
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TRAVEL BETWEEN CANADA AND THE UNITED STATES

APRIL 1964



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CLASSIFICATIONS USED IN THIS REPORT

"Commercial Vehicles" are trucks used for commercial purposes.

Highway Traffic not classified as commercial vehicles consists of automobiles, taxis, motorcycles, bicycles and trailers.

FOREIGN VEHICLES INWARD

A traveller's vehicle permit is issued at the port of entry by Customs officers to every foreign vehicle entering Canada. This document authorizes the use of the vehicle during the intended length of stay in Canada and is surrendered when departing at the port of exit.

Residents of border communities who make many trips during the year are entitled to apply for a standing (L) traveller's vehicle permit. The operator of the vehicle covered by the standing (L) traveller's vehicle permit must show the document on each entry into Canada. All visits made after the original visit when the permit was issued are recorded as "Repeats" and entered under the appropriate heading.

Permits covering vehicles with one or more nights stay in Canada (including the first trip of standing (L) permits) are recorded in the first column. Permits covering vehicles entering and leaving Canada on the same day are recorded in the second column. Repeat trips of vehicles using standing (L) permits are recorded in the third column captioned "Repeats and taxis". Taxis are not included in columns 1 or 2.

CANADIAN VEHICLES INWARD

Canadian vehicles returning to Canada are classified by length of stay, depending upon whether they leave Canada and return on the same day; spend one or more nights abroad.

Non-resident Vehicles Entering Canada

Entries of foreign vehicles into Canada during April 1964 totalled 643,800 as compared with 659,300 in the corresponding month of 1963, a decrease of 15,500 or 2.4 per cent. Vehicles in Canada for one or more nights totalled 161,300, a gain of 2,200 or 1.4 per cent. This was the only category to show an increase over the same month of 1963. Vehicles entering and leaving on the same day numbered 301,600 in comparison to 307,200 in April 1963, a decline of 5,600 or 1.8 per cent. Repeats and taxis amounted to 140,400, a decrease of 10,200 or 6.8 per cent. The number of commercial vehicles (40,500) also registered a decline which amounted to 1,900 or 4.5 per cent.

Cumulative data on the aggregate for the period of January-April, inclusive, show a total of 2,101,200 as compared with 1,982,900 in the same period of 1963, an increase of 118,300 entries or 6 per cent. On a percentage basis, the gain was more pronounced in the group staying one or more nights in Canada. Entries in this category totalled 510,000 for the period, a gain of 52,700 or 11.5 per cent. Vehicles entering and leaving on the same day advanced to 949,800, a gain of 77,500 or 8.9 per cent over the 872,300 in the same period of 1963. Entries of repeats and taxis showed little change from the previous year as the gain amounted to 2,200 or 0.5 per cent. On a cumulative basis, commercial vehicles totalled 160,600 as compared with 174,700 in the first four months of 1963, a decrease of 14,100 or 8.1 per cent. This was the only category to record a decline in cumulative data.

Non-immigrants Entering Canada by Plane, Through Bus, Rail, and Boat

Foreign travellers entering Canada by plane, through bus, rail, and boat totalled 79,400 in April in comparison with 76,300 in the corresponding month of 1963, a gain of 3,100 or 4.1 per cent. Arrivals by plane numbered 35,400, some 3,600 or 11.3 per cent over the same month of 1963. Entries by long distance bus amounted to 30,500 as compared with 30,100 in the same month of 1963, a gain of 400 or 1.3 per cent. On the other hand, non-immigrants arriving by rail totalled 12,400, some 700 or 5.3 per cent fewer than in April 1963. Some 1,100 entries by boat were recorded, a decline of 200 when compared with the previous year.

Cumulative data for the first four months show an aggregate of 287,300 entering by plane, through bus, rail, and boat. This compares with 248,700 in the same period of 1963, an increase of 38,600 or between 15 and 16 per cent. Substantial gains were recorded for each of the four types of transportation. Entries by plane during the period amounted to 134,000, some 15,900 or between 13 and 14 per cent higher than the corresponding period of 1963. About 92,700 visitors entered by long distance bus during the period which constitutes an increase of 12,600 or 15.7 per cent. Entries by rail at 57,700 showed an increase of 9,600 which percentagewise amounted to a substantial gain of 20 per cent. Although boat traffic is relatively not so important during the early months of the year, cumulative entries recorded were 2,900, some 500 higher than the corresponding period of 1963.

Canadian Vehicles Returning to Canada

Canadian vehicles re-entering Canada from the United States during April 1964 numbered 747,200, a decrease of 12,800 during the month or nearly 2 per cent when compared with the same month of 1963. Reentries of vehicles out of Canada for one or more nights totalled 80,500, a decline of 13,800 or 14.6 per cent. Vehicles leaving and returning on the same day amounted to 620,200 as compared with 620,800 in April 1963, a decrease of some 600 or 0.1 per cent. Commercial vehicles was the only category to record an increase which stood at 1,600 or 3.6 per cent.

Cumulative data for the period of January-April, inclusive, show that aggregate re-entries of Canadian vehicles amounted to 2,751,600 as compared to 2,496,200 in 1963, an increase of 255,400 for the period or 10.2 per cent. Re-entries of vehicles out of Canada for one or more nights totalled 271,300, a gain of 27,500 or 11.3 per cent. Vehicles leaving and returning on the same day during the period amounted to 2,246,800 as compared to 2,040,100 in 1963, an increase of 206,700 or 10.1 per cent. The volume of commercial vehicle traffic was also higher in 1964. Comparative data show 233,500 in 1964 and 212,300 in 1963, a gain of 21,200 or 10 per cent.

Residents of Canada Returning by Plane, Through Bus, Rail, and Boat

The aggregate of Canadian residents returning from the United States by plane, through bus, rail, and boat totalled 106,200 in April as compared with 112,400 in the corresponding month of 1963. This represents a decline of 6,200 or between 5 and 6 per cent from corresponding data for 1963. Some 51,200 persons returned by plane which is comparable with the number reported in 1963. Re-entries by long-distance bus totalled 32,600, a decrease of 3,100 or 8.7 per cent from the volume recorded in April of the previous year. Persons returning by rail amounted to 20,300, some 4,000 or between 16 and 17 per cent below the corresponding figure for 1963. Boat traffic was the only category to show an increase when the gain in re-entries over the previous year stood at 900.

Re-entries of Canadians travelling by plane, through bus, rail, and boat in the first four months of 1964 numbered 411,500, an increase of 45,900 or 12.6 per cent over the same period of 1963. Residents making the return trip by plane totalled 192,800 whereas the figure recorded for the same period of 1963 was 180,400. Re-entries by bus at 124,800 were 19,700 or 18.7 per cent above corresponding data for 1963. Some 88,500 persons returned by rail, a gain of 11,400 or 14.8 per cent, while reentries by boat at 5,400 were some 2,400 above the 1963 data.
