

Estimates of the balance of payments on travel account between Canada and all other countries are shown above for the calendar years 1958-1961 inclusive, together with the preliminary estimates available for 1962.

Estimated receipts totalled about \$289 million in the third quarter of 1962 as compared with \$255 million in the same quarter of 1961. Preliminary estimates indicate that payments declined during the third quarter to \$200 million compared with \$220 million in 1961.

Cumulative data on preliminary estimates for the first nine months of 1962 show receipts amounting to \$458 million as compared with \$397 million for the same period of 1961. Payments totalled \$529 million compared to \$517 million in 1961.

The quarterly net balance amounted to a credit balance of \$89 million in the third quarter compared to \$35 million for this period of 1961. Estimates on the cumulative data for the first nine months indicate a net debit balance of \$71 million compared to \$120 million in the same period of 1961. In this period the deficit was entirely from transactions with overseas countries as there was a surplus with the United States for the first time in many years.

TRAVEL BETWEEN CANADA AND THE UNITED STATES SEPTEMBER, 1962

I - HIGHWAY TRAFFIC - SEPTEMBER, 1962

Aggregate entries of highway traffic into Canada from the United States in September 1962 amounted to 1,826,600 vehicles, a decline of 26,200 or between 1 and 2 per cent compared to the September 1961 volume. Fewer re-entries of Canadian vehicles, which numbered 841,000, accounted for most of the decrease, while non-resident vehicles amounted to 985,600. Cumulative entries for the period January-September 1962 were 15,269,000, a gain of 118,600 or almost 1 per cent from comparable 1961 data. Foreign vehicles represented 8,208,500 of the cumulative total and Canadian vehicles numbered 7,060,500.

FOREIGN VEHICLES

Entries of foreign vehicles during September 1962 experienced a slight decrease of 4,000 or about one-half per cent in comparison with the September 1961 volume. It is possible that part of this decrease may be due to unfavourable weather conditions in Ontario and Quebec affecting the number of vehicles remaining over 24 hours. The latter group amounted to 339,500 vehicles in September 1962, representing a decline of 9,900 or close to 3 per cent, while at the same time, foreign entries remaining 24 hours or less advanced by 10,800 or 3 per cent to 375,700. Non-resident vehicles classified as "Repeats and Taxis" amounted to 233,200, a decrease of 4,600 or roughly 2 per cent and foreign commercial vehicles numbered 37,200, a slight reduction of 300 or about 1 per cent from comparable data for September 1961.

Cumulative crossings of foreign vehicles in the first nine months of 1962 exceeded the corresponding volume in 1961 by 342,800 units or between 4 and 5 per cent. Entries remaining 24 hours or less amounted to 3,217,000, an increase of 172,100 or close to 6 per cent and vehicles staying over 24 hours numbered 2,777,800, marking a gain of 199,200 or approximately 8 per cent. Cumulative entries of "Repeats and Taxis", which came to 1,846,900, were about 31,300 or 2 per cent less than in the corresponding period of 1961, while 366,800 crossings of commercial vehicles represented a moderate gain of 2,800 or about 1 per cent.

CANADIAN VEHICLES

Canadian vehicles returning from the United States in September 1962 were down by 22,200 or between 2 and 3 per cent in comparison with the September 1961 volume. However, those absent 24 hours or less advanced by 4,100 or about one-half per cent to 657,200. Resident vehicles abroad over 24 hours numbered 136,500, a decrease of 20,600 or around 13 per cent and re-entries of commercial vehicles, which amounted to 47,300, declined by 5,700 or nearly 11 per cent from September 1961.

Cumulative re-entries of Canadian vehicles in the first nine months of 1962 experienced a decrease of 224,200 or roughly 3 per cent in comparison with the same period of 1961. Resident vehicles absent 24 hours or less numbered 5,555,600, a drop of 65,200 or approximately 1 per cent. Similarly, Canadian vehicles re-entering after trips lasting over 24 hours amounted to 1,039,300, a decline of 137,800 or close to 12 per cent. At the same time, cumulative re-entries of commercial vehicles reached 465,600, some 21,200 or between 4 and 5 per cent below the volume in the first nine months of 1961.

