

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# CLASSIFICATIONS USED IN THIS REPORT

"Commercial Vehicles" are trucks used for commercial purposes.

Highway Traffic not classified as commercial vehicles consists of automobiles, taxis, motorcycles and bicycles.

# Foreign Vehicles Inward

A traveller's vehicle permit is issued at the port of entry by Customs officers to every foreign vehicle entering Canada. This document authorizes the use of the vehicle during the intended length of stay in Canada and is surrendered when departing at the port of exit.

Residents of border communities who make many trips during the year are entitled to apply for a standing (L) traveller's vehicle permit. The operator of the vehicle covered by the standing (L) traveller's vehicle permit must show the document on each entry into Canada. All visits made after the original visit when the permit was issued are recorded as "Repeats" and entered under the appropriate heading. Persons holding this type of permit are usually familiar to port officials.

Permits showing entry into Canada and exit to the United States on the same day are entered in the first column with length of stay in Canada as 24 hours or less. The remainder of the travellers' vehicle permits (including the first trip of standing (L) permits) are recorded in the second column with length of stay as over 24 hours. Repeat trips of vehicles using standing (L) permits are recorded in the third column captioned "Repeats and Taxis". Taxis operate under a special permit and, therefore, are not included in columns 1 or 2.

#### Canadian Vehicles Inward

Canadian vehicles returning to Canada are classified by length of stay, depending upon whether they are abroad for more or less than 24 hours.



# I - VOLUME OF TRAFFIC BETWEEN CANADA AND THE UNITED STATES - 1961

The number of border crossings into Canada during 1961 attained a record high of 59.8 million, a gain of 1.1 million units or almost 2 per cent in comparison with 1960. Visitors from the United States accounted for 30.5 million of the total while returning Canadian travellers numbered 29.3 million; in each case a record volume compared with preceeding year. Although only part of the international travel movement is associated with tourism or vacationing, the aggregate comprises all types of border crossings (except immigrants) including, among others, the frequent trips of businessmen and commuters, shoppers, and persons travelling in transit between points in either the United States or Canada.

There were 819,600 more entries of non-residents from the United States in 1961 than in 1960, representing an increase of approximately 3 per cent. A similar analysis on a quarterly basis reveals gains of just over 2 per cent in the first quarter, about 2 per cent in the second, close to 4 per cent in the third and slightly more than 1 per cent in the final quarter of 1961.

Re-entries of Canadian travellers from the United States in 1961 advanced approximately 1 per cent over the 1960 figure. Most significant was an increase of nearly 4 per cent in the first quarter with moderate gains of about one-half of one per cent in both the third and fourth quarters. The number of residents making the return trip during the second quarter of 1961 did, however, experience a slight decline of less than one-half per cent in comparison with the same period of 1960.




# II - HIGHWAY TRAFFIC AT CANADIAN BORDER - 1961

Aggregate vehicle crossings into Canada from the United States for 1961 amounted to 19,023,900 units, an increase of some 391,500 or approximately 2 per cent compared with 1960. Foreign vehicles represented 9,643,900 of the total and Canadian vehicles accounted for 9,380,000.

# FOREIGN VEHICLES

Entries of vehicles registered in the United States advanced by 293,200 units or about 3 per cent during 1961. Foreign vehicles remaining in Canada 24 hours or less numbered 3,736,300,a gain of 178,900 or 5 per cent over the previous year and vehicles staying over 24 hours amounted to 3,025,900, an expansion of 200,700 units or around 7 per cent. "Repeats and Taxis" came to 2,400,500 for the year 1961, down 81,300 units or roughly 3 per cent. Similarly, entries of foreign commercial vehicles, which numbered 481,200, declined by approximately 1 per cent in comparison with 1960.

Comparisons of foreign vehicle entries for 1960 and 1961 on a quarterly basis show increases in all four quarters. There were just over 6 per cent more entries in the first quarter, about 3 per cent more in the second and third and approximately 1 per cent in the fourth quarter. The proportion of incoming foreign vehicles which entered during each quarter of 1961 showed little variation from comparable 1960 data. Almost 14 per cent of the entries were recorded in the first quarter, between 24 and 25 per cent in the second, just over 43 per cent in the third and between 18 and 19 per cent in the fourth.



