## 1. HIGHNAY TRAFFIC - FEBRUARY, 1954 e

The volume of highway traffic between Canada and the United States was 2 per cent greater in February than in the corresponding month of last year. Aggregate border crossings numbered 675,800 vehicles compared with 662,200 in February, 1953. The increase in the number of foreign vehicles amounted to between 1 and 2 per cent whereas the increase in Canadian vehicles returning was nearly 3 per cent.

## Foreign Vehicles

Aggregate entries of vehicles with foreign registry amounted to 380,000 compared with 374,500 entries in the same month of 1953. Entries of non-resident traffic consisted of 59,600 vehicles entering on traveller's vehicle permits, 292,100 non-permit or local entries and 28,300 commercial vehicles.

The volume of traffic entering on traveller's vehicle permits shows a gain of nearly 4 per cent over February, 1953 with nearly all provinces sharing in the increase. Volume of this type of traffic for the first two months shows an increase of over 3 per cent.

Total entries of non-permit or local traffic increased by 2 per cent in February and 3 per cent for the first two months. Gains and losses were unevenly distributed throughout the different provinces.

## Canadian Vehicles

Re-entries of vehicles registered in Canada totalled 295, 800 during the month of February, an increase of 3 per cent over the same month of 1953. Total entries comprised 21,800 units remaining abroad over 24 hours, 236,200 vehicles absent for 24 hours or less and 37,800 commercial vehicles.

The volume of long-term Canadian traffic remaining abroad over 24 hours increased by over 5 per cent when compared with the corresponding month of last year. The increase in February, 1953 amounted to 12 per cent over the previous year. The increase in. volume of this type of traffic for the first two months amounted to over 3 per cent.

The volume of short-term traffic remaining 24 hours or less abroad increased by over 2 per cent during the month with all provinces except quebec and British Columbia contributing to the gain. Cumulative data, for the first two months, records a decrease of over 2 per cent in the volume of short-term traffic.

## 11. TRAFFIC BY LONG DISTANCE COMMON CARRIER - JANUARY, 1954

Traffic by rail, through bus, boat and plane was over 2 per cent heavier in January, 1954 than in January, 1953. The number of foreign travellers entering Canada by these means of transportation declined by 2 per cent and the number of Canadian travellers re-entering Canada declined by nearly 3 per cent.

## Foreign Travellers

Gains in the number of non-residents entering Canada from the United States by bus, boat and plane were not sufficient to offset a decline of 10 per cent in the number arriving by rail. Increases of 6 per cent, 17 per cent and 11 per cent were recorded in bus, boat and plane entries respectively.

## Canadian Travellers

The number of Canadian passengers returning by the above means of transportation in January amounted to 86,900 compared with 89,200 in the same month of last year. An increase of over 11 per cent in the number returning by plane was not sufficient to offset declines of 6 per cent, 2 per cent and 20 per cent in the number of returns by rail, bus and boat.

Data in this report consist of visits between Canada and the United States by vacationists, summer residents, commuters, businessmen and all other types of travellers except migrants. They include repeat visits by commuters and others who cross the border more than once during the period covered by the report. They also include people whose only purpose in crossing the border is to take the most direct route between two points in their own country.

The report is divided into two sections, the first showing the number of vehicles classified as highway traffic, and the second the number of passengers proceeding by long-distance common carrier. Due to lack of information it has not been possible to include a residual group consisting principally of pedestrians and passengers on local bus services connecting border conmunities. In the highway traffic data, commercial vehicles or trucks are separated from other vehicles. Highway traffic not classified as commercial vehicles consists almost exclusively of automobiles but includes a comparatively small number of taxis, motorcycles and bicycles.

Foreign highway traffic other than commercial vehicles is divided into two groups: one requiring and the other not requiring traveller's vehicle permits. Drivers must apply for traveller's vehicle permits if they intend to travel beyond the jurisdiction of the port of entry or if they intend to remain in Canada longer than 48 hours irrespective of their destination. More than half the permits issued each year are used for visits of less than 48 hours. Commuters and others who cross the border frequently may also apply for permits. The initial visit of such persons, on which the permit is issued, appears under the heading "Traveller's Vehicle Permits"; subsequent visits are included with the non-permit group.

Publication of this information is made possible by co-operation of Canadian customs and immigration officials at all points of entry on the international boundary.
