## JULY 1961 <br> 1 - HIGHWAY TRAFFIC - JULY 1961

Highway traffic entering Canada from the United States in July 1961 registered an increase of 41,500 vehicles or between 1 and 2 per cent more than in July 1960. The total volume comprised $1,635,800$ foreign vehicles and $1,184,400$ vehicles registered in Canada. Cumulative crossings for the first seven months of 1961 exceeded the comparable 1960 figure by 286,000 units or nearly 3 per cent. Foreign vehicles represented $5,332,600$ of the cumulative crossings while Canadian vehicles accounted for $5,323,000$.

## FOREIGN VEHICLES

Entries of foreign vehicles during July 1961 advanced by 58,400 units or close to 4 per cent in comparison with July l960. Foreign vehicles remaining in Canada 24 hours or less numbered 620,500 , a gain of 16,600 units or almost 3 per cent, while those remaining over 24 hours amounted to 655,600 , an increase of 34,600 units or between 5 and 6 per cent. "Repeats and Taxis" accounted for 315,600 of the foreign entries in July 1961, a slight increase of 1,000 units or less than one-half per cent compared with the previous July. A similar comparison reveals that foreign commercial traffic, which numbered 44,100 vehicles, recorded an increase of just over 16 per cent.

Cumulative entries of foreign vehicles in the first seven months of 1961 registered an increase of 207,300 units or 4 per cent over comparable data for 1960. Non-resident vehicles remaining 24 hours or less numbered 2,100,100, an increase of 129,800 units or between 6 and 7 per cent, and those remaining over 24 hours came to $1,624,200$, a gain of 109,700 units or approximately 7 per cent. "Repeats and Taxis", which amounted to $1,324,600$, were down 24,500 units or almost 2 per cent and entries of foreign commercial vehicles were about 3 per cent lower than in the January to July period of 1960.

## GANADIAN VEHICLES

The number of Canadian vehicles returning to Canada from the United States in July 1961 decreased by 16,900 units or between 1 and 2 per cent in comparison with July 1960. Vehicles absent 24 hours or less numbered 873,800 , a decrease of 7,100 units or nearly 1 per cent, and the 255,000 vehicles returning after being abroad over 24 hours represented a decline of 13,400 units or 5 per cent. Reentries of commercial vehicles in July 1961 amounted to 55,600 , an increase of approximately 7 per cent over July 1960.

Cumulative re-entries of Canadian vehicles for the first seven months in 1961 recorded an increase of 78,700 units or between 1 and 2 per cent over comparable data for 1960. Re-entries abroad 24 hours or less numbered $4,175,500$, an increase of 82,600 units or 2 per cent. Similarly, vehicles absent over 24 hours, which amounted to 771,300, increased by 7,300 units or nearly 1 per cent. However, cumulative reentries of commercial vehicles were about 3 per cent lower than in the corresponding seven-month period of 1960.

Total entries into Canada by rail, through bus, boat and plane during July 1961 amounted to 454,800 , a decline of 15,200 or approximately 3 per cent in comparison with July 1960. The total comprised 310,000 foreign travellers and 144,800 residents returning to Canada. Cumulative entries for the first seven months of 1961, which numbered 1,585,700, were down some 70,800 or slightly over 4 per cent below the comparable 1960 figure. Aggregate cumulative crossings consisted of 854,800 foreign entries and 730,900 Canadian.

## FOREIGN TRAVELLERS

Non-residents entering Canada by rail, through bus, boat and plane in July 1961 recorded a slight drop of 1,000 units or less than one-half per cent below the July 1960 volume. Entries by rail numbered 38,100 , a decline of 3,400 or about 8 per cent and arrivals by bus came to 76,600 , approximately 7,800 or 9 per cent less than in the previous July. Non-residents entering by boat amounted to 138,000 , a gain of 5,000 or close to 4 per cent and entries by plane, which numbered 57,300, were 5,200 or nearly 10 per cent greater.

Cumulative foreign entries by rail, through bus, boat and plane during the first seven months of 1961 experienced a decrease of 12,100 units or between 1 and 2 per cent compared with the same period of 1960. Total crossings comprised 140,000 by rail, 233,400 by bus, 222,700 via boat and 258,700 via plane. Entries by rail fell between 16 and 17 per cent in comparison with similar 1960 data and arrivals by bus were down about 2 per cent. However, boat and plane traffic experienced gains, the former advancing nearly 3 per cent and the latter approximtely 6 per cent.

## CANADIAN TRAVELLERS

Canadian residents returning via rail, through bus, boat and plane in July 1961 registered a decline of 14,200 units or 9 per cent compared with the number returning during July 1960. Re-entries by rail amounted to 27,200, representing a decrease of 6,000 or 18 per cent, re-entries by bus numbered 54,400 , down 3,100 or between 5 and 6 per cent, and Canadians returning by boat came to 29,200, a drop of 5,700 or between 16 and 17 per cent. Residents who returned via plane in July 1961 numbered 34,000 , a slight increase of 600 units or about 2 per cent over July 1960.

Cumulative data show a decrease of 58,700 units or between 7 and 8 per cent in the number of Canadians returning by rail, through bus, boat and plane during the first seven months of 1961 as compared with the same period in 1960 . Furthermore, decreases were recorded by all forms of long distance common carrier. Reentries by rail numbered 156,200, a drop of 22 per cent and re-entries via bus amounted to 255,500 , or a decline of between 1 and 2 per cent. Canadians returning by boat in the first seven months of 1961 numbered 48,700 , between 14 and 15 per cent fewer than in the January to July period of 1960 and re-entries by plane, which totalled 270,500, were approximately 1 per cent less.

## CLASSIFICATIONS USED IN THIS REPORT

"Commercial Vehicles" are trucks used for commercial purposes.<br>Highway Traffic not classified as commercial vehicles consists of automobiles, taxis, motorcycles and bicycles.

## Foreign Vehicles Imward

A traveller's vehicle permit is issued at the port of entry by Customs officers to every foreign vehicle entering Canada. This document authorizes the use of the vehicle during the intended length of stay in Canada and is surrendered when departing at the port of exit.

Residents of border communities who make many trips during the year are entitled to apply for a standing (L) traveller's vehicle permit. The operator of the vehicle covered by the standing (L) traveller's vehicle permit must show the document on each entry into Canada. All visits made after the original visit when the permit was issued are recorded as "Repeats" and entered under the appropriate heading. Persons holding this type of permit are usually familiar to port officials.

Permits showing entry into Canada and exit to the United States on the same day are entered in the first column with length of stay in Canada as 24 hours or less. The remainder of the travellers' vehicle permits (including the first trip of standing (L) permits) are recorded in the second column with length of stay as over 24 hours. Repeat trips of vehicles using standing (L) permits are recorded in the third column captioned "Repeats and Taxis". Taxis operate under a speciál permit and, therefore, are not included in columns 1 or 2.

## Canadian Vehicles Inward

Canadian vehicles returning to Canada are classified by length of stay, depending upon whether they are abroad for more or less than 24 hours.
