

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## TRAVEL BETWEEN CANADA AND THE UNITED STATES

### OCTOBER 1961

### 1 - HIGHWAY TRAFFIC - OCTOBER 1961

The volume of highway traffic entering Canada from the United States in October 1961 declined by 9,900 units or about one-half per cent compared with the October 1960 volume. Aggregate crossings for the month comprised 709,400 foreign vehicles and 807,800 Canadian vehicles. Total cumulative crossings for the first ten months in 1961 surpassed the comparable 1960 figure by 346,800 units or approximately 2 per cent and consisted of 8,574,700 foreign vehicles and 8,092,600 Canadian.

### FOREIGN VEHICLES

Foreign vehicles entering Canada during October 1961 registered a decrease of 4,000 units or around one-half per cent in comparison with the previous October. Those remaining 24 hours or less numbered 270,200, a slight drop of 1,100 or one-half per cent while vehicles in Canada over 24 hours amounted to 191,000, an increase of 5,500 or 3 per cent. Entries of foreign vehicles classified as "Repeats and Taxis" came to 207,500 in October 1961, marking a decrease of 9,200 units or just over 4 per cent. Foreign commercial traffic in October 1961 amounted to 40,700 vehicles or a moderate gain of approximately 2 per cent.

Cumulative crossings of foreign vehicles for the first ten months of 1961 recorded an increase of 268,700 units or slightly more than 3 per cent in comparison with the same period of 1960. Non-resident vehicles remaining 24 hours or less amounted to 3,314,700, a gain of 156,900 or 5 per cent and foreign vehicles remaining over 24 hours numbered 2,769,600, an advance of 178,500 or nearly 7 per cent. Entries of "Repeats and Taxis" from January to October numbered 2,085,700, a decrease of 62,700 units or about 3 per cent and foreign commercial traffic was down 1 per cent below comparable 1960 cumulative data.

### CANADIAN VEHICLES

Re-entries of Canadian vehicles in October 1961 experienced a decline of 5,900 units or not quite 1 per cent in comparison with the October 1960 volume. Resident vehicles abroad 24 hours or less numbered 617,300, a drop of 2,200 or approximately one-half per cent while those absent over 24 hours came to 135,600, some 4,500 units or slightly over 3 per cent less. However, commercial vehicles returning to Canada amounted to 54,900, representing a gain of between 1 and 2 per cent over the previous October.

Cumulative data for the period January - October 1961 show an increase of 78,100 or 1 per cent in the number of Canadian vehicles returning, compared with the same period in 1960. Canadian vehicles absent 24 hours or less amounted to 6,238,200, an increase of 102,600 units or almost 2 per cent. On the other hand, vehicles returning from trips lasting over 24 hours reached 1,312,700, a decrease of 16,500 or about 1 per cent. Similarly, cumulative re-entries of Canadian commercial vehicles were between 1 and 2 per cent lower than in the first ten months of 1960.

### 11 - TRAFFIC BY RAIL, THROUGH BUS, BOAT AND PLANE - OCTOBER 1961

Total entries by rail, through bus, boat and plane during October 1961 amounted to 200,200, a slight decrease of 1,600 units or approximately 1 per cent below the October 1960 volume. Foreign travellers accounted for 99,800 of the total and Canadians numbered 100,400. Aggregate entries for the first ten months of 1961 reached 2,581,000, down some 50,600 units or about 2 per cent below the comparable 1960 figure. Foreign residents represented 1,474,100 of the cumulative crossings while Canadians returning amounted to 1,106,900.

### FOREIGN TRAVELLERS

Foreign travellers entering Canada in October 1961 by rail, through bus, boat and plane increased by 2,600 units or close to 3 per cent compared with the previous October. Arrivals by plane came to 40,800, a gain of 4,300 or between 11 and 12 per cent, while boat entries, which amounted to 15,400, were up by 400 units or slightly over 2 per cent. However, non-residents entering by rail numbered 17,300, marking a decline of 500 or 3 per cent and the 26,300 visitors by bus represented a drop of 1,600 or just over 5 per cent below the previous October.

Cumulative entries of foreign travellers by rail, through bus, boat and plane in the first ten months of 1961 increased by 33,900 units or between 2 and 3 per cent over the comparable 1960 volume. The ten-month total comprised 211,400 entries by rail, 376,700 by bus, 462,200 via boat and 423,800 by plane. In comparison with similar cumulative data for 1960, visitors arriving by rail declined between 13 and 14 per cent, while entries by bus were about one-half per cent lower. On the other hand, travellers coming to Canada via boat and plane recorded gains of approximately 6 per cent and 11 per cent, respectively.

### CANADIAN TRAVELLERS

The number of Canadians returning by rail, through bus, boat and plane in October 1961 experienced a decrease of 4,200 units or 4 per cent when compared with October 1960. Re-entries by rail amounted to 22,000, a decline of 4,000 or between 15 and 16 per cent. Similarly, re-entries by bus, which came to 32,000, registered a drop of 3,200 or about 9 per cent below the October 1960 figure. Canadians returning by boat numbered 4,900, an increase of 700 or slightly over 17 per cent, while return trips by plane amounted to 41,500, a gain of 2,300 or almost 6 per cent.

Cumulative re-entries of Canadian travellers from the United States by rail, through bus, boat and plane during the first ten months of 1961 declined by 84,500 units, about 7 per cent below the comparable 1960 volume. Aggregate reentries comprised 230,400 by rail, 383,700 by bus, 105,300 by boat and 387,500 via plane, in each case a decrease from corresponding 1960 totals. Rail traffic recorded a drop of 58,800 units or just over 20 per cent, bus travellers declined by 10,600 units or close to 3 per cent, there were 13,500 or between 11 and 12 per cent fewer re-entries by boat and 1,600 or about one-half per cent less by plane.

### CLASSIFICATIONS USED IN THIS REPORT

"Commercial Vehicles" are trucks used for commercial purposes.

Highway Traffic not classified as commercial vehicles consists of automobiles, taxis, motorcycles and bicycles.

### Foreign Vehicles Inward

A traveller's vehicle permit is issued at the port of entry by Customs officers to every foreign vehicle entering Canada. This document authorizes the use of the vehicle during the intended length of stay in Canada and is surrendered when departing at the port of exit.

Residents of border communities who make many trips during the year are entitled to apply for a standing (L) traveller's vehicle permit. The operator of the vehicle covered by the standing (L) traveller's vehicle permit must show the document on each entry into Canada. All visits made after the original visit when the permit was issued are recorded as "Repeats" and entered under the appropriate heading. Persons holding this type of permit are usually familiar to port officials.

Permits showing entry into Canada and exit to the United States on the same day are entered in the first column with length of stay in Canada as 24 hours or less. The remainder of the travellers' vehicle permits (including the first trip of standing (L) permits) are recorded in the second column with length of stay as over 24 hours. Repeat trips of vehicles using standing (L) permits are recorded in the third column captioned "Repeats and Taxis". Taxis operate under a special permit and, therefore, are not included in columns 1 or 2.

#### Canadian Vehicles Inward

Canadian vehicles returning to Canada are classified by length of stay, depending upon whether they are abroad for more or less than 24 hours.
