## TRAVEL BETWEEN CANADA AND THE UNITED STATES

## 1 - HIGHWAY TRAFFIC - FEBRUARY 1962

Highway traffic crossing into Canada from the United States in February 1962 registered a decrease of 15,500 vehicles or between 1 and 2 per cent less than in February 1961. The total volume amounted to 927,600 units, of which 396,700 were foreign and 530,900 were Canadian. Cumulative crossings for January and February, which numbered 1,904,700, were also down between 1 and 2 per cent with 27,000 fewer vehicles. Aggregate entries during this period comprised 810,400 foreign vehicles and $1,094,300$ registered in Canada.

## FOREIGN VEHICLES

Entries of foreign vehicles during February 1962 fell by 9,900 units or between 2 and 3 per cent in comparison with the previous February. Visits lasting 24 hours or less accounted for 155,000 of the total, a decline of 6,000 units or about 4 per cent, while vehicles remaining over 24 hours numbered 86,300, representing an increase of 1,300 units or between 1 and 2 per cent. "Repeats and Taxis" amounted to 115,200 in February 1962, a decrease of 6,100 vehicles or approximately 5 per cent below the comparable 1961 volume. On the other hand, entries of foreign commercial vehicles, which amounted to 40,200 , advanced between 2 and 3 per cent.

Aggregate entries of foreign vehicles in January and February of 1962 were down by 26,100 units or 3 per cent below the January and February 1961 volume. Non-resident vehicles remaining in Canada 24 hours or less numbered 316,600, a drop of 16,400 or nearly 5 per cent, and those staying over 24 hours amounted to 168,700, a slight decline of 100 or less than one-half per cent. Foreign vehicles classed as "Repeats and Taxis" came to 243,200 , some 14,200 or between 5 and 6 per cent fewer, while the 81,900 entries of commercial vehicles represented a 6 per cent rise over the first two months of 1961.

## CANADIAN VEHICLES

The number of Canadian vehicles returning to Canada from the United States during February 1962 experienced a decline of 5,600 units or 1 per cent in comparison with February 1961. Resident vehicles abroad 24 hours or less were 417,900, a drop of 9,000 or about 2 per cent and those absent over 24 hours amounted to 48,600 , a decrease of 1,600 units or just over 3 per cent. However, re-entries of commercial vehicles registered in Canada numbered 64,400, a gain of between 8 and 9 per cent over February 1961.

Cumulative re-entries of Canadian vehicles for the first two months of 1962 showed a slight decrease of 900 units or less than one-half per cent from comparable 1961 data. Canadian vehicles returning after visits of 24 hours or less numbered 854,800 , a decline of 9,400 or around 1 per cent, and vehicles absent for over 24 hours amounted to 103,500 , a drop of 4,400 or 4 per cent. On the other hand, re-entries of Canadian commercial traffic numbered 136,000 vehicles, a rise of between 10 and 11 per cent over the corresponding volume for January and February of 1961.

## 11 - TRAFFIC BY RAIL, THROUGH BUS, BOAT AND PLANE - FEBRUARY 1962

Total entries by rail, bus, boat and plane in the month of February 1962 numbered 131,500 , an increase of 2,400 or roughly 2 per cent more than in February of the previous year. Aggregate crossings comprised 55,300 non-residents and 76,200 Canadians returning. Cumulative crossings for the first two months of 1962 amounted to 277,900 , representing a gain of 2,400 units or about 1 per cent over comparable 1961 data. Some 110,800 of the entries during the two months were non-residents and 167,100 were return trips of Canadian travellers.

## FOREIGN TRAVELLERS

Foreign travellers crossing into Canada by rail, bus, boat and plane during February 1962 recorded a decrease of 1,100 or almost 2 per cent below the February 1961 volume. A breakdown shows decreases in each category except plane where 25,600 entries marked an expansion of 3,700 units or just over 17 per cent. Nonresidents arriving by rail in February 1962 amounted to 13,200 , a drop of 1,100 or between 7 and 8 per cent. At the same time, entries by bus at 16,000 were down by 2,700 or between 14 and 15 per cent, while the 500 visitors who crossed into Canada by boat also represented a decrease in comparison with February 1961.

Cumulative entries of non-residents by rail, bus, boat and plane for the first two months in 1962 were down 2,300 units or 2 per cent in comparison with January and February of 1961. Foreign travellers entering by rail numbered 26,400, a decrease of 2,300 or 8 per cent and arrivals by bus, which amounted to 29,600, fell by 4,600 or between 13 and 14 per cent. There were also fewer entries by boat which accounted for 800 of the visits, while persons arriving by plane numbered 54,000 , an advance of 6,100 or nearly 13 per cent over the first two months of 1961 .

## CANADIAN TRAVRLLERS

The volume of Canadian travellers returning from the United States by rail, bus, boat and plane in February 1962 increased by 3,500 units or close to 5 per cent compared with the previous February. Residents re-entering by rail numbered 15,600 , a decrease of 3,200 or almost 17 per cent and re-enteries by bus, which amounted to 21,200 , were down 1,700 or approximately 7 per cent, However, 1,300 persons made the return trip by boat, a slight rise of 100 units or about 1 per cent over February 1961 and return crossings via plane advanced by 8,300 or nearly 28 per cent to 38,100 .

Cumulative re-entries of Canadian travellers by the above-mentioned forms of common carrier during the January-February period of 1962 showed an increase of 4,700 or 3 per cent compared with the same period of 1961. Canadians returning by rail numbered 38,800 , a decrease of 5,500 or between 12 and 13 per cent. Re-entries by bus, which totalled 44,300 , fell by 2,900 or just over 6 per cent and there were 2,000 return trips by boat, a decline of 300 or 13 per cent. However, there was a significant expansion of 13,400 or between 19 and 20 per cent in the number of Canadians returning by plane during the first two months of 1962, with a total of 82,000 re-entries compared with 68,600 in the same period of 1961.

## CLASSIFICATIONS USED IN THIS REPORT

"Commercial Vehicles" are trucks used for commercial purposes.
Highway Traffic not classified as commercial vehicles consists of automobiles, taxis, motorcycles, bicycles and trailers.

## Foreign Vehicles Invard

A traveller's vehiole permit is issued at the port of entry by Customs officers to every foreign vehicle entering Canada. This document authorizes the use of the vehicle during the intended length of stay in Canada and is surrendered when departing at the port of exit.

Residents of border communities who make many trips during the year are entitled to apply for a standing (L) traveller's vehicle permit. The operator of the vehicle covered by the standing ( L ) traveller's vehicle permit must show the document on each entry into Canada. All visits made after the original visit when the permit was issued are recorded as "Repeats" and entered under the appropriate heading. Persons holding this type of permit are usually familiar to port officials.

Permits showing entry into Canada and exit to the United States on the same day are entered in the first column with length of stay in Canada as 24 hours or less. The remainder of the travellers' vehicle permits (including the first trip of standing (L) permits) are recorded in the second column with length of stay as over 24 hours. Repeat trips of vehicles using standing ( L ) permits are recorded in the third column captioned "Repeats and Taxis". Taxis operate under a special permit and, therefore, are not included in columns 1 or 2.

## Canadian Vehicles Imward

Canadian vehicles returning to Canada are classified by length of stay, depending upon whether they are abroad for more or less than 24 hours.
