
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TRAVEL BETWEEN CANADA AND THE UNITED STATES

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CLASSIFICATIONS USED IN THIS REPORT

"Commercial Vehicles" are trucks used for commercial purposes.

Highway Traffic not classified as commercial vehicles consists of automobiles, taxis, motorcycles, bicycles and trailers.

FOREIGN VEHICLES INWARD

A traveller's vehicle permit is issued at the port of entry by Customs officers to every foreign vehicle entering Canada. This document authorizes the use of the vehicle during the intended length of stay in Canada and is surrendered when departing at the port of exit.

Residents of border communities who make many trips during the year are entitled to apply for a standing (L) traveller's vehicle permit. The operator of the vehicle covered by the standing (L) traveller's vehicle permit must show the document on each entry into Canada. All visits made after the original visit when the permit was issued are recorded as "Repeats" and entered under the appropriate heading.

Permits covering vehicles with one or more nights stay in Canada (including the first trip of standing (L) permits) are recorded in the first column. Permits covering vehicles entering and leaving Canada on the same day are recorded in the second column. Repeat trips of vehicles using standing (L) permits are recorded in the third column captioned "Repeats and taxis". Taxis are not included in columns 1 or 2.

CANADIAN VEHICLES INWARD

Canadian vehicles returning to Canada are classified by length of stay, depending upon whether they leave Canada and return on the same day; spend one or more nights abroad.

Non-resident Vehicles Entering Canada

Total foreign vehicles entering Canada from the United States in March 1964 rose to 531,000, some 19,000 or between 3 and 4 per cent more than in the same month of 1963. Vehicles in Canada for one or more nights amounted to 131,100, a gain of 12,400 or about 10.5 per cent. Vehicles entering and leaving on the same day numbered 239,300, an increase of 7,200 or 3 per cent over March 1963. Repeats and taxis amounted to 120,800, a gain of 6,300 or 5.5 per cent over the same month of 1963. On the other hand, entries of commercial vehicles registered a decline, decreasing by 6,900 or almost 15 per cent to 39,800.

Cumulatively, aggregate entries of foreign vehicles from the United States for the January-March period of 1964 totalled 1,457,400, which represents a rise of 133,800 or 10 per cent over the corresponding period of 1963. Most of this increase was registered in the "One or more nights in Canada" category and in the "Entering and leaving same day" category. The former rose by 50,600 or 17 per cent to 348,800 and the latter by 83,100 or between 14 and 15 per cent to 648,200. Repeats and taxis also increased, rising from 328,000 to 340,400, a gain of 12,400 or almost 4 per cent. Commercial vehicle entries, at 120,000, showed a decline of 12,300 or between 9 and 10 per cent from comparable 1963 data.

Non-immigrants Entering Canada by Plane, Through Bus, Rail, and Boat

In March 1964, 66,600 foreign travellers entered Canada by plane, through bus, rail, and boat. This was 7,200 or 12 per cent more than in March 1963. Arrivals by plane rose to 32,900, some 3,600 or between 12 and 13 per cent over the corresponding month of 1963. Entries by long distance bus advanced from 18,800 to 19,700, an increase of 900 or close to 5 per cent, while entries by rail rose by 2,800 to 13,700, a gain of about 25.5 per cent. On the other hand, the 300 arrivals by boat during March 1964 was a decline of 100 from the comparative figure for 1963.

On a cumulative basis, the number of entries for the first three months of 1964 rose to 207,900, which represents a gain of 35,700 or between 20 and 21 per cent over the corresponding period of 1963. Substantial gains are shown for all types of transportation. Entries by plane advanced some 12,500 (or 14.5 per cent) to 98,700, bus arrivals show a gain of 12,200 (or 24.4 per cent) to 62,100, while rail travellers increased by 10,300 (or about 29.5 per cent) to 45,300. Entries by boat, at 1,800, represent a gain of 700 over 1963 data.

Canadian Vehicles Returning to Canada

Canadian vehicles returning to Canada from the United States in March 1964 numbered 742,200, an increase of 93,100 or between 14 and 15 per cent over March 1963. There was a substantial increase in Canadian vehicles returning after one or more nights in the United States: such re-entries rose by 26,300 or about 45 per cent to reach 84,500. Vehicles leaving and returning to Canada on the same day amounted to 605,900, some 63,100 or about 11.5 per cent more than in the corresponding month of 1963. Re-entries of commercial vehicles, at 51,800, recorded an increase of 3,700 or between 7 and 8 per cent.

Cumulative figures for the January-March period of 1964 show that re-entries amounted to 2,004,400, which constituted an increase of 268,100 or about 15.5 per cent over the same period of 1963. Vehicles returning to Canada after one or more nights in the United States totalled 190,300; this was 41,300 or approximately 27.5 per cent over 1963 data. Canadian vehicles leaving and returning on the same day numbered 1,626,600, a gain of 207,200 or some 14.5 per cent. Reentries of commercial vehicles, at 187,000, were some 19,600 or between 11 and 12 per cent more than in the same period of 1963.

Residents of Canada Returning by Plane, Through Bus, Rail, and Boat

Canadian residents returning from the United States by plane, through bus, rail, and boat in March 1964 totalled 110,000. This was an increase of 17,400 or nearly 19 per cent over March 1963. Residents returning by plane amounted to 50,300, 1,100 or between 2 and 3 per cent more than in March 1963. Canadians returning by bus totalled 35,400, a gain of 9,700 or almost 38 per cent, while those returning by rail numbered 23,800, an advance of 6,900 or about 41 per cent. On the other hand, re-entries by boat, some 500, recorded a decrease of 300 from the figure for March 1963.

On a cumulative basis, Canadian residents returning from the United States by plane, through bus, rail, and boat in the January-March period of 1964 numbered 305,300, a 52,000 or 20.5 per cent increase over the corresponding period of 1963. Residents making the return trip by plane totalled 141,600, a gain of 12,300 or 9.5 per cent. Re-entries by bus, at 92,200, were some 22,800 or 33 per cent over corresponding data for 1963. Canadians returning by rail amounted to 68,200, a rise of 15,400 or about 29 per cent. Furthermore, 3,300 persons re-entered Canada by boat, some 1,500 more than in the corresponding period of 1963.