Comparisons of 1961 data with 1960 on a provincial basis show that foreign vehicle entries increased by nearly 11 per cent in British Columbia, almost 7 per cent in Saskatchewan, about 6 per cent in Manitoba, between 4 and 5 per cent in both Quebec and Ontario, and between 3 and 4 per cent in the Yukon Territories. However, a decrease of just over 3 per cent was noted for Newfoundland and Nova Scotia, New Brunswick reported roughly 4 per cent less entries and Alberta experienced a decline of approximately 1 per cent from 1960 volume. The distribution of all non-resident traffic in 1961 on a proportional basis by province once again displayed very little difference from comparable 1960 data. Ontario was the province of entry for between 63 and 64 per cent of the foreign vehicles in 1961. New Brunswick's share of incoming foreign vehicles amounted to about 17 per cent compared with between 18 and 19 per cent in 1960. The province of Quebec accounted for close to 10 per cent of the entries, while the proportion entering British Columbia advanced to approximately 6 per cent of the total. The proportion entering Canada in 1961 through ports in Manitoba (around 2 per cent), Alberta (nearly 1 per cent), Saskatchewan (roughly 1 per cent) and the remaining provinces and territories remained unchanged from the preceeding year.

# CANADIAN VEHICLES

In 1961, total re-entries of vehicles registered in Canada increased by 98,300 units or approximately 1 per cent over the comparable 1960 volume. Aggregate crossings consisted of 7,262,300 vehicles absent 24 hours or less, 1,466,800 vehicles abroad over 24 hours and 650,900 re-entries of commercial vehicles. Compared with 1960 data, re-entries in the 24 hours or less category advanced some 120,000 or almost 2 per cent. On the other hand, vehicles absent over 24 hours fell by 17,300 units and re-entries of commercial vehicles were down 4,400, in both instances a decrease of around 1 per cent.

A comparison with 1960 on a quarterly basis shows an increase in the number of Canadian vehicles returning during the first, second and fourth quarters but a slight drop in the third. The largestgain, almost 4 per cent, occurred in the first quarter and the smallest increase, about 1 per cent, was attributed to the fourth quarter while just over 1 per cent more re-entries were noted in the second quarter. The decrease in re-entries during the third quarter of 1961 amounted to roughly one-half per cent.

The proportion of Canadian vehicles returning from the United States during each of the four quarters in 1961 once again displayed little variation from a comparable distribution in 1960. Between 18 and 19 per cent of the re-entries occurred in the first quarter, close to 26 per cent in the second, between 33 and 34 per cent in the third and just over 22 per cent in the final period. The percentage gain for the first quarter amounted to about one-half per cent, there was no change during the second and only slight decreases were noted in the remaining two quarters.

Analysis on a regional basis of return trips by Canadian Vehicles in 1961 shows that Newfoundland and Nova Scotia accounted for roughly 7 per cent less re-entries, Ontario 1 per cent fewer, Saskatchewan around 3 per cent less and Alberta between 3 and 4 per cent fewer re-entries than in 1960. Increases recorded by the other provinces amounted to approximately one-half per cent for New Brunswick, close to 5 per cent in Quebec, between 3 and 4 per cent in Manitoba, between 4 and 5 per cent for British Columbia and between 19 and 20 per cent in the Yukon Territories.

# III - TRAFFIC BY RAIL, THROUGH BUS, BOAT AND PLANE - 1961

In 1961, total entries from the United States by rail, through bus, boat and plane amounted to 2,872,200, a decrease of 49,700 units or nearly 2 per cent below the comparable 1960 volume. Aggregate crossings comprised 1,606,900 foreign travellers and 1,265,300 Canadians returning from trips in the United States.

