## I - HIGHWAY TRAFFIC - NOVEMBER, 1962

Highway traffic entering Canada from the United States in November 1962 amounted to $1,180,200$, a decline of 23,900 units or 2 per cent from November 1961. Canadian vehicles, which numbered 609,200, accounted for all of the deorease and foreign vehicles numbered 571,000. On a cumulative basis, aggregate entries in the first eleven months of 1962 came to $17,878,700$, only a slight gain of 7,200 crossings over the comparable 1961 volume. The total comprised 9,459,700 foreign vehicles and 8,419,000 Canadian.

## FOREIGN VEHICLES

Intries of foreign vehicles from the United States in November 1962 advanced by 11,900 or 2 per cent compared with the November 1961 volume. Vehicles remaining 24 hours or less numbered 234,400 , a rise of 11,900 and vehicles over 24 hours amounted to 137,600 , an increase of 6,800 , representing a percentage gain in each case of just over 5 per cent. On the other hand, crossings of "Repeats and Taxis" at 157,500, mariked a decrease of 9,100 or between 5 and 6 per cent. Commercial vehicle ontries in November 1962 came to 41,500 , which was 2,300 or close to 6 per cent more than in the previous November.

Cumulative entries of foreign vehicles during the January-November period of 1962 showed an increase of 325,800 units or between 3 and 4 per cent in comparison with the same months of 1961. Vehicles remaining 24 hours or less numbered $3,710,800$, a rise of 173,500 or roughly 5 per cent and vehicles staying over 24 hours amounted to $3,105,700$, an advance of 205,300 or approximately 7 per cent. "Repeats and Taxis" reached 2,193,000 in the firat oleven months of 1962, some 59,300 or between 2 and 3 per cent less than the comparable 1961 figure, while foreign commercial vehioles at 450,200 represented a slight gain of 6,300 or between 1 and 2 per cent.

## CANADIAN VEHICLES

Re-entries of Canadian vehicles in November 1962 were down by 35,800 units or between 5 and 6 per cent compared with November 1961 as decreases were noted in all categories. Resident vehicles absent 24 hours or less numbered 499,800, a drop of 11,800 or around 2 per cent and those absent over 24 hours amounted to 62,300 , signifying a decline of 19,400 or olose to 24 per cent. At the same time, re-entries of Canadian comercial vehicles, which totalled 47,100 in November 1962, decreased by 4,600 or nearly 9 per cent from the November 1961 volume.

Re-ontries of Canadian vehicles for the first eleven months of 1962 registered a decline of 318,600 units or between 3 and 4 per cent compared to the same period of 1961. Vehicles outside Canada 24 hours or less numbered 6,630,300, a drop of 119,500 or almost 2 per cent. In addition, resident vehicles returning after trips lasting over 24 hours amounted to $1,208,500$, which was a decrease of 185,900 or around 13 per cent. Similarly, Canadian commercial vehicles re-entering in the first eleven months of 1962 numbered 580,200 , some 13,200 or roughly 2 per cent fewer than in the Jamary-November period of 1961.

II - TRAFFIC BI RAIL, THROUGH BUS, BOAT AND PLANE - NOVEMBER, 1962
Total ontries into Canada from the Onited States by rail, through bus, boat and plane in November 1962 amounted to 139,800, a decrease of 2,000 or between 1 and 2 per cent from the November 1961 figure. Aggregate crossings comprised 67,100 foreign travellers and 72,700 Canadians. Cumulative entries for the first eleven months of 1962 numbered 3,034,100, a gain of 311,300 or between 11 and 12 per cent over the comparable 1961 volume. Total cumulative travel consisted of 1,813,000 foreign travellers and 1,221,100 Canadians.