II - TRAFFIC BY RAIL, THROUGH BUS, BOAT AND PLANE - SEPTEMBER, 1962

The total volume of entries into Canada from the United States during September 1962 by rail, bus, boat and plane numbered 341,100, an expansion of 30,500 or nearly 10 per cent over the September 1961 figure. Aggregate crossings comprised 225,700 foreign travellers and 115,400 Canadians. Cumulative entries for the period January-September 1962 were 2,689,400, marking an increase of 308,600 or 13 per cent in comparison with corresponding 1961 data. Aggregate cumulative entries consisted of 1,640,200 foreign travellers and 1,049,200 Canadians.

FOREIGN TRAVELLERS

Foreign travellers arriving by rail, bus, boat and plane in September 1962 advanced by 28,800 or between 14 and 15 per cent compared with September 1961. Rail travellers at 20,500, showed a moderate rise of 100 or about 1 per cent and bus travellers, who numbered 52,400, were up by 8,300 or nearly 19 per cent. The most significant gain was in boat travel, which accounted for 103,400 entries, amounting to an increase of 28,900 or roughly 39 per cent. However, foreign entries by plane numbered 49,400, some 8,500 or approximately 15 per cent less than in September 1961. Increased boat travel was largely between Seattle and Victoria as a result of the World's Fair, while travel patterns for other forms of transportation may have been influenced by labour disputes in the United States.

Cumulative entries of non-residents by rail, bus, boat and plane in the first nine months of 1962 were up by 265,900 or just over 19 per cent in comparison with the same period of 1961. Entries by rail numbered 200,300, an increase of 6,200 or about 3 per cent and arrivals by bus at 385,200 represented a gain of 34,800 or around 10 per cent. Foreign travellers by boat amounted to 672,500 during January-September 1962, a substantial rise of 225,700 or between 50 and 51 per cent, while 382,200 entries by plane represented a slight decline of 800 persons or less than one-half per cent from the volume in January-September 1961.

CANADIAN TRAVELLERS

The number of Canadians returning from the United States by rail, bus, boat and plane in September 1962 advanced by 1,700 or between 1 and 2 per cent compared with the previous September. However, re-entries via rail at 20,100, declined by 1,200 or almost 6 per cent and bus travellers, who amounted to 39,800, were down by 500 or about 1 per cent. On the other hand, return trips by boat numbered 16,700, a gain of 1,200 or between 7 and 8 per cent, and Canadians returning by plane amounted to 38,800, an expansion of 2,200 or approximately 6 per cent more than in September 1961.

Cumulative re-entries of Canadian travellers by rail, bus, boat and plane during the first nine months of 1962 were up by 42,700 or around 4 per cent over the same months in 1961. The only decrease was noted in rail travel with 196,500 re-entries, a drop of 11,900 or close to 6 per cent. Residents re-entering by bus numbered 366,200, a gain of 14,500 or 4 per cent and persons returning by boat amounted to 107,000, a rise of 6,700 or between 6 and 7 per cent. In addition, cumulative re-entries by plane in the period January-September 1962, which came to 379,500, registered an advance of 33,400 or nearly 10 per cent over comparable 1961 data.

CLASSIFICATIONS USED IN THIS REPORT

"Commercial Vehicles" are trucks used for commercial purposes.

Highway Traffic not classified as commercial vehicles consists of automobiles, taxis, motorcycles, bicycles and trailers.

Foreign Vehicles Inward

A traveller's vehicle permit is issued at the port of entry by Customs officers to every foreign vehicle entering Canada. This document authorizes the use of the vehicle during the intended length of stay in Canada and is surrendered when departing at the port of exit.

Residents of border communities who make many trips during the year are entitled to apply for a standing (L) traveller's vehicle permit. The operator of the vehicle covered by the standing (L) traveller's vehicle permit must show the document on each entry into Canada. All visits made after the original visit when the permit was issued are recorded as "Repeats" and entered under the appropriate heading. Persons holding this type of permit are usually familiar to port officials.

Permits showing entry into Canada and exit to the United States on the same day are entered in the first column with length of stay in Canada as 24 hours or less. The remainder of the travellers' vehicle permits (including the first trip of standing (L) permits) are recorded in the second column with length of stay as over 24 hours. Repeat trips of vehicles using standing (L) permits are recorded in the third column captioned "Repeats and Taxis". Taxis operate under a special permit and, therefore, are not included in columns 1 or 2.

Canadian Vehicles Inward

Canadian vehicles returning to Canada are classified by length of stay, depending upon whether they are abroad for more or less than 24 hours.

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
