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# TRAVEL BETWEEN CANADA AND THE UNITED STATES

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#### CLASSIFICATIONS USED IN THIS REPORT

"Commercial Vehicles" are trucks used for commercial purposes.

Highway Traffic not classified as commercial vehicles consists of automobiles, taxis, motorcycles, bicycles and trailers.

Automobile traffic is classified according to length of stay. The dates of entry and exit on the travellers' vehicle permits make it possible to determine the length of stay for foreign vehicles. Non-resident vehicles which enter and leave Canada on the same day are shown separately. Vehicles spending one or more nights in Canada constitute another classification. For example, vehicles entering at any time during one day and departing some time the following day have spent one night in Canada.

The length of stay abroad for Canadian vehicles is classified in the same manner. Vehicles which depart and return to Canada on the same day are shown separately. The other classification includes vehicles spending one or more nights in the United States.

#### FOREIGN VEHICLES INWARD

A traveller's vehicle permit is issued at the port of entry by Customs officers to every foreign vehicle entering Canada. This document authorizes the use of the vehicle during the intended length of stay in Canada and must be surrendered at the port of exit on departure.

Residents of border communities who make many trips during the year are entitled to apply for a standing (L) traveller's vehicle permit. The operator of the vehicle covered by the standing (L) traveller's vehicle permit must show the document on each entry into Canada. All visits made after the original visit when the permit was issued are recorded as "Repeats" and entered under the appropriate heading.

Permits covering vehicles with one or more nights stay in Canada (including the first trip of standing (L) permits) are recorded in the first column in Part 3 of this report. Permits covering vehicles entering and leaving Canada on the same day are recorded in the second column. Repeat trips of vehicles using standing (L) permits are recorded in the third column captioned "Repeats and taxis". Taxis are not included in columns 1 or 2.

## CANADIAN VEHICLES INWARD

Canadian vehicles returning to Canada are classified by length of stay, depending upon whether they leave Canada and return on the same day; spend one or more nights abroad.

#### Non-resident Vehicles Entering Canada

In July 1965, a total of 1,780,400 non-resident vehicles entered Canada, an increase of 6.3 per cent or 111,400 vehicles over the corresponding July 1964 figures. All categories except that of Repeats and Taxis contributed to this increase. The number of repeats and taxis, however, was down 2.5 per cent or 7,100 to a total of 274,500. The largest percentage gain was that recorded for commercial vehicles which increased 13.4 per cent or 5,400 for a total of 45,600. Non-resident vehicles staying one or more nights in Canada showed the biggest absolute gain, advancing 66,600 or 8.8 per cent for a total of 820,800. The number of vehicles entering and leaving on the same day totalled 750,900, a gain of 6.6 per cent or 46,500 over the July 1964 figures.

On a cumulative basis, an aggregate total of 6,103,700 non-resident vehicles entered Canada between January and July inclusive. This total represents an increase of 2.5 per cent or 148,100 over the same period in 1964. There were small increases in all categories except that of Repeats and Taxis which declined 0.7 per cent or 7,800 vehicles to a total of 1,157,400. The total number of non-resident vehicles staying one or more nights in Canada, however, was 2,091,600, an increase of 84,700 or 4.2 per cent. The number of vehicles entering and leaving on the same day rose by 2.2 per cent (56,-100 vehicles) for a total of 2,555,300. Commercial vehicles also showed an increase over the July 1964 figures with a gain of 5.3 per cent (15,100 vehicles) for a total of 299,400.

# Non-immigrants Entering Canada by Plane, Through Bus, Rail, and Boat

In July 1965, some 417,200 foreign travellers entered Canada from the United States by plane, bus, rail, and boat. This total is 14.4 per cent or 52,400 persons higher than the similar total for July 1964. The aggregate is comprised of 170,000 by boat, 133,000 by bus, 78,300 by plane and 35,900 by train. There were increases in the number of plane, bus, and boat travellers entering Canada but the number of train passengers from the U.S. declined 0.6 per cent or 200 persons. This decline is in contrast to the 6.5 per cent increase of 2,200 visitors who entered Canada by train in July 1964 as compared with July 1963. In a comparison of the July 1964 and July 1965 figures, the most striking gain was that recorded in the number of bus travellers. Entries by bus rose 31 per cent or 31,500 persons to a total of 133,000. Ontario received the greatest number of bus travellers from the U.S. with a total of some 89,500 (67.3 per cent); Quebec was second with 27,600 (20.8 per cent) and British Columbia third with 8,400 (6.3 per cent). Entries by plane which registered an increase of 18.1 per cent or 12,000 persons were also considerably higher than in July 1964. The number of persons entering Canada by boat in July 1965 from the United States rose by 5.7 per cent or 9,100 over the previous year's July figures. Even though this increase is less than that recorded for bus and plane passenger traffic, more persons entered Canada from the United States by boat in July 1965 than by either bus, plane or train.

