## 1 - HIGHWAY TRAFFIC - AUGUST, 1962

Total vehicle entries into Canada during August 1962 numbered 2,711,800, an increase over the previous August of 69,800 vehicles or between 2 and 3 per cent. Foreign vehicles represented 1,694,200 of the total, while 1,017,600 were registered in Canada. Cumulative crossings for the period January - August 1962 amounted to $13,442,400$, marking a gain of 144,900 vehicles or approximately 1 per cent in comparison with comparable data for 1961. The aggregate of comulative traffic comprised 7,222,900 foreign vehicles and 6,219,500 Canadian.

## FOREIGN VEHICLES

The mumber of foreign vehicles entering. Canada in August 1962 increased by 150,800 or nearly 10 per cent compared with August 1961. Foreign vehicles remaining over 24 hours, which numbered 706,000, accounted for most of the increase as they advanced by 101,000 or close to 17 per cent. Entries remaining 24 hours or less amounted to 631,200 , a gain of 51,400 vehicles or roughly 9 per cent. However, there were slight decreases in the volume of "Repeats and Taxis" and foreign commercial vehicles. The former amounted to 314,300 vehicles in $\mathbb{E}$ ugust 1962, a decline of 1,500 or one-half per cent, while entries of the latter numbered 42,700 or about 100 fewer than in August 1961.

Cumulative entries of foreign vehicles in the first eight months of 1962 were up by 346,900 units or 5 per cent over corresponding 1961 data. Non-resident vehicles remaining 24 hours or less numbered 2,841,300, a gain of 161,300 or 6 per cent, and entries in the over 24 hours category amounted to $2,438,400$, a significant increase of 209,200 or between 9 and 10 per cent. Cumulative crossings of "Repeats and Taxis" for the period January - Augast 1962 came to 1,613,700, representing a decrease of 26,700 or between 1 and 2 per cent. On the other hand, crossings of foreign commercial vehicles at 329,500 , gained 3,100 or 1 per cent over the comparable volume during January - August 1961.

## CANADIAN VEHICLES

Re-entries of Canadian vehicles from the Onited States in August 1962 recorded a decrease of 81,000 or between 7 and 8 per cent in comparison with August 1961. Resident vehicles returning from visits of 24 hours or less amounted to 755,900 , a drop of 36,400 or between 4 and 5 per cent. At the same time, vehicles abroad over 24 hours numbered 209,900, a deciline of 38,800 units or between 15 and 16 per cent. Finally, the volume of Canadian commercial vehicles re-entering in August 1962 amounted to 51,800 , marking a reduction of 5,800 or 10 per cent from the comparable figure for August 1961.

On a cumulative basis, Canadian vehicies returning in the first eight. months of 1962 registered a deorease of 202,000 units or approximately 3 per cent. Re-entries abroad 24 hours or less numbered 4,898,400, a decline of 69,400 or between 1 and 2 per cent. In addition, resident vehicles absent over 24 hours amounted to 902,800 , some 117,100 or between 11 and 12 per cent below comparable 1961 data. Canadian comercial vehicles returning during the January -- August period of 1962 mumbered 418,300 , representing a drop of 15,500 or between 3 and 4 per cent compared with a similar period of 1961.

## 11 - TRAFFIC BI RAII, THROUGH BUS, BOAT AND PLANE - AUGUST, 1962

Total entries from the United States by rail, through bus, boat and plane in Angust 1962 numbered 564,700 and comprised 397,400 foreign travellers and 167,300 returning Canadians. This marked an increase of 80,100 entries or between 16 and 17 per cent over the corresponding Angust 1961 volume. Cumulative entries for the first eight months of 1962 amounted to $2,348,300$, a gain of 278,100 or between 13 and 14 per cent. Aggregate cumulative entries consisted of $1,414,500$ foreign travellers and 933,800 Canadian residents.

