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### TRAVEL BETWEEN CANADA AND THE UNITED STATES

### FEBRUARY - 1963

### I - HIGHWAY TRAFFIC - FEBRUARY, 1963

The volume of highway traffic entering Canada from the United States was only 1 per cent more in February 1963 than in the corresponding month of last year. Total border crossings into Canada numbered 937,500 compared with 927,600 in February 1962. Of this number, 408,100 were foreign vehicles while re-entries of Canadian vehicles amounted to 529,400. Cumulative crossings for the first two months of 1963 numbered 1,898,800, a decrease of 5,900 from the total recorded in 1962. Included in this total are 811,700 entries of foreign vehicles and 1,087,100 re-entries of Canadian vehicles.

### FOREIGN VEHICLES

Entries of foreign vehicles advanced some 11,400 units or almost 3 per cent when compared with the same month of 1962. Most of this increase occurred in the non-resident vehicles remaining 24 hours or less, which accounted for 168,800 of the aggregate, a gain of 13,800 or almost 9 per cent over February 1962. At the same time, there were 92,700 vehicles recorded in the over 24 hours category, representing an increase of 6,400 units, while commercial vehicle entries at 41,900 were up by 1,600 when compared with last February. On the other hand, "Repeats and Taxis", which numbered 104,700, were down 10,500 units or 9 per cent from February 1962.

On a cumulative basis, foreign vehicle crossings for the January-February period amounted to 811,700, an increase of 1,300 over the comparable 1962 volume. Non-resident vehicles remaining in Canada 24 hours or less numbered 333,000, a gain of 16,400 or slightly over 5 per cent. The number recorded staying over 24 hours amounted to 179,600, an increase of 10,900 or between 6 and 7 per cent, while commercial vehicles with a total of 85,600 are up some 3,700 over the 1962 figure. On the other hand, "Repeats and Taxis" which number 213,500 show a considerable decrease of 29,700 or 12 per cent from the previous year.

### CANADIAN VEHICLES

Canadian vehicles returning from the United States in February 1963 numbered 529,400, a slight decrease of 1,500 from the comparable figure for 1962. However, the 429,600 re-entries recorded in the 24 hours or less classification represent an increase of 11,700 units or almost 3 per cent more than the previous year. Vehicles abroad over 24 hours numbered 43,500, a drop of 5,100 or between 10 and 11 per cent, while re-entries of commercial vehicles amounted to 56,300, some 8,100 units less than in 1962.

Re-entries of Canadian vehicles for the first two months of 1963 totalled 1,087,100, a decrease of 7,200 units when compared with the comparable period of 1962. Although re-entries abroad 24 hours or less numbered 876,600 and represented an increase of 21,800 units or between 2 and 3 per cent, Canadian vehicles recorded in the over 24 hours category amounted to 91,300, a considerable decrease of 12,200 units or between 11 and 12 per cent. Commercial vehicle re-entries at 119,200 were also down and show a decrease of 16,800 or slightly over 12 per cent.

### II - TRAFFIC BY PLANE, THROUGH BUS, RAIL AND BOAT - FEBRUARY, 1963

Total entries into Canada from the United States by plane, through bus, rail and boat amounted to 131,400 in February 1963, representing a negligible difference from the 131,500 recorded in February 1962. The aggregate comprised 55,600 foreign travellers and 75,800 returning Canadians. Furthermore, in the first two months of 1963, total crossings amounted to 273,600, representing a decline of 4,300 or between 1 and 2 per cent from the comparable 1962 period. Some 112,900 were entries of non-residents, while Canadians returning accounted for 160,700.

### FOREIGN TRAVELLERS

The number of foreign travellers entering Canada by plane, through bus, rail and boat amounted to 55,600, an increase of 300 over the previous February. There was a substantial increase in plane traffic which recorded 27,100 entries, some 1,500 or 6 per cent more than last year. Bus travellers numbered 16,400, an increase of 400 or almost 3 per cent over February 1962. On the other hand, foreign entries by rail, approximately 11,800, declined by 1,400 or almost 11 per cent while boat travel with only 300 entries recorded was down considerably from last year's figure.

During the first two months of 1963 the number of foreign travellers entering Canada by the above-mentioned means of transportation totalled 112,900, representing an increase of 2,100 over the same period of 1962. A breakdown of entries by category show 56,900 by plane, an increase of 2,900 or between 5 and 6 per cent and 31,200 by bus, up some 1,600 or 5 per cent over January-February 1962. Entries by rail numbered 24,100, down 2,300 or almost 9 per cent while boat entries of 700 were 100 less than last year.

### CANADIAN TRAVELLERS

The 75,800 Canadians re-entering from the United States by plane, through bus, rail and boat in February 1963 represented a slight decline from the previous year. However, re-entries by bus, which amounted to 22,200, increased by 1,000 or almost 5 per cent over February 1962. Residents returning by plane numbered 37,900, down some 200, re-entries by rail amounted to 15,300, a decrease of roughly 300, while boat traffic at 400 was a considerable decline from the number recorded last February.

The cumulative figures for Canadian re-entries by plane, through bus, rail and boat, for the January-February period of 1963, show declines in all categories. Residents returning by plane numbered 80,100, a decrease of 1,900 or over 2 per cent while re-entries by bus at 43,700 were some 600 persons less than last year. Canadians returning by rail accounted for 35,900, a decrease of 2,900 and boat travellers at roughly 1,000 were down substantially from the comparable period of last year.

### CLASSIFICATIONS USED IN THIS REPORT

"Commercial Vehicles" are trucks used for commercial purposes.

Highway Traffic not classified as commercial vehicles consists of automobiles, taxis, motorcycles, bicycles and trailers.

### Foreign Vehicles Inward

A traveller's vehicle permit is issued at the port of entry by Customs officers to every foreign vehicle entering Canada. This document authorizes the use of the vehicle during the intended length of stay in Canada and is surrendered when departing at the port of exit.

Residents of border communities who make many trips during the year are entitled to apply for a standing (L) traveller's vehicle permit. The operator of the vehicle covered by the standing (L) traveller's vehicle permit must show the document on each entry into Canada. All visits made after the original visit when the permit was issued are recorded as "Repeats" and entered under the appropriate heading. Persons holding this type of permit are usually familiar to port officials.

Permits showing entry into Canada and exit to the United States on the same day are entered in the first column with length of stay in Canada as 24 hours or less. The remainder of the travellers' vehicle permits (including the first trip of standing (L) permits) are recorded in the second column with length of stay as over 24 hours. Repeat trips of vehicles using standing (L) permits are recorded in the third column captioned "Repeats and Taxis". Taxis operate under a special permit and, therefore, are not included in columns 1 or 2.

### Canadian Vehicles Inward

Canadian vehicles returning to Canada are classified by length of stay, depending upon whether they are abroad for more or less than 24 hours.
