MAY, 1963

## I - HIGHWAY TRAFFIC - MAY 1963

The total number of vehicles entering Canada from the United States during the month of May 1963 amounted to $1,610,700$, representing an increase of 26,600 or between 1 and 2 per cent over May 1962. Foreign vehicle entries accounted for 801,300 while re-entries of Canadian vehicles numbered 809,400 . Furthermore, the cumulative figure for the period January-May 1963, at 6,089,800, shows a gain of 36,700 or almost 1 per cent over the corresponding aggregate recorded last year. This number comprised 2,784,100 foreign and 3,305,700 Canadian vehicles.

## FOREIGN VEHICLES

During May 1963 entries of foreign vehicles into Canada from the United States show a decline of 4,400 or nearly 1 per cent from the figure for May 1962. Foreign vehicles in the 24 hours or less category numbered 344,200 , an increase of 7,300 or slightly over 2 per cent, while the 239,800 vehicles recorded staying over 24 hours in Canada represent a gain of 15,900 or 7 per cent over Nay 1962. On the other hand, entries of "Repeats and Taxis", at 177,100, are down 26,000 or almost 13 per cent from last May and commercial vehicles, some 40,200 , show a decline which amounts to 1,600 or 4 per cent.

The cumulative figure for entries of foreign vehicles in the January-My period of 1963 shows an increase of 12,600 or one-half per cent when compared with the first five months of 1962. Foreign vehicles remaining 24 hours or less numbered $1,216,500$, an increase of 60,100 or slightly over 5 per cent, while those staying over 24 hours in Canada amounted to 697,100 , a gain of 43,600 or between 6 and 7 per cent. However, the sizeable increase in these categories was off set considerably by "Repeats and Taxis"which accounted for 655,700 entries and marked a decrease of 100,100 or 13 per cent from the comparable figure for 1962. Foreign commercial vehicle entries during the five month period numbered 214,800, an increase of 9,000 or between 4 and 5 per cent over the data for 1962.

## CANADIAN VEHICLES

There was an increase of 31,000 or 4 per cent in the number of Canadian vehicles re-entering from the United States. in May 1963 compared with the May 1962 volume. This increase can be attributed to vehicles absent 24 hours or less which numbered 669,700, an increase of 44,600 or 7 per cent. On the other hand, 91,500 rementries were Canadian vehicles absent over 24 hours, a decrease of 11,600 or slightly over 11 per cent, while commercial vehicle re-entries at 48,200 represent a decline of roughly 2,000 or 4 per cent from the figure for May 1962.

During the first five months of 1963 re-entries of Canadian vehicles increased by 24,100 units or almost 1 per cent in comparison with the volume for the same period of 1962. Canadian vehicles absent 24 hours or less numbered 2,709,900, an increase of 94,200 or between 3 and 4 per cent, whereas those absent over 24 hours amounted to 335,300 , a decrease of 46,000 or 12 per cent from the aggregate for Jamury-May 1962. At the same time, re-entries of Canadian commercial vehicles,some 260,500 , were down by 24,100 units or between 8 and 9 per cent.

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\text { II - TRAFFIC BY PLANE, THROUGH BUS, RAIL AND BOAT - MAY, } 1963

Persons entering Canada from the United States by plane, through bus, rail and boat in May 1963 numbered 216,100 , a decrease of 37,400 or between 14 and 15 per cent from the volume recorded during May 1962. The total comprised 119,300 entries of non-residents and 96,800 re-entries of Canadians. During the period January-May 1963 the number of entries, some 830,300 , decreased by 55,700 or between 6 and 7 per cent from the total recorded in the first five months of 1962. Foreign travellers accounted for 367,900 of the entries while 462,400 were returning Canadians.

## FOREIGN TRAVELLERS

Non-residents entering Canada from the United States by plane, through bus, rail and boat during May 1963 registered a decrease of 22,500 entries or between 15 and 16 per cent compared to the number recorded in May 1962. However, this decrease can be largely attributed to the boat traffic which was greatly influenced last year by the World's Fair being held in Seattle, Washington. Plane entries numbered 40,600, a decrease of 2,400 or between 5 and 6 per cent,while bus arrivals at 44,600 recorded an increase of 4,900 or slightly over 12 per cent. Entries by rail amounted to 16,200,a decrease of 300 or between 1 and 2 per cent and border crossinge by boat at 17,900 were also down from the volume in May 1962.

During the period January-May 1963 fewer foreign travellers entered Canada by plane, through bus, rail and boat than in the corresponding period of 1962. The decrease amounted to 14,800 or almost 4 per cent. Plane entries accounted for 158,600, a negligible gain over last year, whereas arrivals by bus numbered 124,700, a substantial increase of 13,300 or nearly 12 per cent. Non-residents entering Canada via rail amounted to 64,300 , a decline of 3,200 or between 4 and 5 per cent, while the 20,300 arrivals by boat also represent a decline from the unusually large volume recorded during the January-May period of 1962.

## CANADIAN TRAVELLERS

The number of Canadians returning from the United States by plane, through bus, rail and boat in May 1963 declined by 14,900 or between 13 and 14 per cent from the number recorded in May 1962. Moreover, this decrease was the result of fewer re-entries by all forms of common carrier. Re-entries by plane numbered 41,100 , a decline of roughly 3,000 or between 6 and 7 per cent, residents returning by bus amounted to 35,700 , down some 8,000 or slightly over 18 per cent, while re-entries by rail accounted for 17,000 , a decrease of approximately 800 or between 4 and 5 per cent. In addition, approximately 3,000 Canadians returned from the United States via boat in May 1963.

The cumuiative figure of Canadian re-entries from the United States by plane, through bus, rail and boat for the first five months of 1963 registers a considerable decrease of 40,900 or 8 per cent from the comparable total for 1962. There were approximately 221,500 re-entries by plane,a decrease of 10,400 or between 4 and 5 per cent, 140,800 by bus, a decline of 16,500 or between 10 and 11 per cent and roughly 94,100 re-entries by rail, some 7,100 or 7 per cent lower than the JanuaryMay volume in 1962. Furthermore, there were 6,000 residents who re-entered Canada from the United States by boat during the first five months of 1963.

## CLASSIFICATIONS USED IN THIS REPORT

"Commercial Vehicles" are trucks used for commercial purposes.
Highway Traffic not classified as commercial vehicles consists of automobiles, taxis, motorcycles, bicycles and trailers.

## Foreign Vehicles Inward

A traveller's vehicle permit is issued at the port of entry by Customs officers to every foreign vehicle entering Canada. This document authorizes the use of the vehicle during the intended length of stay in Canada and is surrendered when departing at the port of exit.

Residents of border communities who make many trips during the year are entitled to apply for a standing (L) traveller's vehicle permit. The operator of the vehicle covered by the standing ( L ) traveller's vehicle permit must show the document on each entry into Canada. All visits made after the original visit when the permit was issued are recorded as "Repeats" and entered under the appropriate heading. Persons holding this type of permit are usually familiar to port officials.

Permits showing entry into Canada and exit to the United States on the same day are entered in the first column with length of stay in Canada as 24 hours or less. The remainder of the travellers' vehicle permits (including the first trip of standing (L) permits) are recorded in the second column with length of stay as over 24 hours. Repeat trips of vehicles using standing (L) permits are recorded in the third column captioned "Repeats and Taxis". Taxis operate under a special permit and, therefore, are not included in columns 1 or 2.

## Canadian Vehicles Imward

Canadian vehicles returning to Canada are classified by length of stay, depending upon whether they are abroad for more or less than 24 hours.
