## 1- HIGHWAY TRAFFIC - JUNE 1961

The volume of highway traffic entering Canada from the United States in June 1961 recorded an increase of 102,400 units or approximately 6 per cent in comparison with June 1960. Aggregate crossings comprised 995,900 foreign vehicles and 865,500 vehicles registered in Canada. Total cumulative entries for the period January - June 1961 advanced by 244,400 units or just over 3 per cent more than in the same period of 1960. A breakdown of cumulative crossings shows 3,696,800 foreign vehicles and $4,138,500$ with Canadian registration.

## FOREIGN VEHICLES

Entries of foreign vehicles during June 1961 increased by 52,800 units or between 5 and 6 per cent compared with June 1960. Entries remaining in Canada 24 hours or less numbered 369,700 , an increase of 11,800 or slightly over 3 per cent and those remaining over 24 hours amounted to 345,000 , some 35,600 or between 11 and 12 per cent higher. Foreign vehicles classified as "Repeats and Taxis" numbered 239,200 in June 1961, a gain of 2,600 or about l per cent over the previous June, while commercial vehicles amounted to 42,000 , an increase of approximately 7 per cent.

Cumulative entries of foreign vehicles in the first half of 1961 recorded an increase of 148,900 or about 4 per cent in comparison with the same period of 1960. Non-resident vehicles remaining in Canada 24 hours or less numbered $1,479,600$, up 113,200 or just over 8 per cent and vehicles remaining over 24 hours amounted to 968,500 , a gain of 75,000 or between 8 and 9 per cent. Cumulative entries of "Repeats and Taxis" came to $1,009,100$, a decrease of 25,400 or between 2 and 3 per cent less than in the January - June period of 1960 while commercial vehicles, which amounted to 239,600 , were between 5 and 6 per cent lower.

## CANADIAN VEHICLES

Canadian vehicles returning from the United States in June 1961 recorded an increase of 49,600 units or approximately 6 per cent compared with June 1960. Re-entries abroad 24 hours or less amounted to 696,800 , representing an advance of 48,100 or between 7 and 8 per cent. Those absent over 24 hours numbered 116,000, an increase of 3,600 or slightly more than 3 per cent. Canadian commercial vehicles re-entering in June 1961 numbered 52,700, about 4 per cent fewer than in the same month of the preceding year.

The number of Canadian vehicles returning to Canada from the United States during the first six months of 1961 registered an increase of 95,500 or between 2 and 3 per cent over comparable data for 1960. Vehicles returning from visits lasting 24 hours or less numbered 3,301,700, an increase of 89,700 or almost 3 per cent and those absent over 24 hours amounted to 516,300 , representing a gain of 20,700 or just over 4 per cent. However, re-entries of Canadian commercial vehicles during the first half of 1961 declined between 4 and 5 per cent from the comparable 1960 figure.

11 - TRAFFIC BY RAIL, THROUGH BUS, BOAT AND PLANE - JUNE 1961

Total entries into Canada by rail, through bus, boat and plane during June 1961 numbered 305,900, a decrease of 9,700 or just over 3 per cent less than in the previous June. Foreign travellers accounted for 189,900 of the entries while Canadian travellers returning numbered 116,000. Cumulative entries for the first half of 1961 reached $1,130,800$, down 55,700 or close to 5 per cent below the comparable figure for 1960. Aggregate cumulative crossings comprised 544,700 foreign travellers and 586,100 Canadian.

## FOREIGN TRAVELLERS

Foreign travellers entering Canada by rail, through bus, boat and plane, during June 1961 recorded a decline of 5,200 entries or almost 3 per cent below June 1960. Entries by rail, which numbered 26,800 , were down 7,100 or 21 per cent and arrivals by bus, which numbered 47,400, fell by 700 entries or between 1 and 2 per cent. Foreign entries by plane in June 1961 came to 54,700 , a gain of 2,200 or slightly over 4 per cent more than in the same month of 1960, while entries by boat, which numbered 61,000 , recorded a slight increase of 400 units or about 1 per cent.

Curulative entries of non-residents by rail, through bus, boat and plane during the first half of 1961 were down 11,200 or 2 per cent below the comparable 1960 sum. Foreign arrivals during this period consisted of 101,900 by rail, 156,800 by bus, 84,600 by boat and 201,400 by plane. Entries by rail fell approximately 19 per cent in comparison with the first six months of 1960 , while all other forms of common carrier recorded increases. There were nearly 2 per cent more non-resident entries by bus, 1 per cent more by boat and roughly 5 per cent additional entries by plane.

## CANADIAN TRAVELLERS

Canadian travellers returning by rail, through bus, boat and plane in June 1961 registered a decrease of 4,500 units or almost 4 per cent compared with June 1960. Re-entries by rail numbered 18,500 , a decrease of 3,300 or just over 15 per cent, while Ganadians returning by bus came to 51,900 , a decline of 500 entries or about 1 per cent. Similarly, re-entries by boat, which numbered 9,800, were down 2,400 or approximately 20 per cent. The only increase recorded occurred in the 35,800 re-entries by plane, which were 1,700 or around 5 per cent greater than in the previous June.

Cumulative data for the first six months of 1961 show that re-entries of Canadian residents by rail, through bus, boat and plane registered a decrease of 44,500 units or approximately 7per cent in comparison with the first half of 1960. A breakdown of cumulative re-entries shows there were 129,000 by rail, 201,100 by bus, 19,500 by boat and 236,500 via plane, in each case a decrease from comparable 1960 figures. The greatest decline was recorded by rail, which fell nearly 23 per cent, while re-entries by boat were down close to 12 per cent, plane decreased between 1 and 2 per cent and bus fell less than one-half per cent.

## CLASSIFICATIONS USED IN THIS REPORT

"Commercial Vehicles" are trucks used for commercial purposes.
Highway Traffic not classified as commercial vehicles consists of automobiles, taxis, motorcycles and bicycles.

## Foreign Vehicles Inward

A traveller's vehicle permit is issued at the port of entry by Customs officers to every foreign vehicle entering Canada. This document authorizes the use of the vehicle during the intended length of stay in Canada and is surrendered when departing at the port of exit.

Residents of torder communities who make many trips during the year are entitled to apply for a standing (L) traveller's vehicle permit. The operator of the vehicle covered by the standing (L) traveller's vehicle permit must show the document on each entry into Canada. All visits made after the original visit when the permit was issued are recorded as "Repeats" and entered under the appropriate heading. Persons holding this type of permit are usually familiar to port officials.

Permits showing entry into Canada and exit to the Onited States on the same day are entered in the first column with length of stay in Canada as 24 hours or less. The remainder of the travellers' vehicle permits (including the first trip of standing (L) permits) are recorded in the second column with length of stay as over 24 hours. Repeat trips of vehicles using standing (L) permits are recorded in the third column captioned "Repeats and Taxis". Taxis operate under a special permit and, therefore, are not included in columns 1 or 2.

## Ganadian Vehicles Inward

Canadian vehicles returning to Canada are classified by length of stay, depending upon whether they are abroad for more or less than 24 hours.
