

TRAVEL BETWEEN CANADA AND THE UNITED STATES OCTOBER, 1962

I - HIGHWAY TRAFFIC - OCTOBER, 1962

Total entries of highway traffic in October 1962 amounted to 1,414,300 vehicles, marking a decline of 102,900 or close to 7 per cent in comparison with the previous October. Much of the decrease resulted from fewer re-entries of Canadian vehicles, which numbered 734,100, while foreign vehicles accounted for 680,200 of the total. On a cumulative basis, aggregate entries for the first ten months of 1962 came to 16,683,100, a slight rise of 15,500 or less than one-half per cent compared to the same period of 1961. A breakdown of cumulative entries shows 8,888,600 foreign vehicles and 7,794,500 vehicles registered in Canada.

FOREIGN VEHICLES

Entries of foreign vehicles from the United States in October 1962 experienced a decline of 29,200 or roughly 4 per cent from the October 1961 volume. Crossings classified as "Repeats and Taxis" and short-term traffic remaining 24 hours or less accounted for practically all of the decrease as they numbered 188,600 and 259,400, respectively. The former represented a drop of 18,900 or 9 per cent and the latter was a decline of 10,800 or 4 per cent from October 1961 data. At the same time, vehicles remaining over 24 hours amounted to 190,300, which was only a slight reduction of 700 units or less than one-half of one per cent. On the other hand, entries of foreign commercial vehicles in October 1962 at 41,900, advanced by 1,200 or nearly 3 per cent.

Cumulative crossings of foreign vehicles in the first ten months of 1962 were 313,600 or around 4 per cent greater than in the same month of 1961. Entries remaining 24 hours or less numbered 3,476,400, a rise of 161,400 or 5 per cent and vehicles staying over 24 hours amounted to 2,968,100, marking a gain of 198,500 or just over 7 per cent. "Repeats and Taxis" came to 2,035,500 during the January - October period of 1962, some 50,200 or between 2 and 3 per cent lower than the comparable 1961 volume. However, entries of foreign commercial vehicles reached 408,600, a slight gain of 3,900 or 1 per cent.

CANADIAN VEHICLES

Canadian vehicles re-entering Canada from the United States in October 1962 registered a drop of 73,700 units or 9 per cent from October 1961 data. Resident vehicles abroad 24 hours or less numbered 574,900, marking a decline of 42,400 or nearly 7 per cent and re-entries absent over 24 hours, which amounted to 107,000, fell by 28,600 or 21 per cent. In addition, 52,200 return crossings of Canadian commercial vehicles represented a decrease of 2,700 or 5 per cent below the October 1961 volume.

Cumulative re-entries of Canadian vehicles from the United States in the first ten months of 1962 were down by 298,100 or close to 4 per cent below the volume during a comparable period of 1961. Resident vehicles absent for 24 hours or less numbered 6,130,500, a decrease of 107,700 or nearly 2 per cent and vehicles abroad over 24 hours came to 1,146,200, some 166,500 or almost 13 per cent less. Moreover, re-entries of commercial vehicles during the January-October period of 1962, which numbered 517,800, signified a drop of 23,900 or between 4 and 5 per cent in comparison with corresponding 1961 data.

II - TRAFFIC BY RAIL, THROUGH BUS, BOAT AND PLANE - OCTOBER 1962

Total entries by rail, through bus, boat and plane in October 1962 numbered 204,800, marking an increase of 4,600 persons or just over 2 per cent compared with the October 1961 volume. Aggregate crossings comprised 105,700 foreign travellers and 99,100 Canadians returning to Canada. Cumulative entries for the first ten months of 1962 amounted to 2,894,200, a gain of 313,200 or about 12 per cent over the same period in 1961. Non-residents accounted for 1,745,900 of the cumulative total and Canadians represented 1,148,300.

FOREIGN TRAVELLERS

In October 1962, there were 5,900 or approximately 16 per cent more crossings of foreign travellers into Canada by rail, bus, boat and plane than in the same month of 1961. Increased travel by boat, particularly between Seattle and Victoria, was largely responsible for this gain with 21,600 entries recorded, some 6,300 or almost 41 per cent more than in the previous October. In addition, foreign arrivals by bus at 29,400 advanced by 3,000 or between 11 and 12 per cent. However, non-resident entries by rail amounted to 13,900, a decrease of 3,400 or between 19 and 20 per cent while the 40,800 who entered by plane showed very little change from the October 1961 figure.

Cumulative entries of foreign travellers by rail, through bus, boat and plane in the first ten months of 1962 exceeded the corresponding 1961 volume by 271,800 or between 18 and 19 per cent. Arrivals by boat, which numbered 694,200, represented a gain of 232,000 or about 50 per cent and crossings by bus of 414,600 marked an expansion of 37,800 persons or 10 per cent. At the same time, entries by rail during the January - October period of 1962 amounted to 214,200, an increase of 2,800 or just over 1 per cent, while foreign arrivals by plane were 422,900, a slight decrease of less than one-half per cent below the January - October volume in 1961.

CANADIAN TRAVELLERS

The number of Canadian travellers returning by rail, bus, boat and plane in October 1962 recorded a decrease of 1,300 persons or approximately 1 per cent below comparable 1961 data. Re-entries by boat numbered 5,500, a gain of 600 units or 11 per cent and return trips by bus amounted to 34,400, an increase of 2,400 or between 7 and 8 per cent. However, 19,800 Canadian residents returned by rail, signifying a decline of 2,200 or 10 per cent and re-entries by plane, which numbered 39,400, experienced a drop of 2,100 or 5 per cent compared with October 1961.

Cumulative re-entries of Canadian travellers from the United States by rail, through bus, boat and plane in the first ten months of 1962 advanced by 41,400 or close to 4 per cent. Rail travel recorded the only decrease in comparison with January - October 1961 as the 216,300 re-entries marked a decrease of 14,100 or about 6 per cent. Canadians returning via plane numbered 419,000, a rise of 31,500 or 8 per cent and return trips by boat amounted to 112,400, an increase of 7,100 or nearly 7 per cent. At the same time, re-entries by bus during the January - October period of 1962 reached 400,600, marking a gain of 16,900 or between 4 and 5 per cent over the same period of 1961.

CLASSIFICATIONS USED IN THIS REPORT

"Commercial Vehicles" are trucks used for commercial purposes.

Highway Traffic not classified as commercial vehicles consists of automobiles, taxis, motorcycles, bicycles and trailers.

Foreign Vehicles Inward

A traveller's vehicle permit is issued at the port of entry by Customs officers to every foreign vehicle entering Canada. This document authorizes the use of the vehicle during the intended length of stay in Canada and is surrendered when departing at the port of exit.

Residents of border communities who make many trips during the year are entitled to apply for a standing (L) traveller's vehicle permit. The operator of the vehicle covered by the standing (L) traveller's vehicle permit must show the document on each entry into Canada. All visits made after the original visit when the permit was issued are recorded as "Repeats" and entered under the appropriate heading. Persons holding this type of permit are usually familiar to port officials.

Permits showing entry into Canada and exit to the United States on the same day are entered in the first column with length of stay in Canada as 24 hours or less. The remainder of the travellers' vehicle permits (including the first trip of standing (L) permits) are recorded in the second column with length of stay as over 24 hours. Repeat trips of vehicles using standing (L) permits are recorded in the third column captioned "Repeats and Taxis". Taxis operate under a special permit and, therefore, are not included in columns 1 or 2.

Canadian Vehicles Inward

Canadian vehicles returning to Canada are classified by length of stay, depending upon whether they are abroad for more or less than 24 hours.
