

TRAVEL BETWEEN CANADA AND THE UNITED STATES

MAY. 1962

1 - HIGHWAY TRAFFIC - MAY, 1962

Highway traffic entering Canada from the United States in May 1962 numbered 1,584,100 vehicles, a gain of 22,000 or between 1 and 2 per cent over May 1961. The total comprised 805,700 foreign vehicles and 778,400 Canadian vehicles returning to Canada. Cumulative entries for the period January - May 1962 amounted to 6,037,900, an increase of 64,100 units or about 1 per cent over the corresponding 1961 figure. The aggregate consisted of 2,771,500 foreign vehicles and 3,266,400 Canadian vehicles.

FOREIGN VEHICLES

Foreign vehicles crossing into Canada from the United States during May 1962 advanced by 44,300 units or nearly 6 per cent compared with May 1961. Those remaining 24 hours or less numbered 336,900, a gain of 28,400 or just over 9 per cent and vehicles remaining over 24 hours amounted to 223,900, a rise of 11,800 or between 5 and 6 per cent. Entries of "Repeats and Taxis" in May 1962 came to 203,100, some 3,100 or between 1 and 2 per cent more than in the previous May, and foreign commercial vehicles, which numbered 41,800, were up by approximately 3 per cent.

Gumulative entries of foreign vehicles in the first five months of 1962 recorded an advance of 70,700 units or between 2 and 3 per cent over the comparable 1961 volume. Non-resident vehicles remaining in Canada 24 hours or less numbered 1,156,400, marking a rise of 46,500 or just over 4 per cent and those staying over 24 hours amounted to 653,500, a gain of 30,000 or almost 5 per cent. Cumulative crossings of "Repeats and Taxis", which came to 755,800, were, however, down by 14,000 units or nearly 2 per cent. From January to May 1962, there were 205,800 entries of foreign commercial vehicles or an increase of roughly 4 per cent over corresponding 1961 data.

CANADIAN VEHICLES

Canadian vehicles returning from the United States in May 1962 declined by 22,300 units or slightly under 3 per cent compared with the May 1961 volume. Resident vehicles absent 24 hours or less numbered 625,100, a decrease of 13,300 units or about 2 per cent and those absent over 24 hours came to 103,100, a drop of 10,600 or just over 9 per cent. On the other hand, re-entries of Canadian commerical traffic in May 1962 amounted to 50,200 vehicles, representing a gain of approximately 3 per cent in comparison with the May 1961 volume.

Cumulative re-entries of Canadian vehicles during the first five months of 1962 were down by 6,600 units or less than one-half per cent in comparison with the same period of 1961. Resident vehicles absent 24 hours or less amounted to 2,615,700, an increase of 10,800 or about one-half per cent. However, those returning after being outside Canada for over 24 hours numbered 381,300, a substantial decline of 18,900 or close to 5 per cent. Cumulative re-entries of Canadian commercial vehicles came to 269,400, marking a slight rise of about one-half per cent over the January - May period of 1961.

11 - TRAFFIC BY RAIL, THROUGH BUS, BOAT AND PLANE - MAY 1962

During May 1962, there were 252,600 entries from the United States by rail, through bus, boat and plane, a gain of 38,400 or nearly 18 per cent over the May 1961 volume. Foreign travellers accounted for 141,200 of the total and there were 111,400 re-entries of Canadians. On a cumulative basis, entries for the period January - May 1962 reached 884,900, an increase of 59,900 or just over 7 per cent more than in the same period of 1961. The aggregate comprised 382,000 foreign entries and 502,900 returning Canadians.

FOREIGN TRAVELLERS

Entries of foreign travellers by rail, through bus, boat and plane in May 1962 advanced some 25,300 units or almost 22 per cent compared with May 1961. Rail travel accounted for 16,500 entries, a decrease of 2,700 or about 14 per cent while bus entries numbered 39,700, marking a gain of 3,100 or between 8 and 9 per cent. Non-residents arriving by plane in May 1962 amounted to 43,000, a rise of 2,700 units or between 6 and 7 per cent over the comparable 1961 total. At the same time, foreign entries by boat at 42,000 recorded a considerable gain of 22,200, and in all probability were influenced by the proximity of the World's Fair being held in Seattle, Washington on the West Coast of the United States.

Cumulative crossings of foreign travellers by rail, through bus, boat and plane for the period January - May 1962 were up by 27,100 or approximately 8 per cent in comparison with the first five months of 1961. Entries by rail came to 67,500, a decrease of 7,700 or roughly 10 per cent while arrivals by bus at 111,400 were 2,000 or around 2 per cent higher. Foreign crossings by plane numbered 158,200, a gain of 11,500 or 8 per cent over cumulative data for 1961, and entries by boat, which reached 44,900, advanced 21,300.

CANADIAN TRAVELLERS

Canadian travellers returning from the United States by rail, bus, boat and plane in May 1962 experienced an increase of 13,100 or just over 13 per cent in comparison with the previous May. Although re-entries by rail, which amounted to 17,800, fell by 500 units or between 2 and 3 per cent, re-entries by bus at 43,700, gained 4,800 or between 12 and 13 per cent. In addition, Canadians returning by plane in May 1962 numbered 44,100, marking a rise of 7,600 or between 20 and 21 per cent, and return trips by boat amounted to 5,800, an advance of 1,200 over May 1961.

Cumulative re-entries of Canadian travellers from the United States by rail, through bus, boat and plane during the first five months of 1962 registered enexpansion of 32,800 or 7 per cent in comparison with corresponding 1961 figures. Re-entries by rail numbered 101,200, a drop of 9,400 or between 8 and 9 per cent, while return trips by bus came to 157,300, a gain of 8,100 or between 5 and 6 per cent. Residents crossing from the United States by plane in the January - May period of 1962 amounted to 232,000, some 31,400 or between 15 and 16 per cent more than in the same period of 1961. Boat travel also showed a gain on a cumulative basis with 12,400 re-entries, amounting to an increase of 2,700 units.

CLASSIFICATIONS USED IN THIS REPORT

"Commercial Vehicles" are trucks used for commercial purposes.

Highway Traffic not classified as commercial vehicles consists of automobiles, taxis, motorcycles, bicycles and trailers.

Foreign Vehicles Inward

A traveller's vehicle permit is issued at the port of entry by Customs officers to every foreign vehicle entering Canada. This document authorizes the use of the vehicle during the intended length of stay in Canada and is surrendered when departing at the port of exit.

Residents of border communities who make many trips during the year are entitled to apply for a standing (L) traveller's vehicle permit. The operator of the vehicle covered by the standing (L) traveller's vehicle permit must show the document on each entry into Canada. All visits made after the original visit when the permit was issued are recorded as "Repeats" and entered under the appropriate heading. Persons holding this type of permit are usually familiar to port officials.

Permits showing entry into Canada and exit to the United States on the same day are entered in the first column with length of stay in Canada as 24 hours or less. The remainder of the travellers' vehicle permits (including the first trip of standing (L) permits) are recorded in the second column with length of stay as over 24 hours. Repeat trips of vehicles using standing (L) permits are recorded in the third column captioned "Repeats and Taxis". Taxis operate under a special permit and, therefore, are not included in columns 1 or 2.

Canadian Vehicles Inward

Canadian vehicles returning to Canada are classified by length of stay, depending upon whether they are abroad for more or less than 24 hours.