## FOREIGN TRAVELLERS

Foreign travellers entering Canada by rail, through bus, boat and plane during November 1962 advanced by 1,000 or between 1 and 2 per cent over November 1961. Rail travellers, who numbered 12,000 , increased by 200 or between 1 and 2 per cont, bus travellers at 21,500 were up by 1,000 or olose to 5 per cent and entries by plane of 31,500 registered a gain of 500 or roughly 2 per cent. Foreign entries by boat however, which amounted to 2,100, were down by some 700 or between 26 and 27 per cent compared with November 1961. It is intereating to note that this decrease roughly coincides with the termination in late October of the World's Fair, which augmented the volume of boat travel between Seattle and Victoria in earlier months.

Cumulative crossings of non-residents by rail, through bus, boat and plane during January-November 1962 recorded an increase of 272,800 or approximately 18 per cent over the same period of 1961. Intries by rail came to 226,200 , a rise of 3,000 or between 1 and 2 per cent, arrivals by bus numbered 436,200, a gain of 38,900 or nearly 10 per cent and boat travel accounted for 696,200 visits, a substantial increase of 231,200 or about 50 per cent. Most of this increase cocurred on the Pacific Coast in close proximity to the World's Fair in Seattle, Washington. On the other hand, visitors arriving by plane in the first eleven months of 1962 totalled 454,400, a slight decline of 300 persons or less than one-half per cent.

## GANADIAN TRAVELLERS

Canadian travellers returning to Canada via rail, through bus, boat and plane in November 1962 experienced a decline of 3,000 or almost 4 per cent in comparison with November 1961 data. The only gain was recorded by rail travel, which accounted for 15,700 re-entries, a rise of 200 or 1 per cent. Return trips by bus at 21,200 were down by 1,400 or 6 per cent and re-entries by boat, which numbered 1,400 , registered a decrease of 1,000 or 39 per cent. Similarly, Canadians returning by plane in November 1962 amounted to 34,400 , a drop of 800 or approximately 2 per cent below the November 1961 volume.

During the period January-November 1962 Ganadian travellers returning to Canada From the United States via rail, through bus, boat and plane advanced by 38,500 or just over 3 per cent compared with similar data for 1961. Re-entries by bus reached 421,800 , a rise of 15,500 or close to 4 per cent, re-entries by boat at 113,900 were up by 6,200 or nearly 6 per cent and return trips by plane, which amounted to 453,400 increased by 30,700 or just over 7 per cent. However, Canadians returning by rail in the first eleven months of 1962 numbered 232,000 , which was a decrease of 13,900 or approximately 6 per cent in comparison with the aame months of 1961.

# GLASSIFICATIONS USED IN THIS REPORT 

"Commercial Vehicles" are trucks used for commercial purposes.
Highway Traffic not classified as conmercial vehicles consists of automobiles, taxis, motoroycles, bicycles and trailers.

## Foreign Vehicles Inward

A traveller's vehicle permit. is issued at the port of entry by Customs officers to every foreign vehicle entering Canada. This document authorizes the use of the vehicle during the intended length of stay in Canada and is surrendered when departing at the port of exit.

Residents of border communities who make many trips during the year are entitled to apply for a standing (L) traveller!s vehicle permit. The operator of the vehicle covered by the standing (L) traveller's vehicle permit must show the document on each entry into Canada. All visits made after the original visit when the permit was issued are recorded as "Repeats" and entered under the appropriate heading. Persons holding this type of permit are usually familiar to port officials.

Permits showing entry into Canada and exit to the United States on the same day are entered in the first column with length of stay in Canada as 24 hours or less. The remainder of the travellers' vehicle permits (including the first trip of standing ( L ) permits) are recorded in the second column with length of stay as over 24 hours. Repeat trips of vehicles using standing ( $L$ ) permits are recorded in the third column captioned "Repeats and Taxis". Taxis operate under a special permit and, therefore, are not included in columns 1 or 2.

## Canadian Vehicles Invard

Canadian vehicles returning to Canada are classified by length of stay, depending upon whether they are abroad for more or less than 24 hours.
