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CLASSIFICATIONS USED IN THIS REPORT

"Commercial Vehicles" are trucks used for commercial purposes.

Highway Traffic not classified as commercial vehicles consists of automobiles, taxis, motorcycles, bicycles and trailers.

FOREIGN VEHICLES INWARD

A traveller's vehicle permit is issued at the port of entry by Customs officers to every foreign vehicle entering Canada. This document authorizes the use of the vehicle during the intended length of stay in Canada and is surrendered when departing at the port of exit.

Residents of border communities who make many trips during the year are entitled to apply for a standing (L) traveller's vehicle permit. The operator of the vehicle covered by the standing (L) traveller's vehicle permit must show the document on each entry into Canada. All visits made after the original visit when the permit was issued are recorded as "Repeats" and entered under the appropriate heading.

Permits covering vehicles with one or more nights stay in Canada (including the first trip of standing (L) permits) are recorded in the first column. Permits covering vehicles entering and leaving Canada on the same day are recorded in the second column. Repeat trips of vehicles using standing (L) permits are recorded in the third column captioned "Repeats and taxis". Taxis are not included in columns 1 or 2.

CANADIAN VEHICLES INWARD

Canadian vehicles returning to Canada are classified by length of stay, depending upon whether they leave Canada and return on the same day; spend one or more nights abroad.

Non-resident Vehicles Entering Canada

Entries of non-resident vehicles from the United States in September 1964 totalled 1,054,500, an advance of 117,400 or 12.5 per cent over September 1963. Vehicles staying in Canada for one or more nights, amounting to 402,900, represented a substantial increase of 71,700 or 21.7 per cent. Vehicles entering and leaving on the same day numbered 401,500, a gain of 41,200 or 11.4 per cent over September 1963. Repeats and taxis rose by 2,800 or 1.4 per cent to 210,100 while entries of commercial vehicles also showed a gain, increasing by 1,700 or 4.4 per cent to 40,000.

On a cumulative basis, aggregate entries of foreign vehicles from the United States for the January-September period of 1964 amounted to 8,758,000, which represents an increase of 429,200 or 5.2 per cent over the corresponding period of 1963. Increases were registered in the "one or more nights in Canada" category and in the "entering and leaving the same day" category. The former rose by 243,700 or 8.3 per cent to 3,167,800 and the latter by 201,600 or 6.0 per cent to 3,564,600. Aggregate entries of repeats and taxis, at 1,661,100, represented a slight decrease of 4,100 or 0.3 per cent while the number of commercial vehicles, amounting to 364,500, represented a drop of 12,000 or 3.2 per cent in comparison with the same period in 1963.

Non-immigrants Entering Canada by Plane, Through Bus, Rail, and Boat

The total number of foreign travellers entering Canada from the United States by plane, through bus, rail, and boat during September 1964, amounted to 200,400. This represents an increase of 12,700 or 6.8 per cent over the same month of 1963. Arrivals by plane stood at 55,700, an increase of 6,700 or 13.7 per cent while entries of non-immigrants by long-distance bus rose by 8,800 or 17.5 per cent to 59,200. Entries by rail, amounting to 21,300, represented an increase of 3,900 or 22.4 per cent in comparison with September 1963. Boat traffic was the only category to show a decrease as the number of boat arrivals dropped by 6,700 or 9.4 per cent to 64,200.

The number of foreign travellers entering Canada from the United States by plane, through bus, rail, and boat in the first three quarters of 1964 amounted to 1,573,100. This marks an increase of 94,100 or 6.4 per cent over the corresponding period in 1963. Arrivals by plane advanced by 52,000 or 13.7 per cent to 431,700 while entries by long-distance bus numbered 470,500, a gain of 26,900 or 6.1 per cent over the same period of last year. Rail travellers advanced by 17,300 or 9.9 per cent to 191,900 but cumulative entries by boat decreased to 479,000, a slight drop of 2,100 or 0.4 per cent in comparison with the first nine months of 1963.

Canadian Vehicles Returning to Canada

Canadian vehicles returning to Canada from the United States in September 1964, numbered 898,500 an increase of 26,400 or 3.0 per cent in comparison with September 1963. Canadian vehicles returning after one or more nights in the United States totalled 152,900, representing a gain of 11,400 or 8.1 per cent. Vehicles leaving and returning on the same day amounted to 690,300 as compared with 680,600 in September 1963, a moderate increase of 1.4 per cent. Re-entries of commercial vehicles rose by 5,300 or 10.6 per cent to 55,300.

On a cumulative basis, re-entries of Canadian vehicles from the United States for the January-September 1964 period stood at 7,879,100, 603,600 or 8.3 per cent more than in the same period of 1963. Canadian vehicles returning to Canada after one or more nights in the United States rose from 1,033,800 to 1,150,100, an advance of 11.2 per cent. The number of vehicles leaving and returning the same day amounted to 6,228,100, marking an increase of 451,700 or 7.8 per cent over the same period of 1963. Furthermore, there were 500,900 re-entries of commercial vehicles, 35,600 or 7.7 per cent more than in the first three quarters of 1963.

Residents of Canada Returning by Plane, Through Bus, Rail, and Boat

Residents of Canada returning from the United States by plane, through bus, rail, and boat in September 1964, numbered 114,900, as compared with 109,200 in September 1963. This marks an increase of 5,700 or 5.2 per cent. Some 46,300 persons returned by plane, an increase of 5,700 or 14.0 per cent over the same month of 1963. Residents returning by long-distance bus amounted to 35,800, a drop of 500 or 1.4 per cent, while Canadian residents returning by rail rose from 19,200 to 20,100, a gain of 900 or 4.7 per cent. Re-entries by boat came to 12,700, a decrease of 400 or 3.1 per cent over the corresponding month of 1963.

On a cumulative basis, there were 1,092,900 Canadian residents returning from the United States by plane, through bus, rail, and boat in the first nine months of 1964. This was 105,600 or 10.7 per cent more than in the same period of 1963. Residents returning by plane numbered 415,000, 41,000 or 11.0 per cent more than in the first three quarters of 1963. Some 369,300 persons were recorded as returning by long-distance bus, a substantial increase of 44,400 or 13.7 per cent. Re-entries by rail, at 201,200, were some 17,900 or 9.8 per cent over corresponding data for 1963, while the number of persons returning by boat, amounting to 107,400, represented a gain of 2,300 or 2.2 per cent in comparison with the same period in 1963.