# FOREIGN TRAVELLERS

Foreign entries by rail, through bus, boat and plane in 1961 increased by 37,700 units or between 2 and 3 per cent over 1960. Entries by rail, which numbered 240,300 were down some 39,200 or 14 per cent and arrivals by bus, which amounted to 415,400, recorded a slight decline of 200 units. However, non-residents entering Canada by boat came to 465,700, a gain of 26,400 or 6 per cent and entries via plane, which numbered 485,500 for the year, were up some 50,700 units or close to 12 per cent over 1960.

#### CANADIAN TRAVELLERS

Canadians returning from the United States by rail, through bus, boat and plane registered a decrease in 1961 of 87,400 units or between 6 and 7 per cent. Only re-entries by plane registered an increase over 1960 data, as the 457,700 return trips by this form of travel was 6,200 or between 1 and 2 per cent higher. Re-entries by rail numbered 266,600, a decrease of 65,800 or nearly 20 per cent and return trips by bus amounted to 430,800, a drop of 14,400 crossings or roughly 3 per cent. Similarly, residents making their re-entry by boat in 1961 totalled 110,200, a decline of 13,400 or approximately 11 per cent below the corresponding 1960 figure.

# IV - HIGHWAY TRAFFIC - DECEMBER 1961

The total number of vehicles crossing from the United States into Canada during December 1961 amounted to 1,152,100, representing an expansion of 43,800 units or 4 per cent over the December 1960 volume. The aggregate comprised 509,700 foreign vehicles and 642,400 vehicles registered in Canada.

#### FOREIGN VEHICLES

Entries of foreign vehicles in December 1961 increased some 20,200 units or just over 4 per cent compared with the same month of the previous year. Those remaining 24 hours or less numbered 198,700, a gain of 13,900 units or between 7 and 8 per cent. Vehicles in Canada over 24 hours amounted to 125,500, an increase of 13,000 or between 11 and 12 per cent. Foreign highway traffic classified as "Repeats and Taxis" numbered 148,200 in December 1961, a decline of 7,100 or between 4 and 5 per cent from the previous December while entries of commercial vehicles registered in the United States amounted to 37,300, or a slight increase of 1 per cent.

# CANADIAN VEHICLES

Re-entries of Canadian vehicles in December 1961 advanced some 23,600 units or nearly 4 per cent in comparison with December 1960. Vehicles absent 24 hours or less numbered 512,400, a gain of 19,000 units or approximately 4 per cent and vehicles returning after trips lasting over 24 hours amounted to 72,400, an increase of 1,900 or not quite 3 per cent. There was also an expansion in re-entries of Canadian commercial vehicles, which in December 1961 came to 57,600, or 5 per cent more than in the previous December.

# V - TRAFFIC BY RAIL, THROUGH BUS, BOAT AND PLANE - DECEMBER 1961

The number of persons entering Canada by rail, through bus, boat and plane in December 1961 amounted to 149,400, an increase of 4,400 entries or about 3 per cent over the previous December. Aggregate crossings consisted of 66,700 foreign travellers and 82,700 residents of Canada.

# FOREIGN TRAVELLERS

Non-residents arriving from the United States by long distance common carrier in December 1961 recorded a slight increase of 700 units or roughly 1 per cent in comparison with December 1960. The total comprised 17,100 entries by rail, 18,100 by bus, 700 by boat and 30,800 via plane. Arrivals by bus advanced 1,000 ornearly 6 per cent and entries by plane were up 4,600 units or almost 18 per cent over December 1960 data. On the other hand, rail travel was down 4,500 units and boat traffic fell some 400 units, representing decreases of about 21 per cent and 36 per cent, respectively.

# CANADIAN TRAVELLERS

Re-entries of Canadian travellers from the United States in December 1961 showed an increase of 3,700 units or approximately 5 per cent over the same month of 1960. Total re-entries consisted of 20,700 by rail, 24,500 via bus, 2,600 via boat and 34,900 by plane. Rail was the only form of travel to experience a decline from the previous December, amounting to 2,800 units or approximately 12 per cent. Return trips by bus advanced by 1,000 persons or between 4 and 5 percent re-entries by boat were up 700 units or not quite 33 per cent and 4,800 or 16 per cent more residents returned by plane.
