#### CLASSIFICATIONS USED IN THIS REPORT

"Commercial Vehicles" are trucks used for commercial purposes.

Highway Traffic not classified as commercial vehicles consists of automobiles, taxis, motorcycles, bicycles and trailers.

Automobile traffic is classified according to length of stay. The dates of entry and exit on the travellers' vehicle permits make it possible to determine the length of stay for foreign vehicles. Non-resident vehicles which enter and leave Canada on the same day are shown separately. Vehicles spending one or more nights in Canada constitute another classification. For example, vehicles entering at any time during one day and departing some time the following day have spent one night in Canada.

The length of stay abroad for Canadian vehicles is classified in the same manner. Vehicles which depart and return to Canada on the same day are shown separately. The other classification includes vehicles spending one or more nights in the United States.

#### FOREIGN VEHICLES INWARD

A traveller's vehicle permit is issued at the port of entry by Customs officers to every foreign vehicle entering Canada. This document authorizes the use of the vehicle during the intended length of stay in Canada and must be surrendered at the port of exit on departure.

Residents of border communities who make many trips during the year are entitled to apply for a standing (L) traveller's vehicle permit. The operator of the vehicle covered by the standing (L) traveller's vehicle permit must show the document on each entry into Canada. All visits made after the original visit when the permit was issued are recorded as "Repeats" and entered under the appropriate heading.

Permits covering vehicles with one or more nights stay in Canada (including the first trip of standing (L) permits) are recorded in the first column in Part 3 of this report. Permits covering vehicles entering and leaving Canada on the same day are recorded in the second column. Repeat trips of vehicles using standing (L) permits are recorded in the third column captioned "Repeats and taxis". Taxis are not included in columns 1 or 2.

#### CANADIAN VEHICLES INWARD

Canadian vehicles returning to Canada are classified by length of stay, depending upon whether they leave Canada and return on the same day; spend one or more nights abroad.

## Non-resident Vehicles Entering Canada

Entries of foreign vehicles into Canada during June 1965 totalled 1,178,300, an increase of 10,200 or 0.9 per cent in comparison with June 1964. Vehicles in Canada for one or more nights amounted to 447,500, a decline of 6,700 or 1.5 per cent. Vehicles entering and leaving the same day numbered 472,000, some 19,900 or 4.4 per cent more than in June 1964, while entries of repeats and taxis fell by 5,900 or 2.7 per cent to 212,900. The number of commercial vehicles, amounting to 45,900, represented an advance of 2,900 or 6.7 per cent over the same month of the year previous.

On a cumulative basis, aggregate entries of foreign vehicles from the United States for the first six months of 1965 numbered 4,211,900 as compared with 4,175,300 in the same period of 1964, a slight gain of 36,600 or 0.9 per cent. Entries of vehicles staying one or more nights totalled 1,270,800, an increase of 18,000 or 1.4 per cent, while the number of vehicles entering and leaving the same day advanced by 9,600 or 0.5 per cent to 1,804,400. Repeats and taxis showed a slight decline as entries in this category fell to 882,900, a drop of 700 or 0.1 per cent. Entries of commercial vehicles totalled 253,800, some 9,700 or 4 per cent more than in the January-June 1964 period.

# Non-immigrants Entering Canada by Plane, Through Bus, Rail, and Boat

In June 1965 the number of foreign travellers from the United States which entered Canada by plane, bus, rail, and boat amounted to 251,400, an increase of 30,500 or 13.8 per cent above the volume recorded in June 1964. Entries by plane increased by 6,000 or 9.9 per cent to 66,900 while arrivals by long-distance bus came to 80,900, a substantial gain of 19,400 or 31.5 per cent over June 1964. On the other hand, the number of entries by rail declined to 24,900, a decrease of 900 or 3.5 per cent. The number of persons arriving by boat totalled 78,700, some 6,000 or 8.3 per cent more than in June 1964.

Cumulatively, the number of non-immigrants arriving from the United States by plane, through bus, rail, and boat during the January-June 1965 period advanced to 691,900, an increase of 41,500 or 6.4 per cent over the corresponding 1964 period. Plane arrivals amounted to 261,800, some 17,800 or 7.3 per cent more than in the same period of 1964. Entries by long-distance bus advanced by 17,800 or 8.6 per cent to 225,300, while rail travellers amounted to 99,700, a decline of 1,300 or 1.3 per cent in comparison with the first six months of 1964. Boat traffic showed an increase as entries in this category advanced by 7,200 or 7.4 per cent to 105,100.

#### Canadian Vehicles Returning to Canada

Canadian vehicles re-entering Canada from the United States in June 1965 numbered 955,000. This represents an increase of 46,900 or 5.2 per cent over the same month in the preceding year. Reentries of vehicles out of Canada for one or more nights amounted to 123,100, a gain of 14,200 or 13 per cent, while vehicles leaving and returning on the same day totalled 774,300 as compared with 743,700 in June 1964, an increase of 30,600 or 4.1 per cent. Re-entries of commercial vehicles, amounting to 57,600, represented an advance of 2,100 or 3.8 per cent over the same month of 1964.

On a cumulative basis, aggregate re-entries of Canadian vehicles during the first six months of 1965 amounted to 4,643,400, some 90,100 or 2 per cent more than in the January-June 1964 period. Canadian vehicles returning to Canada after one or more nights in the United States totalled 555,100 as compared with 488,500 in the first six months of 1964, a gain of 66,600 or 13.6 per cent. The number of vehicles leaving and returning on the same day amounted to 3,739,300, an increase of 13,400 or 0.4 per cent, while re-entries of commercial vehicles rose to 349,000, an advance of 10,100 or 3 per cent in comparison with the corresponding 1964 period.

# Residents of Canada Returning by Plane, Through Bus, Rail, and Boat

Canadian residents returning from the United States by plane, through bus, rail, and boat during June 1965 numbered 138,400, a gain of 9,100 or 7 per cent above the volume recorded in the same month of 1964. Persons returning by plane totalled 46,600, some 4,800 or 11.5 per cent more than in June 1964. Re-entries by long-distance bus advanced by 6,200 or 11 per cent to 62,800 while residents returning to Canada by rail showed a decline, dropping by 2,800 or 15.1 per cent to 15,800. The number of re-entries by boat stood at 13,200, some 900 or 7.3 per cent more than in June of 1964.

Re-entries of Canadians travelling by plane, through bus, rail, and boat during the first half of 1965 totalled 686,800. This is an increase of 35,200 or 5.4 per cent over the same period of 1964. Canadians returning by plane amounted to 327,800 as compared to 281,500 in the first six months of 1964, an increase of 46,300 or 16.4 per cent. Re-entries by long-distance bus numbered 227,700, a gain of 6,200 or 2.8 per cent, while persons re-entering Canada by rail, amounting to 106,800, represented a decline of 19,300 or 15.3 per cent in comparison with the corresponding 1964 period. Re-entries by boat advanced by 2,000 or 8.9 per cent to 24,500.
