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## OCTOBER, 1963

## I - HIGHWAY TRAFFIC - OCTOBER, 1963

Total entries of highway traffic in October 1963 amounted to 1,573,900 vehicles, marking an increase of 159,600 or between 11 and 11.5 per cent, in comparison with the previous October. Both entries of foreign vehicles and re-entries of Canadian vehicles increased substantially. The former went up by 75,100 (or 11 per cent) to 755,300 , and the latter by 84,500 (or 11.5 per cent) to 818,600 . On a cumulative basis, aggregate entries for the first ten months of 1963 came to $17,178,300$, a rise of 479,900 or about 3 per cent compared to the same period of 1962. A breakdown of cumulative entries shows 9,084,200 foreign vehicles and 8,094,100 Canadian vehicles.

## FOREIGN VEHICLES

The rise in foreign vehicle entries in October 1963 was mainly the result of heavier short-term ( 24 hours or less) traffic, which increased by 46,300 or almost 18 per cent to 305,700 , and of increased "over 24 hours" crossings, which rose by 26,200 or almost 14 per cent to 216,500 . Entries of commercial vehicles, at 44,000 , advanced by 2,100 or 5 per cent. On the other hand, crossings classified as "Repeats and Taxis" showed little change, increasing by only 500 or less than one-half per cent to reach 189,100 .

Cumulative crossings of foreign vehicles in the first ten months of 1963 totalled 9,084,200 and were 195,600 or about 2 per cent greater than in the same period of 1962. Entries remaining 24 hours or less numbered 3,668,700, a rise of 192,300 or 5.5 per cent, and vehicles staying over 24 hours amounted to 3,140,700, marking a gain of 172,600 or between 5 and 6 per cent. Entries of commercial vehicles reached 420,400 , a gain of 11,800 or about 3 per cent. However, "Repeats and Taxis"at $1,854,400$ were some 181,100 or almost 9 per cent lower than the comparable 1962 volume.

## CANADIAN VEHICLES

In October 1963, resident vehicles abroad 24 hours or less numbered 639,500, marking an increase of 64,600 or between 11 and 12 per cent, and re-entries absent over 24 hours which amounted to 124,000 , rose by 17,000 or almost 16 per cent. In addition, there were 55,100 return crossings of Canadian commerical vehicles, which represented an increase of 2,900 or between 5 and 6 per cent over the October 1962 volume.

Cumulative re-entries of Canadian vehicles from the United States in the first ten months of 1963 were up by 284,300 or between 3 and 4 per cent over the volume during the corresponding period of 1962. Resident vehicles absent for 24 hours or less numbered 6,415,900, an increase of 285,400 or between 4 and 5 per cent and vehicles abroad over 24 hours came to $1,157,800$, some 11,600 or 1 per cent more. On the other hand, re-entries of commercial vehicles during the JanuaryOctober period, which numbered 520,400 , signified a drop of 12,700 or about 2.5 per cent in comparison with corresponding 1962 data.

II - TRAFFIC BY PLANE, THROUGH BUS, RAIL AND BOAT
Total entries by plane, through bus, rail and boat in October 1963 numbered 212,900 , marking an increase of 8,100 or about 4 per cent compared with the October 1962 volume. Aggregate crossings comprised 110,700 foreign travellers and 102,200 Canadians returning to Canada. Cumulative entries for the first ten months of 1963 amounted to $2,614,500$, a drop of 279,500 or between 9 and 10 per cent over the same period in 1962. Non-residents accounted for 1,525,100 of the cumulative total and Canadians represented 1,089,400.

## FOREIGN TRAVELLERS

In October 1963, there were 5,000 or between 4 and 5 per cent more crossings of foreign travellers into Canada by plane, through bus, rail and boat than in the same month of 1961. Increased travel by plane was largely responsible for this gain with 44,300 entries recorded, some 3,500 or between 8 and 9 per cent more than in the previous October. In addition, foreign arrivals by rail at 14,700 , advanced by 800 or between 5 and 6 per cent and those by boat rose by 1,200 or about 5.5 per cent to 22,800 . On the other hand, non-resident entries by bus declined some 500 or 2 per cent to 28,900 .

Cumulative entries of foreign travellers by plane, through bus, rail and boat in the first ten months of 1963 fell below the corresponding 1962 volume by 220,600 or about 12.5 per cent. Most of this decline was due to fewer arrivals by boat, which at 439,300 recorded a drop of 254,700 or between 36 and 37 per cent. Crossings by rail $(189,300)$ were also down and showed a decline of 24,900 or between 11 and 12 per cent from the 1962 figure. Intries by bus increased to 472,400, a rise of 57,800 or about 14 per cent while entries by plane showed relatively little change, increasing to 424,100 , a gain of 1,200 or less than one-half per cent.

## CANADIAN TRAVELLERS

The number of Canadian travellers returning by plane, bus, rail and boat in October 1963 recorded an increase of 3,100 persons or about 3 per cent over comparable 1962 data. Re-entries by plane numbered 44,500, a gain of 5,100 units or almost 13 per cent, and return trips by boat amounted to 5,800, an increase of 300 or 5 per cent. However, 32,000 Canadian residents returned by bus, a decline of 2,400 or about 7 per cent, while re-entries by rail were relatively stable at 19,900 , a rise of only 100 or 0.5 per cent.

On a cumulative basis, rementries of Canadian travellers from the United States by the four types of transportation in the January-October period of 1963 dropped by 58,900 or about 5 per cent below the same period of 1962. Bus travel recorded a substantial decline as there were 356,900 re-entries, 43,700 units or 11 per cent less than in January-October 1962. The number of Canadians returning by rail was also down; at 203,200 , it was 13,100 or 6 per cent lower. Re-entries by boat fell by 1,600 or about 1.5 per cent to reach 110,800 , while re-entries by plane remained relatively unchanged at 418,500 , a drop of only 500 or less than one-half per cent.

Travellers by bus and rail destined to Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island enter Canada through ports in other provinces and are recorded in the latter.

## CLASSIFICATIONS USED IN THIS REPORT

"Commercial Vehicles" are trucks used for commercial purposes.
Highway Traffic not classified as commercial vehicles consists of automobiles, taxis, motorcycles, bicycles and trailers.

## Foreign Vehicles Invard

A traveller's vehicle permit is issued at the port of entry by Customs officers to every foreign vehicle entering Canada. This document authorizes the use of the vehicle during the intended length of stay in Canada and is surrendered when departing at the port of exit.

Residents of border communities who make many trips during the year are entitled to apply for a standing (L) traveller's vehicle permit. The operator of the vehicle covered by the standing (L) traveller's. vehicle permit must show the document on each entry into Canada. All visits made after the original visit when the permit was issued are recorded as "Repeats" and entered under the appropriate heading. Persons holding this type of permit are usually familiar to port officials.

Permits showing entry into Canada and exit to the United States on the same day are entered in the first column with length of stay in Canada as 24 hours or less. The remainder of the travellers' vehicle permits (including the first trip of standing (L) permits) are recorded in the second column with length of atay as over 24 hours. Repeat trips of vehicles using standing ( $L$ ) permits are recorded in the third column captioned "Repeats and Taxis". Taxis operate under a special permit and, therefore, are not included in column 1 or 2.

## Canadian Vehicles Invard

Canadian vehicles retarning to Canada are classified by length of stay, depending upon whether they are abroad for more or less than 24 hours.
