

CLASSIFICATIONS USED IN THIS REPORT

"Commercial Vehicles" are trucks used for commercial purposes.

Highway Traffic not classified as commercial vehicles consists of automobiles, taxis, motorcycles, bicycles and trailers.

FOREIGN VEHICLES INWARD

A traveller's vehicle permit is issued at the port of entry by Customs officers to every foreign vehicle entering Canada. This document authorizes the use of the vehicle during the intended length of stay in Canada and is surrendered when departing at the port of exit.

Residents of border communities who make many trips during the year are entitled to apply for a standing (L) traveller's vehicle permit. The operator of the vehicle covered by the standing (L) traveller's vehicle permit must show the document on each entry into Canada. All visits made after the original visit when the permit was issued are recorded as "Repeats" and entered under the appropriate heading.

Permits covering vehicles with one or more nights stay in Canada (including the first trip of standing (L) permits) are recorded in the first column. Permits covering vehicles entering and leaving Canada on the same day are recorded in the second column. Repeat trips of vehicles using standing (L) permits are recorded in the third column captioned "Repeats and taxis". Taxis are not included in columns 1 or 2.

CANADIAN VEHICLES INWARD

Canadian vehicles returning to Canada are classified by length of stay, depending upon whether they leave Canada and return on the same day; spend one or more nights abroad.

Non-resident Vehicles Entering Canada

Entries of foreign vehicles into Canada during November 1964 totalled 612,500 as compared with 592,200 in the same month of 1963, an increase of 20,300 or 3.4 per cent. Vehicles in Canada for one or more nights amounted to 160,600, a gain of 7,700 or 5 per cent. Vehicles entering and leaving the same day numbered 264,800, 17,000 or 6.9 per cent more than in November of last year, while entries of commercial vehicles, at 39,400, represented an advance of 600 or 1.5 per cent in comparison with November 1963. On the other hand, repeats and taxis dropped by 5,000 or 3.3 per cent to 147,700.

On a cumulative basis, aggregate entries of foreign vehicles from the United States for the period January - November 1964 numbered 10,140,000, representing a gain of 463,700 or 4.8 per cent over the same period of 1963. Entries of vehicles staying one or more nights totalled 3,594,000, an encrement of 300,500 or 9.1 per cent. Vehicles entering and leaving the same day advanced to 4,117,300, a gain of 200,800 or 5.1 per cent in comparison with the corresponding 1963 period. On the other hand, entries of repeats and taxis dropped by 22,900 or 1.1 per cent to 1,984,200 while the number of commercial vehicles (444,500) represented a decline of 14,700 or 3.2 per cent from the January - November 1963 period.

Non-immigrants Entering Canada by Plane, Through Bus, Rail, and Boat

During November 1964, the number of foreign travellers from the United States which entered Canada by plane, bus, rail, and boat numbered 76,500. This represents a gain of 8,100 or 11.8 per cent over the same month of 1963. Entries by plane increased by 5,800 or 18.1 per cent to 37,900 while arrivals by long-distance bus totalled 24,100, an advance of 3,200 or 15.3 per cent. The number of entries by rail rose to 12,500, some 800 or 6.8 per cent more than in November 1963. Boat traffic showed a decline, however, as entries in this category dropped by 1,700 to 2,000.

On a cumulative basis, the number of entries arriving by plane, through būs, rail, and boat for the period January - November 1964 rose to 1,758,200, a gain of 100,000 or 6 per cent over the corresponding period in 1963. Entries by plane increased by 59,700 to 515,900, a gain of 13.1 per cent while arrivals by long-distance bus totalled 529,500, an increase of 36,200 or 7.3 per cent over the same period of last year. Rail travellers advanced from 201,100 to 220,900, an increase of 19,800 or close to 10 per cent, but cumulative entries by boat decreased to 491,900, a drop of 15,700 or 3.1... per cent in comparison with the same period of 1963.

Canadian Vehicles Returning to Canada

Canadian vehicles re-entering Canada from the United States during November 1964 numbered 682,900, an advance of 26,800 or 4.1 per cent over November 1963. Re-entries of vehicles out of Canada for one or more nights totalled 79,600, an increase of 7,400 or 10.2 per cent while vehicles leaving and returning the same day amounted to 553,100 as compared with 535,200 in November 1963, a gain of 17,900 or 3.3 per cent. Re-entries of commercial vehicles totalled 50,200, some 1,500 or 3.1 per cent more than in the same month of 1963.

Cumulative data for the period January - November 1964, show that aggregate re-entries of Canadian vehicles amounted to 9,405,900 as compared to 8,750,200 in 1963, an increase of 655,700 for the period or between 7 and 8 per cent. The number of Canadian vehicles returning to Canada after one or more nights in the United States rose from 1,230,000 to 1,357,200, a gain of 10.3 per cent. Vehicles leaving and returning the same day totalled 7,440,300 as compared with 6,951,100 in the same period of 1963. This represents an increase of 489,200 or 7 per cent. Re-entries of commercial vehicles amounting to 608,400, were some 39,300 or nearly 7 per cent more than in the corresponding period of 1963.

Residents of Canada Returning by Plane, Through Bus, Rail, and Boat

Residents of Canada returning from the United States by plane, through bus, rail, and boat in November 1964 numbered 80,400, which represents an increase of 2,700 or between 3 and 4 per cent over November 1963. Some 40,300 persons returned by plane, an increase of 2,600 or almost 7 per cent while re-entries by long-distance bus advanced by 1,000 or 4.5 per cent to 23,300. Persons returning by rail amounted to 14,500, some 600 or 4 per cent below the corresponding figure for 1963. Boat traffic also showed a decline, as re-entries in this category decreased from 2,600 to 2,300, a drop of 11.5 per cent.

Re-entries of Canadians travelling by plane, through bus, rail, and boat in the first eleven months of 1964 numbered 1,284,100, an increase of 116,900 or 10 per cent over the same period of 1963. Canadians making the return trip by plane amounted to 506,700 whereas the figure recorded for the same period of 1963 was 456,300. Some 426,500 persons returned by long distance bus, a gain of 47,300 or 12.5 per cent over the corresponding period of 1963. Re-entries by rail, at 237,100, were some 18,800 or 8.6 per cent over similar data for 1963 while the number of persons returning by boat stood at 113,800, a slight increase of 400 or 0.4 per cent over the same period of 1963.
