# TRAVEL BETWEEN CANADA <br> AND THE UNITED STATES 

NOVEMBER 1961

## 1 - HIGHWAY TRAFFIC - NOVEMBER 1961

Highway traffic entering Canada from the United States during November 1961 showed only a slight gain of 500 units or less than one-half per cent in comparison with November 1960. Foreign vehicles accounted for 559,100 of the total crossings while returning Canadian vehicles numbered 645,000. Cumulative entries for the first eleven months in 1961 were up by 347,400 units or 2 per cent over comparable 1960 data. Aggregate cumulative crossings comprised 9,133,900 foreign vehicles and 8,737,600 Canadian.

## FOREIGN VEHICLES

Entries of foreign vehicles in November 1961 recorded an increase of 3,900 units or about 1 per cent more than in the previous November. Non-resident vehicles remaining in Canada 24 hours or less numbered 222,500, an increase of 7,800 or between 3 and 4 per cent. Similarly, vehicles staying in Canada over 24 hours, which amounted to 130,800 , advanced by 9,200 units or between 7 and 8 per cent. However, entries classified as "Repeats and Taxis", which numbered 166,600, registered a decrease of 11,600 units or between 6 and 7 per cent. Foreign commercial vehicle entries in November 1961 came to 39,200 , or approximately 4 per cent less than during the same month of 1960.

Cumulative crossings of foreign vehicles for the first eleven months of 1961 gained 272,700 units or about 3 per cent over the comparable 1960 volume. Vehicles remaining in Canada 24 hours or less numbered 3,537,300, an increase of 164,700 units or nearly 5 per cent and vehicles remaining over 24 hours came to $2,900,400$, a gain of 187,700 units or almost 7 per cent. Cumulative entries of "Repeats and Taxis", which amounted to 2,252,300, were down some 74,200 units or around 3 per cent and foreign commercial traffic registered a drop of approximately 1 per cent in comparison with similar 1960 data.

## CANADIAN VEHICLES

Slightly fewer Canadian vehicles returned from the United States in November 1961 than in the same month of 1960, the decrease amounting to 3,400 units or one-half per cent. Vehicles absent 24 hours or less numbered 511,600, a decline of 1,800 or less than one-half per cent and re-entries abroad over 24 hours amounted to 81,700 , representing a decrease of 2,600 or roughly 3 per cent. Return trips of Canadian commercial vehicles numbered 51,700 or a gain of 2 per cent in comparison with November 1960.

Re-entries of Canadian vehicles during the first eleven months of 1961 recorded an increase of 74,700 units or approximately 1 per cent compared with the same period of 1960. Resident vehicles absent 24 hours or less numbered $6,749,800$, an advance of 100,800 or between 1 and 2 per cent, while return trips of vehicles absent over 24 hours amounted to $1,394,400$, a decline of 19,100 or between 1 and 2 per cent. Cumulative re-entries of commercial vehicles from January to November 1961 were down slightly over 1 per cent from the comparable 1960 volume.

## 11 - TRAFFIC BY RAIL, THROUGH BUS, BOAT AND PLANE - NOVEMBER 1961

Total entries by rail, through bus, boat and plane in November 1961 came to 141,800 , a decrease of 3,500 units or just over 2 per cent less than in the previous November. Aggregate crossings comprised 66,100 foreign entries and 75,700 returning Canadians. For the eleven months ending November 1961, total entries numbered $2,722,800$, a decline of 54,100 units or almost 2 per cent below the comparable 1960 volume. Cumulative crossings consisted of $1,540,200$ nonresidents and 1,182,600 Canadians.

## FOREIGN TRAVELLERS

Non-resident entries by rail, bus, boat and plane in November 1961 registered an increase of 3,100 units or 5 per cent over the volume of traffic recorded in November 1960. Non-residents arriving by rail amounted to 11,800 , a decrease of 1,700 or between 12 and 13 per cent while entries by boat, which numbered 2,800, were down 200 units or 7 per cent. Foreign travellers entering Canada via bus came to 20,500, registering an increase of 1,100 or nearly 6 per cent and the 31,000 entries by plane represented a gain of 3,900 units or between 14 and 15 per cent from the November 1960 volume.

Cumulative entries by rail, through bus, boat and plane during the period January to November 1961 gained 37,000 units or between 2 and 3 per cent in comparison with the corresponding 1960 figure. A breakdown shows 223,200 entries by rail, 397,300 by bus, 465,000 via boat and 454,700 by plane. Entries by rail experienced a decrease of between 13 and 14 per cent from comparable 1960 data while travel by bus fell less than one-half per cent. On the other hand, arrivals by boat and plane registered gains of about 6 per cent and just over 11 per cent, respectively.

## CANADIAN TRAVELLERS

Re-entries of Canadian residents in November 1961 by rail,through bus, boat and plane declined some 6,600 units or 8 per cent compared to the previous November. Re-entries for the month comprised 15,500 by rail, 22,600 by bus, 2,400 by boat and 35,200 via plane. A comparison with November 1960 shows 4,200 or approximately 21 per cent fewer by rail, 4,900 or almost 18 per cent less by bus and 400 or 14 per cent fewer by boat. Non-residents returning by plane, however, recorded an increase of 2,900 or roughly 9 per cent.

Cumulative re-entries by long distance common carrier for the first eleven months in 1961 were down 91,100 units or about 7 per cent below the comparable 1960 total. Residents returning by rail numbered 245,900 , a drop of between 20 and 21 per cent. Similarly, re-entries by bus, which amounted to 406,300, were down about 4 per cent and return trips by boat, which came to 107,700, declined between 11 and 12 per cent. Cumulative re-entries by plane reached 422,700 , representing a slight gain of less than 1 per cent in comparison with the January - November period of 1960.

Foreign Vehicles Inward

A traveller's vehicle permit is issued at the port of entry by Customs officers to every foreign vehicle entering Canada. This document authorizes the use of the vehicle during the intended length of stay in Canada and is surrendered when departing at the port of exit.

Residents of border communities who make many trips during the year are entitled to apply for a standing (L) traveller's vehicle permit. The operator of the vehicle covered by the standing (L) traveller's vehicle permit must show the document on each entry into Canada. All visits made after the original visit when the permit was issued are recorded as "Repeats" and entered under the appropriate heading. Persons holding this type of permit are usually familiar to port officials.

Permits showing entry into Canada and exit to the United States on the same day are entered in the first column with length of stay in Canada as 24 hours or less. The remainder of the travellers' vehicle permits (including the first trip of standing ( L ) permits) are recorded in the second column with length of stay as over 24 hours. Repeat trips of vehicles using standing (L) permits are recorded in the third column captioned "Repeats and Taxis". Taxis operate under a special permit and, therefore, are not included in columns 1 or 2.

## Canadian Vehicles Inward

Canadian vehicles returning to Canada are classified by length of stay, depending upon whether they are abroad for more or less than 24 hours.
