



TRAVEL BETWEEN CANADA AND THE UNITED STATES

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Publication is made possible through the co-operation of Customs and Immigration Officials across Canada "Commercial Vehicles" are trucks used for commercial purposes.

Highway Traffic not classified as commercial vehicles consists of automobiles, taxis, motorcycles, bicycles and trailers.

Automobile traffic is classified according to length of stay. The dates of entry and exit on the travellers' vehicle permits make it possible to determine the length of stay for foreign vehicles. Non-resident vehicles which enter and leave Canada on the same day are shown separately. Vehicles spending one or more nights in Canada constitute another classification. For example, vehicles entering at any time during one day and departing some time the following day have spent one night in Canada.

The length of stay abroad for Canadian vehicles is classified in the same manner. Vehicles which depart and return to Canada on the same day are shown separately. The other classification includes vehicles spending one or more nights in the United States.

FOREIGN VEHICLES INWARD

A traveller's vehicle permit is issued at the port of entry by Customs officers to every foreign vehicle entering Canada. This document authorizes the use of the vehicle during the intended length of stay in Canada and must be surrendered at the port of exit on departure.

Residents of border communities who make many trips during the year are entitled to apply for a standing (L) traveller's vehicle permit. The operator of the vehicle covered by the standing (L) traveller's vehicle permit must show the document on each entry into Canada. All visits made after the original visit when the permit was issued are recorded as "Repeats" and entered under the appropriate heading.

Permits covering vehicles with one or more nights stay in Canada (including the first trip of standing (L) permits) are recorded in the first column in Part 3 of this report. Permits covering vehicles entering and leaving Canada on the same day are recorded in the second column. Repeat trips of vehicles using standing (L) permits are recorded in the third column captioned "Repeats and taxis". Taxis are not included in columns 1 or 2.

CANADIAN VEHICLES INWARD

Canadian vehicles returning to Canada are classified by length of stay, depending upon whether they leave Canada and return on the same day; spend one or more nights abroad.

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Non-resident Vehicles Entering Canada

Non-resident Vehicles Entering Canada

In November 1965 a total of 638,800 non-resident vehicles entered Canada, an increase of 4.3 per cent or 26,300 vehicles over the November 1964 figure. All categories except that of repeats and taxis contributed to the overall increase with the largest advance attributable to vehicles staying one or more nights. The number in this group rose by 16.3 per cent or 26,200 for a total of 186,800. Vehicles entering and leaving the same day numbered 270,500, an increase of 2.2 per cent or 5,700 and the number of commercial vehicles advanced 15.2 per cent or 6,000 vehicles for a November 1965 total of 45,400. The number of repeats and taxis, however, declined 7.9 per cent or 11,600 for a total of 136,100 vehicles.

During the eleven month period, January to November, an aggregate of 10,464,400 non-resident vehicles entered Canada, 3.2 per cent or 323,700 more than entered during the corresponding months in 1964. The largest single increase was that recorded for vehicles staying one or more nights whose cumulative aggregate of 3,783,200 was up 5.2 per cent or 188,500 over the January - November 1964 figure. Vehicles entering and leaving the same day numbered 4,260,900, an increase of 3.5 per cent or 143,600 while the number of commercial vehicles rose 7.7 per cent or 34,200 for a total of 478,700. The only category to show a decline was that of repeats and taxis whose aggregate of 1,941,600 reflected a decrease of 2.1 per cent or 42,600 vehicles.

Non-immigrants Entering Canada by Plane, Through Bus, Rail, and Boat

In November 1965 a total of 83,500 non-immigrant travellers entered Canada from the United States by plane, bus, rail, and boat, 9.2 per cent or 7,000 persons more than entered during November 1964. This overall increase, however, was not reflected in gains in all four categories as the totals for both rail and boat entries were down. The number of persons entering by train dropped 2.4 per cent or 300 persons for a total of 12,200 and boat entries declined 5.0 per cent or 100 for a total of 1,900 persons. The increases in plane and bus entries, on the other hand, more than offset these decreases. Plane entries advanced 10.0 per cent or 3,800 for a total of 41,700 persons and bus entries totalled 27,700, an increase of 14.9 per cent or 3,600 persons.

During the eleven month period, January to November 1965, the number of persons entering Canada from the United States by plane, through bus, rail, and boat totalled 1,913,900, an increase of 8.9 per cent or 155,700 over the corresponding figure for 1964. The largest category was that of bus entries which numbered 602,000, a gain of 13.7 per cent or 72,500 more than entered during the same months in 1964. Plane entries, the second biggest category, advanced 12.9 per cent or 66,600 for a total of 582,500 and the number of boat entries rose 4.4 per cent or 21,700 for a total of 513,600. The only group to show a decline was that of entries by train which dropped 2.3 per cent or 5,100 to a total of 215,800 persons.

Canadian Vehicles Returning to Canada

Canadian Vehicles Returning to Canada

The number of Canadian vehicles returning to Canada in November 1965 totalled 727,700, an increase of 6.6 per cent or 44,800 over the same month in 1964. All three categories showed increases with that of commercial vehicles being the highest rate of increase as the numbers in this group rose 14.9 per cent or 7,500 for a total of 57,700 vehicles. The number of vehicles returning after one or more nights in the United States totalled 85,100, an increase of 6.9 per cent or 5,500 more than in November 1964. The number of vehicles entering and leaving the same day increased by 5.7 per cent or 31,800 vehicles for a total of 584,900, making it the largest of the three categories.

During the months January to November 1965, a total of nearly ten million vehicles returned to Canada. This aggregate of 9,985,300 represented an increase of 6.2 per cent or 579,400 vehicles over the corresponding total for 1964. The category of vehicles returning after one or more nights in the United States showed the greatest increase with an advance of 16.5 per cent or 224,100 which brought its total to 1,581,300. Vehicles leaving and returning the same day totalled 7,766,700, an increase of 4.4 per cent or 326,400 and the number of commercial vehicles amounted to 637,300, a gain of 4.8 per cent or 28,900 more than returned during these months in 1964.

Residents of Canada Returning by Plane, Through Bus, Rail, and Boat

In November 1965 the number of persons returning to Canada from the United States by nonautomobile types of transportation (plane, bus, rail and boat) totalled 86,300, an increase of 7.3 per cent or 5,900 over the November 1964 figure. Of the four categories only plane and bus re-entries showed increases, as the totals for train and boat were both down. The highest increase, 14.6 per cent or 5,900 persons, was recorded for plane re-entries which totalled 46,200 while the number of bus re-entries advanced 9.0 per cent or 2,100 for a total of 25,400. Re-entries by train decreased 12.4 per cent or 1,800 for a total of 12,700 and the number of re-entries by boat dropped 13.0 per cent or 300 bringing this total to 2,000 persons.

During the eleven month period January to November 1965, a total of 1,363,700 residents returned to Canada from the United States by means of plane, bus, train and boat. This cummulative total represented an increase of 6.2 per cent or 79,600 more than the aggregate returning during the same months in 1964. The largest single category was that of plane re-entries which totalled 590,900, and reflected an increase of 16.6 per cent or 84,200 persons. The number of residents returning by bus rose by 8.6 per cent or 36,500 bringing total bus re-entries to 463,000. Rail re-entries, on the other hand, dropped 15.3 per cent or 36,200 persons for a total of 200,900 and boat re-entries numbered 108,900 persons, a decrease of 4.3 per cent or 4,900 less than during the corresponding months of 1964
