

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#### TRAVEL BETWEEN CANADA AND THE UNITED STATES

#### JULY 1960

#### I - HIGHWAY TRAFFIC - JULY 1960

During July 1960, 2,778,700 vehicles entered Canada from the United States by crossing the International Boundary, an increase of 89,500 or over 3 per cent in comparison with July 1959. Of this number, 1,577,300 were classified as foreign vehicles while the remainder, some 1,201,400, constituted re-entries of vehicles registered in Canada.

#### FOREIGN VEHICLES

Crossings of foreign vehicles in July 1960 were almost 3 per cent heavier than during the same month in 1959 and comprised 603,800 visits lasting 24 hours or less, 621,000 remaining in Canada over 24 hours, and 314,600 entries of vehicles classified as "Repeats and Taxis". Also included were 37,900 crossings of commercial vehicles, which incidentally marked a decline of 4,800 or over 11 per cent in comparison with the number recorded during July 1959.

Cumulative data for the first seven months of 1960 show that 5,125,300 foreign vehicles crossed the border into Canada, representing a decrease of less than 1 per cent compared with the same period in 1959. Vehicles recording trips lasting 24 hours or less numbered 1,970,300, while those remaining longer in Canada totalled 1,514,500. "Repeats and Taxis" accounted for 1,349,100 of the crossings during this time and commercial vehicles 291,400, entries of the latter advancing nearly 1 per cent over the comparable 1959 figure.

#### CANADIAN VEHICLES

Some 48,100 more vehicles of Canadian registration re-entered Canada during July 1960 than July 1959, marking an increase of over 4 per cent. Vehicles abroad for 24 hours or less numbered 880,900, those recording visits lasting over 24 hours amounted to 268,400 and crossings of Canadian-registered commercial vehicles equalled 52,100.

Crossings by short-term Canadian vehicles (24 hours or less) were nearly 3 per cent more numerous in both July and over the first seven months of 1960 in comparison with corresponding periods of 1959.

A similar comparison reveals that the volume of long-term traffic remaining outside Canada for over 24 hours advanced between 10 and 11 per cent in July and between 3 and 4 per cent from January to July, 1960. On the other hand, re-entries of commercial vehicles, although down over 1 per cent in July, remained 10 per cent higher over the seven month period.

#### II - TRAFFIC BY LONG DISTANCE COMMON CARRIER - JUNE 1960

Total border crossings by rail, through bus, boat and plane were only slightly lower in June 1960 than in June of the year previous. This was also the case with regard to cumulative entries for the first six months. Aggregate crossings for the month reached 315,600 and comprised 195,100 entries by residents of the United States as well as 120,500 crossings by Canadians returning to Canada.

#### FOREIGN TRAVELLERS

The number of foreign travellers entering Canada in June 1960 showed a small increase over June of last year. Although the volume of entries by each type of long distance common carrier in June 1960 displayed a change over June 1959, their order of importance remained unaltered. Entries by boat numbered 60,600, only 1,100 or about 2 per cent greater than in June of the previous year, while arrivals by plane advanced 3,000 or about 6 per cent. Bus entries gained 1,800 or some 4 per cent, while the only decrease experienced occured in arrivals by rail which fell from 38,900 in June 1959 to 33,900 in June 1960, a drop of nearly 13 per cent.

Cumulative entries by long distance common carrier for the first six months of 1960 totalled 555,900, a slight decline of 3,500 over comparable data for 1959. Entries by plane which numbered 192,400, showed a gain of 9,400 or over 5 per cent while arrivals by bus advanced 6,400 or between 4 and 5 per cent. On the other hand, during the first half of 1960, decreases were recorded in the number arriving by rail and boat. The former category experienced a decline of 13,300 (between 9 and 10 per cent) while the latter fell some 6,000 or nearly 7 per cent in comparison with cumulative entries for the first half of 1959.

#### CANADIAN TRAVELLERS

About 2 per cent fewer Canadian travellers re-entered Canada by common carrier in June 1960 than in June 1959. There were 52,400 re-entries by bus, 34,100 by plane, 21,800 by rail and 12,200 by boat. Crossings recorded by bus and plane travellers increased over 3 per cent and over 4 per cent, respectively, while at the same time, Canadians returning by rail and boat were nearly 15 per cent and 11 per cent, respectively below similar data for June 1959.

Re-entries of Canadian travellers from January to June 1960 totalled 630,600, a slight gain in comparison with cumulative data for the first half of 1959. Of this total, some 239,800 were plane re-entries, which advanced between 10 and 11 per cent over the comparable 1959 figure. A similar comparison reveals that between 2 and 3 per cent more Canadians returned by bus during the first six months, while re-entries by rail and boat during the same period were down about 9 per cent and 30 per cent, respectively.

#### CLASSIFICATIONS USED IN THIS REPORT

"Commercial Vehicles" are trucks used for commercial purposes.

Highway Traffic not classified as commercial vehicles consists of automobiles, taxis, motorcycles and bicycles.

#### Foreign Vehicles Inward

A traveller's vehicle permit is issued at the port of entry by Customs officers to every foreign vehicle entering Canada. This document authorizes the use of the vehicle during the intended length of stay in Canada and is surrendered when departing at the port of exit.

Residents of border communities who make many trips during the year are entitled to apply for a standing (L) traveller's vehicle permit. The operator of the vehicle covered by the standing (L) traveller's vehicle permit must show the document on each entry into Canada. All visits made after the original visit when the permit was issued are recorded as "Repeats" and entered under the appropriate heading. Persons holding this type of permit are usually familiar to port officials.

Permits showing entry into Canada and exit to the United States on the same day are entered in the first column with length of stay in Canada as 24 hours or less. The remainder of the travellers' vehicle permits (including the first trip of standing (L) permits) are recorded in the second column with length of stay as over 24 hours. Repeat trips of vehicles using standing (L) permits are recorded in the third column captioned "Repeats and Taxis." Taxis operate under a special permit and, therefore, are not included in columns 1 or 2.

#### Canadian Vehicles Inward

Canadian vehicles returning to Canada are classified by length of stay, depending upon whether they are abroad for more or less than 24 hours.

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
