over. Hotels with 26-50 rooms and 51-100 rooms had an average occupancy rate of 50% and 59% respectively. The national average in 1957 was 54%.

Thoroughout this report room receipts include sample room and public space rentals. Receipts from all other sources include non-operating revenue such as commercial rentals, leased concessions, interest on investments, etc. These and other statistics are given in greater detail in the tables that follow.



SECTION II

Salaries and Wages, Cost of Goods Sold and Certain Occupancy Expenses

Table 10 shows salaries and wages, cost of goods sold, cost of fuel and electricity, and repairs and maintenance expressed as percentages of total receipts for incorporated and unincorporated hotels. These percentages are based on the reports of a panel of hotels with between 11 and 99 rooms inclusive and do not represent total coverage of hotels in this category. Excluded are hotels moving into this category as a result of an increase in the number of guest rooms since the last report and a small number of non-respondents for which only the principal statistics were estimated. (The only item of expense obtained for all hotels is that of salaries and wages shown in section 1 of this report).

The reader is again reminded that the ratios contained in the following table are not comparable to those of years prior to 1956 because of the exclusion, since then, of all hotels in the 10 room or less and 100 or more categories. Except for salaries and wages, ratios for unincorporated hotels were slightly higher than those for incorporated hotels. The cost of goods sold, as a percentage of total receipts, constituted the greatest expense item in both categories (45.9% for incorporated hotels versus 46.1% in 1957 and 51.6% for unincorporated hotels versus 50.8%).

SECTION III

Departmental and General Expense Ratios

This section presents data relating to receipts and operating expenses and is restricted to incorporated hotels with 100 rooms or more which were open for the entire year and able to supply the detailed statistics requested. These hotels were divided into three groups: licensed hotels (licensed to sell alcoholic beverages) operating their own dining room, licensed hotels not operating their own dining room and non-licensed hotels operating their own dining room.

Table II shows these operating expenses as percentages of total receipts and classified into departmental and general expenses. Departmental expenses are shown as a percentage of receipts of the department as well as of total receipts. Information on profit, room occupancy, room rates and rental revenue is also given.
