




TRAVEL BETWEEN CANADA AND THE UNITED STATES

MARCH 1961



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1 - HIGHWAY TRAFFIC - MARCH 1961

Highway traffic entering Canada from the United States in March 1961 increased by 100,400 units or nearly 10 per cent in comparison with March 1960. Total crossings, which numbered 1,120,800, comprised 490,100 entries of foreign vehicles and 630,700 Canadian. Cumulative entries for the first three months of 1961 registered an increase of 143,200 units or not quite 5 per cent over the comparable 1960 figure. During the first quarter, there were 3,052,500 vehicle crossings recorded, of which 1,326,600 were foreign and 1,725,900 were Canadian.

FOREIGN VEHICLES

Entries of foreign vehicles in March 1961 advanced between 10 and 11 per cent with 46,600 more crossings recorded than in the previous March. Vehicles remaining in Canada 24 hours or less numbered 195,400, an increase of 34,700 or between 21 and 22 per cent. Foreign vehicles staying over 24 hours came to 108,800, an increase of 23,900 or about 28 per cent. Crossings listed as "Repeats and Taxis" accounted for 142,600 of the total, a decrease of 7,500 units or some 5 per cent lower than in March 1960. Similarly, commercial vehicles recorded a decrease of between 9 and 10 per cent.

Cumulative data for the first quarter of 1961 show that entries of foreign vehicles increased by 78,000 or just over 6 per cent in comparison with the same period of 1960. Vehicles remaining 24 hours or less numbered 528,400, an advance of 79,400 or not quite 18 per cent. Foreign automobiles remaining over 24 hours numbered 277,600, an increase of 36,700 or slightly more than 15 per cent. The 399,900 "Repeats and Taxis" which entered Canada during the first three months of 1961, represented a decrease of 23,000 or between 5 and 6 per cent from the comparable 1960 figure. Similarly, foreign commercial traffic recorded a decline of around 11 per cent.

The earlier date of the Easter season in 1961 was, no doubt, responsible for some of the increase in foreign entries during March. In 1960, all Easter weekend visitors were recorded in the month of April.

CANADIAN VEHICLES

Canadian vehicles returning to Canada in March 1961 increased by 53,800 units or more than 9 per cent compared with March 1960. Resident vehicles which had been absent 24 hours or less numbered 514,900, an increase of 50,400 or close to 11 per cent. Canadian vehicles abroad over 24 hours came to 64,300, a gain of 8,200 or between 14 and 15 per cent. Commercial traffic re-entering Canada however, decreased between 8 and 9 per cent from the March 1960 level.

Cumulative re-entries of Canadian vehicles in the first three months of 1961 increased by 65,200 units or approximately 4 per cent in comparison with a similar period of 1960. Canadian vehicles remaining outside the country 24 hours or less numbered 1,379,100, an advance of 59,100 or between 4 and 5 per cent. In addition, resident vehicles absent more than 24 hours came to 172,200, an increase of 15,900 or about 10 per cent. Compared with the first quarter of 1960, re-entries of Canadian commercial vehicles were down more than 5 per cent.

11 - TRAFFIC BY RAIL, THROUGH BUS, BOAT AND PLANE - MARCH 1961

Total entries of persons into Canada by rail, through bus, boat and plane in March 1961 numbered 150,800, a slight decrease of 300 persons or less than 1 per cent below the March 1960 figure. Foreign travellers accounted for 57,500 of the total while Canadian residents numbered 93,300. Cumulative entries for the January to March period inclusive reached 426,300, a decline of 20,800 or close to 5 per cent under the comparable total for 1960. Included in the aggregate of crossings were 170,600 foreign and 255,700 Canadian travellers.

FOREIGN TRAVELLERS

There were 800 or between 1 and 2 per cent more non-resident entries by rail, through bus, boat and plane in March 1961 than in March 1960. Entries by rail were 13,200, a decrease of 2,600 or between 16 and 17 per cent while arrivals by boat were also significantly lower than in the previous March. On the other hand, non-residents entering by plane numbered 28,300, an increase of 2,500 or nearly 10 per cent and the 15,800 arrivals by through bus marked a gain of 2,500 or between 18 and 19 per cent over similar data for March 1960.

Foreign entries by common carrier during the first quarter of 1961 were down 300 units or less than 1 per cent in comparison with the corresponding period of 1960. A breakdown of total entries according to type of transportation shows plane with 76,200, through bus with 50,000, rail with 41,900 and boat with 2,500. Increases in plane and bus arrivals of about 2 per cent and 26 per cent, respectively, were offset by decreases in rail and boat travel of close to 21 per cent and about 30 per cent, respectively.

CANADIAN TRAVELLERS

The number of residents re-entering Canada in March 1961 by rail, through bus, boat and plane registered a decrease of 1,100 units or just over 1 per cent in comparison with the previous March. Canadians returning by plane numbered 47,100, an increase of 4,400 or slightly over 10 per cent. Similarly, the 25,500 re-entries by bus represented a gain of 1,300 or close to 6 per cent. Re-entries by rail, however, which came to 19,900, were 6,700 or around 25 per cent lower than in March 1960. Canadians returning by boat amounted to 800, about 100 or 19 per cent fewer than in the same month of 1960.

Cumulative data for the first three months of 1961 reveal a decrease of 20,500 or between 7 and 8 per cent in the number of Canadians returning from the United States by common carrier compared to the same figure for the year 1960. Total re-entries during this time comprised 115,700 by plane, 72,700 by through bus, 64,200 by rail and 3,100 by boat. Only long distance bus recorded an increase (about 5 per cent) over corresponding data for 1960. Decreases experienced by other means of long distance common carrier were: rail nearly 23 per cent; plane between 3 and 4 per cent; and boat about 18 per cent.

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CLASSIFICATIONS USED IN THIS REPORT

"Commercial Vehicles" are trucks used for commercial purposes.

Highway Traffic not classified as commercial vehicles consists of automobiles, taxis, motorcycles and bicycles.

Foreign Vehicles Inward

A traveller's vehicle permit is issued at the port of entry by Customs officers to every foreign vehicle entering Canada. This document authorizes the use of the vehicle during the intended length of stay in Canada and is surrendered when departing at the port of exit.

Residents of border communities who make many trips during the year are entitled to apply for a standing (L) traveller's vehicle permit. The operator of the vehicle covered by the standing (L) traveller's vehicle permit must show the document on each entry into Canada. All visits made after the original visit when the permit was issued are recorded as "Repeats" and entered under the appropriate heading. Persons holding this type of permit are usually familiar to port officials.

Permits showing entry into Canada and exit to the United States on the same day are entered in the first column with length of stay in Canada as 24 hours or less. The remainder of the travellers' vehicle permits (including the first trip of standing (L) permits) are recorded in the second column with length of stay as over 24 hours. Repeat trips of vehicles using standing (L) permits are recorded in the third column captioned "Repeats and Taxis". Taxis operate under a special permit and, therefore, are not included in columns 1 or 2.

Canadian Vehicles Inward

Canadian vehicles returning to Canada are classified by length of stay, depending upon whether they are abroad for more or less than 24 hours.

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
