

1. HIGHWAY TRAFFIC AT CANADIAN BORDER POINTS

OCTOBER - DECEMBER, 1959

FOREIGN VEHICLES

The change in procedure, introduced on October 1, 1959 by the Department of National Revenue, for admitting non-resident vehicles into Canada has already been described in the "Special Issue 1959" of this publication. This change in procedure has altered the statistical series for foreign vehicles and, therefore, direct comparisons with data in previous issues of this publication are not possible.

Former procedure

Under the former procedure vehicles intending to remain within the jurisdiction of the port of entry and return to the United States via the same port within 48 hours were allowed to enter Canada without applying for a traveller's vehicle permit. This traffic was classified in the statistics of this publication as non-permit class (local traffic) and appeared by port of entry in the first column under that caption. Moreover, motorists who were allowed to enter without a traveller's vehicle permit deposited the state registration card for the vehicle with the Canadian Customs and picked it up on their return to the United States. Under this arrangement they were obliged to travel in Canada without the document showing ownership of the vehicle. Furthermore, this category in column one included taxis and the large volume of repeat trips of commuters, summer residents and locals.

Taxis were issued special commercial permits which were not included in the column showing travellers' vehicle permits issued. On the other hand, when commuters, summer residents and locals applied for a traveller's vehicle permit, the first trip was included among the number of travellers' vehicle permits issued but subsequent trips on these permits were classified as repeats and recorded in the column covering the non-permit entries. Under the procedure, motorists who travelled daily or regularly to work or business in Canada were designated as commuters; many owners of summer residences or cottages in Canada, usually located close to the border, were recorded as summer residents; while persons who entered Canada regularly at the same port for short periods to shop, visit friends or relations, attend meetings, go to a club, etc. were treated as locals. Motorists not recorded in these categories or the non-permit classification were issued a traveller's vehicle permit. This permit allowed them to remain more than 48 hours in Canada and, also, gave them the privilege of returning to the United States at any port irrespective of length of stay.

In past years a misconception has frequently been encountered on the part of some persons making use of the travel statistics. On many occasions the data appearing in the second column under travellers' vehicle permits issued has been assumed to cover only the over 48 hour traffic although more than 50 per cent of these vehicles returned to the United States within 48 hours. Misinterpretation of data in this manner can only lead to exaggeration of the volume of longer term visitors and could seriously distort what otherwise would be valuable conclusions.

New procedure

Under the new procedure all non-resident motorists must be in possession of a traveller's vehicle permit while they remain in Canada and this document is surrendered at the port of exit. Exceptions to the rule are persons who were formerly designated as commuters, summer residents or locals. Persons in these categories are usually familiar to port officers and under the new procedure they may apply for a standing permit which must be shown each time they enter or leave Canada. From now on, in the new format of this publication, standing permits issued will appear in column two. All crossings after the original entry, however, will be recorded as repeat trips and entered in the third column together with the crossings of taxis.

Columns one and two will constitute the number of permits issued each month, as reported by Canadian Customs officers in charge at each port. Verification of the data reported is possible through the maintenance of records of serial numbers on permits used from month to month. Since there has been a substantial increase in the volume of forms, as a result of dropping the non-permit privilege, it is impossible, with the sources available, to maintain the former thorough analysis of all traffic entering Canada on travellers' vehicle permits. Therefore, after considerable investigation, it has been decided that the necessary sacrifice on detail should be applied to the voluminous group that are here for a comparatively short time. Many of these motorists do not remain in Canada longer than a few hours and, at the same time, their expenditures may often be negligible. For this reason they have been segregated from the other traffic and entered in the first column on each page. Entries in this column represent permits showing entry into Canada and exit to the United States on the same date.

Permits showing exit to the United States on the day following the date of entry are being recorded as two days' stay although theoretically it is possible they may have been in Canada for less than twenty-four hours. In making use of statistics on travel this point should be kept in mind, and particularly when examining expenditures on a per person per day basis. The fact remains, that not all motorists recorded in the two-day group have arranged over-night accommodation in Canada. Further refinement on this point is not feasible and may be unnecessary if the data are correctly interpreted.

The new format is based on the principle that, although it is desirable for all crossings to be recorded, provision has been made for segregating the vehicles that remain a comparatively short time in Canada from visits of longer duration. The full usefulness of the new format should be achieved when a comparison with the previous year is possible. In the meantime, all permits showing more than 24 hours' stay in Canada will be processed by mechanical tabulation and analysed in detail as in former years.

CANADIAN VEHICLES

The annual summary for vehicles registered in Canada appeared in the "Special Issue" of this publication, therefore, comments in this issue will be restricted to a few comparisons with the last three months of 1958.

In October there was a decline of approximately 4,900 or nearly 1 per cent in re-entries of Canadian vehicles when compared with the previous year. The total consisted of 124,600 units abroad for more than 24 hours, 543,900 abroad for 24 hours or less and 53,300 commercial vehicles. The volume of long-term traffic declined 1 per cent in October, but the cumulative for the first 10 months was 6 per cent higher than the same period of 1958. The volume of short-term traffic also declined 1 per cent in October, whereas, cumulative data for the period of January to October was 1 per cent higher than the previous year.

During November there was a decline of nearly 4 per cent or approximately 22,200 when compared with 1958. Canadian vehicles returning to Canada comprised 73,700 abroad for more than 24 hours, 455,100 abroad for 24 hours or less and 47,200 commercial vehicles. The volume of long-term traffic declined some 5 per cent in November, while cumulative data for the first eleven months was 5 per cent higher than the previous year. The volume of short-term traffic also declined nearly 5 per cent, while cumulative re-entries were nearly 1 per cent above the same period of 1958.

Re-entries of vehicles registered in Canada advanced nearly 5 per cent in December when compared with the same month of 1958. The total included 71,200 units abroad more than 24 hours, 485,800 abroad for 24 hours or less and 55,100 commercial vehicles. The volume of long-term traffic advanced nearly 12 per cent in December, while re-entries in the short-term category were 4 per cent higher than the same month of 1958. There was an increase of between 3 and 4 per cent in the number of commercial vehicles returning to Canada during the month.