## FOREIGN TRAVELLERS

The volume of non-resident arrivals by rail, bus, boat and plane in August 1962 exceeded the comparable August 1961 total by 74,700 or 23 per cent. Entries by rail numbered 35,900 , representing an increase of 2,200 or between 6 and 7 per cent, while entries via plane at 60,000, signified a decline of 6,400 or close to 10 per cent. Foreign travellers orossing into Canada by through bus in August 1962 amounted to 84,500 , an expansion of 11,600 persons or 16 per cent and entries by boat advanced by 67,300 or 45 per cent to 217,000 . The rise in boat travel largely reflects increased traffic between Seattle and Victoria as a sideeffect of the World's Fair,while travel patterns for other forms of transportation may have been influenced by labour disputes in the United States.

Gunulative crossings of non-residents by rail, bus, boat and plane in the first eight months of 1962 registered a gain of 237,100 persons or 20 per cent over the comparable 1961 figure. Entries by rail numbered 179,800, an increase of 6,100 or between 3 and 4 per cent. Arrivals by bus amounted to 332,800 , an expansion of 26,600 travellers or almost 9 per cent and non-residents by boat numbered 569,100 , marking a rise of 196,700 visits or approximately 53 per cent. Cumulative entries by plane, which came to 332,800 , were up by 7,700 or between 2 and 3 per cent in comparison with the January - August period of 1961.

## CANADIAN TRAVELLERS

Canadians made 5,400 or slightly over 3 per cent more return trips from the United States by rail, through bus, boat and plane in August 1962 than in August 1961. Re-entries by rail, however, at 29,700, were down by 1,200 or 4 per cent. Residents returning by bus numbered 56,100 , a moderate increase of 200 persons or less than one-half per cent and re-entries by plane anounted to 39,600 , an advance of 600 or nearly 2 per cent. The most significant gain oocurred in boat travel which accounted for 41,900 returning residents, some 5,800 or 16 per cent more than in the previous August.

Cumulative re-entries of Canadian travellers from the Uhited States by rail, bus, boat and plane during the January to August period of 1962 exceeded the corresponding 1961 volume by 41,000 persons or between 4 and 5 per cent. Rail travel, which accounted for 176,500 of the trips, experienced a decrease of 10,600 or close to 6 per cent. On the other hand, re-entries by bus, which numbered 326,400 , represented a gain of 14,900 units or almost 5 per cent and return trips by plane at 340,700 , vere up by 31,200 or 10 per cent. In addition, cumulative re-entries of Canadian travellers by boat amounted to 90,200 , a gain of 5,500 or between 6 and 7 per cent compared with the first eight months of 1961.

## CLASSIF ICATIONS USED IN THIS REPORT

"Commercial Vehicles" are trucks used for commercial purposes.
Highway Traffic not classified as commercial vehicles consists of automobiles, taxis, motorcycles, bicycles and trailers.

## Foreign Vehicles Inward

A traveller's vehicle permit. is issued at the port of entry by Customs officers to every foreign vehicle entering Canada. This document authorizes the use of the vehicle during the intended length of stay in Canada and is surrendered when departing at the port of exit.

Residents of border communities who make many trips during the year are entitled to apply for a standing (L) traveller's vehicle permit. The operator of the vehicle covered by the standing (L) traveller's vehicle permit must show the document on each entry into Canada. All visits made after the original visit when the permit was issued are recorded as "Repeats" and entered under the aporopriate heading. Persons holding this type of permit are usually familiar to port officials.

Permits showing entry into Canada and exit to the United States on the same day are entered in the first column with length of stay in Canada as 24 hours or less. The remainder of the travellers' vehicle permits (including the first trip of standing ( L ) permits) are recorded in the second column with length of stay as over 24 hours. Repeat trips of vehicles using standing (L) permits are recorded in the third column captioned "Repeats and Taxis". Taxis operate under a special permit and, therefore, are not included in columns 1 or 2.

## Canadian Vehicles Inward

Canadian vehicles returning to Canada are classified by length of stay, depending upon whether they are abroad for more or less than 24 hours.