In the first seven months (January-July) of 1965 the number of non-immigrants entering Canada from the United States by plane, through bus, train, and boat reached a total of 1,109,200, an increase of 94,000 or 9.3 per cent over the same period in 1964. Bus travellers accounted for the greatest gain with an increase of 16 per cent or 49,300 for a total of 358,300. Plane entries recorded the second highest gain with an increase of 9.6 per cent which raised their total by 29,800 to 340,100 persons. Boat entries also registered a gain with an increase of 6.3 per cent or 16,400 for a total of 275,200 persons. The number of rail passengers from the United States, however, declined to 135,600, a drop of 1.1 per cent or 1,500 persons.

### Canadian Vehicles Returning to Canada

Canadian vehicles returning to Canada from the United States in July 1965, totalled 1,358,200, an increase of 11 per cent or 134,800 over July 1964. The majority of Canadian vehicles travelling to the United States left and returned on the same day (1,015,300) while a lesser number (285,900) stayed for one or more nights. However, in comparison with the July 1964 figures, there was a substantial increase of 23 per cent or 53,500 in the number of vehicles staying one or more nights in the United States. There were gains in the other two categories as well in July 1965. The number leaving and returning the same day increased 8.3 per cent or 78,000 vehicles and the number of returning commercial vehicles rose by 6.1 per cent or 3,300 to a total of 57,000.

In the period January-July 1965 the aggregate total of Canadian vehicles returning to Canada from the United States was 6,001,600 an increase of 3.9 per cent or 224,900 over the same period in 1964. Of this total, the greatest number (4,754,600) were Canadian vehicles leaving and returning on the same day. This segment of traffic increased by 2 per cent or 91,400 vehicles over the total for July 1964. The largest percentage increase (16.7 per cent) was recorded by Canadian vehicles staying one or more nights in the United States. The number in this category rose by 120,100 over the July 1964 figure to a total of 841,000. The number of commercial vehicles returning to Canada during the first seven months was 406,000, a gain of 3.4 per cent or 13,400 over the corresponding period in 1964.

## Residents of Canada Returning by Plane, Through Bus, Rail, and Boat

In July 1965, approximately 167,000 Canadian residents returned from the United States by plane, bus, train or boat. This total represents an increase of 7.1 per cent or 11,000 over the corresponding July 1964 figures. Bus and plane passengers alone accounted for this increase as the number of Canadians returning by rail and boat actually dropped in comparison with the number returning in July 1964. Re-entries by train declined by 13.3 per cent or 3,400 to a total of 22,100 and the number returning by boat decreased to 33,500, a drop of 11.8 per cent or 4,500 less than in July 1964. However, these two decreases were more than offset by sizeable gains in the number of Canadians returning from the United States by plane or bus. Compared with July 1964, re-entries by long-distance bus rose by 21 per cent, bringing the total number up to 64,000, an increase of 11,100. The increase in Canadian residents returning by plane was only slightly lower at 20 per cent. This brought the total by plane in July 1965 to 47,400, a gain of 7,900 over the same month in 1964.

During the seven months period, January-July 1965, the aggregate total of Canadians returning by plane, bus, train or boat amounted to 853,800, an increase of 5.7 per cent or 46,300 persons over the same period in 1964. The largest increase was recorded in the number returning by plane. This figure rose by 16.9 per cent, bringing the total to 375,200 persons, 54,200 higher than the total for January-July 1964. Re-entries by bus passengers also increased with a gain of 6.3 per cent or 17,300 crossings for a total of 291,700. On the other hand, the number returning by rail dropped 15 per cent or 22,700 to 128,900. In 1965 re-entries by boat also decreased compared with the corresponding 1964 January-July period. The total number dropped by 2,500 persons or 4.1 per cent.
