

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#### TRAVEL BETWEEN CANADA AND THE UNITED STATES

#### JANUARY, 1951

#### HIGHWAY TRAFFIC - JANUARY, 1951

The volume of highway traffic entering Canada from the United States in January was 15 per cent heavier than in January a year ago. Foreign traffic increased by 7 per cent and Canadian traffic returning from the United States by 31 per cent. Total border crossings during the month numbered 529,300, compared with 461,200 in January, 1950. Of these, 325,700 were United States vehicles and 203,600 Canadian vehicles returning. The United States traffic consisted of 40,900 on traveller's vehicle permits, 264,600 local or nonpermit vehicles, and 20,200 commercial vehicles. The Canadian traffic comprised 12,600 units remaining abroad more than twenty-four hours, 165,000 staying for shorter periods, and 26,000 commercial vehicles.

#### Foreign Vehicles

Foreign vehicles entered Canada on traveller's vehicle permits in 13 per cent greater volume than in January last year. Practically all of the gain can be attributed to British Columbia which made a strong recovery from the low volume of traffic brought about by heavy storms in January, 1950. In the other provinces there was an overall increase of less than one per cent. gains in Ontario. Newfoundland and the west being almost balanced by declines in Quebec and the Maritimes. Non-permit or local traffic increased from 250,400 to 264,600 units, a gain of 6 per cent. New Brunswick was the only province recording a loss in this respect.

#### Canadian Vehicles

The easing of restrictions on the purchase of United States funds by Canadians for pleasure travel continues to be reflected in increased volume of Canadian highway traffic at border points. The gain this month was about 31 per cent, compared with the previous January. Longer-term traffic increased by 41 per cent, which is higher than that registered in any month of 1950 with the exception of December.

All parts of Canada shared in the increase. Short term traffic remaining out of the country for 24 hours or less was higher in all provinces, the overall gain being 27 per cent. Here also the gains were general.

## 11. TRAFFIC BY RAIL, THROUGH BUS, BOAT AND PLANE - DECEMBER, 1950

Non-resident entries from the United States by rail, through bus, boat and plane continued to decline in 1950, part of the drop being due to the greater use of private automobiles as a means of travel. The decline was from 1,416,500 passengers in 1949 to 1,233,900 in 1950, or 13 per cent. Losses ranged from 30 per cent in boat traffic to 5 per cent in travel by bus. Plane travel counteracted the tendency with a rise of 17 per cent, but this means of transportation is, in absolute mumber of passengers carried, still the least frequently used of the four.

The volume of Canadian traffic returning from the United States by rail, through bus, boat and plane was 3 per cent smaller in 1950 than in 1949. The drop in figures for rail and boat travel more than outweighed a higher volume of bus and plane travel.

Figures for American and Canadian travellers combined show an 8 per cent drop in the 12-month period.

The month of December was not typical of the year as a whole, as there was an increase in both American and Canadian travellers carried, of 2 per cent and 20 per cent respectively. The high percentage increase in travel by plane was particularly noteworthy.

The following notes define briefly the classifications used in the tables:

- 1. "Commercial Vehicles" are trucks used for commercial purposes.
- 2. Highway Traffic not classified as commercial vehicles consists of automobiles, taxis, motorcycles and bicycles.

## 3. Foreign Vehicles Inward

- (a) Non-Permit Class consists of local vehicles which are not required to make out formal Customs permits. They are restricted to travel within the jurisdiction of the port and may not remain in Canada more than 48 hours.
  - Also included are the repeat trips of commuters and others who cross the border frequently on commuting permits. (see below).
- (b) Traveller's vehicle permits are issued to foreign vehicles which remain in Canada longer than 48 hours or which travel beyond the jurisdiction of the port of entry. (Thus a motorist who intends to leave the country at a point other than that of entry must apply for a traveller's vehicle permit). Figures shown above refer almost exclusively to automobiles. They include a small number of taxis, motorcycles and bicycles, but exclude buses, trucks and other commercial vehicles.

These permits are usually valid for periods of 60 days or 6 months, but more than 50 per cent of all permits issued each year are used for visits of less than 48 hours.

Also included in this class are commuting permits which entitle the holders to cross the border frequently during the tenure of their permits. Repeat trips after the first, however, are included in the non-permit class, as mentioned above.

#### 4. Canadian Vehicles Inward

Canadian vehicles returning to Canada are classified by length of stay depending upon whether they are abroad for more or less than 24 hours.

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
