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APRIL, 1960

I - HIGHWAY TRAFFIC - APRIL, 1960

The volume of traffic crossing the Canadian-United States border increased nearly 9 per cent over April 1959, as a total of 1,352,800 or 109,200 more border crossings were recorded. Aggregate crossings comprised 607,100 entries of foreign vehicles and 745,700 re-entries of vehicles registered in Canada. However, a certain amount of this increased travel is most likely attributable to the fact that in 1960, the Easter holiday season occurred in April.

FOREIGN VEHICLES

Entries of foreign vehicles increased by 37,300 or between 6 and 7 per cent over April 1959. Non-resident traffic consisted of 207,200 units remaining in Canada 24 hours or less, 189,100 recording visits lasting over 24 hours, 171,500 vehicles classified as "repeats and taxis" and 39,300 commercial vehicles. Entries of the latter were down almost 7 per cent in comparison with April 1959.

Cumulative data for the first four months of 1960 show that total entries of foreign vehicles into Canada increased slightly to 1,855,600. Of this number, 656,100 fell into the 24 hours or less classification, 430,000 remained in Canada longer, 594,400 were taxis and repeat trips of motorists holding standing (L) permits, while entries of commercial vehicles (175,100) were nearly 7 per cent more numerous than during the corresponding period in 1959.

CANADIAN VEHICLES

Re-entries of Canadian vehicles in April 1960 registered an increase of approximately 11 per cent over April 1959, as almost 72,000 more crossings were recorded. The aggregate consisted of 589,600 units abroad for 24 hours or less, 111,600 abroad for more than 24 hours and 44,500 commercial vehicles.

The volume of short-term traffic abroad for 24 hours or less increased nearly 9 per cent during April 1960, while cumulative data for the first four months show a gain of almost 4 per cent over the same period in 1959.

While an increase of between 29 and 30 per cent occurred in the number of re-entries recording visits lasting over 24 hours during the month of April 1960, over the four month period January - April, re-entries in this category were between 1 and 2 per cent fewer than in the corresponding months of 1959. On the other hand, returning commercial vehicles, which recorded a decline of approximately 3 per cent over April 1959, registered an advance of slightly over 15 per cent when data for the first four months of 1960 and 1959 are compared.

II - TRAFFIC BY LONG DISTANCE COMMON CARRIER - MARCH, 1960

Aggregate border crossings by rail, through bus, boat and plane were between 12 and 13 per cent lower than in March of 1959, while cumulative data for the first quarter show a much smaller decline of slightly over 2 per cent. Total border crossings numbered 151,100 in comparison with 172,800 in March 1959, a decrease of 21,700 visits. The aggregate comprised 56,700 entries by foreign travellers and 94,400 re-entries of Canadians who had visited the United States.

FOREIGN TRAVELLERS

The number of foreign travellers entering Canada by long distance common carrier during March 1960 declined some 3 per cent over March 1959. Only entries by plane experienced an increase (almost 10 per cent) while arrivals by boat and rail decreased 40 per cent and between 15 and 16 per cent respectively. There was no change in the number arriving by bus. A breakdown of entries by type of transportation shows plane with 25,800, rail with 15,800, bus with 13,300 and boat with only 1,800.

Cumulative data for the first quarter of 1960 reveals a somewhat different pattern. Entries of non-residents during this period were slightly higher than in the first quarter of 1959. Increases of approximately 13 and 4 per cent in the number of arrivals by plane and bus respectively, helped to counteract decreases in entries by boat and rail of about 47 per cent and between 9 and 10 per cent respectively.

CANADIAN TRAVELLERS

Re-entries of Canadians returning from the United States by common carrier decreased 19,900 or over 17 per cent in comparison with March 1959. Total re-entries comprised 42,700 by plane, 26,600 by rail, 24,200 by bus and 900 by boat. All types of common carrier with the exception of plane, experienced substantial reductions. Arrivals by boat fell 79 per cent, those returning by rail declined over 27 per cent and re-entries by bus were down slightly over 23 per cent in comparison with March of 1959. However, the number of Canadians returning to Canada via plane advanced almost 2 per cent.

Much the same pattern appears when cumulative data for the first quarter is considered. Re-entries during this period were down about 4 per cent over the same period in 1959. Plane travel expanded nearly 15 per cent while re-entries by boat fell some 60 per cent, rail declined about 14 per cent and bus travel decreased between 8 and 9 per cent.

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CLASSIFICATIONS USED IN THIS REPORT

"Commercial Vehicles" are trucks used for commercial purposes.

Highway Traffic not classified as commercial vehicles consists of automobiles, taxis, motorcycles and bicycles.

Foreign Vehicles Inward

A traveller's vehicle permit is issued at the port of entry by Customs officers to every foreign vehicle entering Canada. This document authorizes the use of the vehicle during the intended length of stay in Canada and is surrendered when departing at the port of exit.

Residents of border communities who make many trips during the year are entitled to apply for a standing (L) traveller's vehicle permit. The operator of the vehicle covered by the standing (L) traveller's vehicle permit must show the document on each entry into Canada. All visits made after the original visit when the permit was issued are recorded as "Repeats" and entered under the appropriate heading. Persons holding this type of permit are usually familiar to port officials.

Permits showing entry into Canada and exit to the United States on the same day are entered in the first column with length of stay in Canada as 24 hours or less. The remainder of the travellers' vehicle permits (including the first trip of standing (L) permits) are recorded in the second column with length of stay as over 24 hours. Repeat trips of vehicles using standing (L) permits are recorded in the third column captioned "Repeats and Taxis." Taxis operate under a special permit and, therefore, are not included in columns 1 or 2.

Canadian Vehicles Inward

Canadian vehicles returning to Canada are classified by length of stay, depending upon whether they are abroad for more or less than 24 hours.
