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TRAVEL BETWEEN CANADA AND THE UNITED STATES

MOVEMBER, 1951

I. HIGHWAY TRAFFIC - NOVEMBER, 1951

The volume of highway traffic entering Canada from the United States in November was 8 per cent higher than in the same month last year. The gain was 2 per cent in the case of foreign traffic and 19 per cent in that of Canadian traffic returning. The aggregate number of border crossings in November was 684,400, consisting of 407,900 foreign entries and 276,500 Canadian vehicles returning. Of the foreign inflow, 76,000 entered on traveller's vehicle permits, 310,500 consisted of local or non-permit traffic, and 21,400 were commercial vehicles. Of the Canadian traffic returning, 220,600 represented vehicles absent twenty-four hours or less, 30,100 those absent more than 24 hours, while 25,800 were of the commercial class.

November was not typical of 1951 in percentage changes from the year before. The cumulative figures for the first eleven months reveal a total gain of 15 per cent for all classes of travel. Foreign traffic increased 8 per cent and Canadian traffic returning 31 per cent.

Foreign Vehicles

Foreign vehicles entered Canada on traveller's vehicle permits in 5 per cent lighter volume than in November last year. Losses were fairly general throughout the country, one outstanding exception being British Columbia, where there was an increase of 1,900 vehicles. For the first eleven months of the year there was an increase of 8 per cent in this class of traffic. All parts of Canada shared in the gain.

Non-permit or local traffic increased by 5 per cent in November. New Brunswick, Ontario, Manitoba, Saskatchewan and British Columbia recorded gains, while in Quebec and Alberta travel of this type was lighter than a year ago.

For the first eleven months of the year the gain in local traffic was 8 per cent. Gains were general except in Alberta and Yukon Territory.

Canadian Vehicles

The number of long-term Canadian vehicles returning to Canada in November was 18 per cent greater in 1951 than in 1950. All geographical divisions of the country shared in the increase except Alberta and Saskatchewan. For the first eleven months of the year the percentage gain was considerably higher -- namely, 37 per cent. Alberta alone among the provinces revealed a contrary tendency, with a 6 per cent lower volume.

In the case of Canadian short-term traffic the overall gain in November was also 18 per cent. Alberta was the only province to show a loss. The gain for the eleven-month period was 30 per cent, with all subdivisions except Nova Scotia and the Yukon recording an increased number of vehicles.

To sum up, while November did not fulfill the promise of the earlier part of the year in the matter of percentage increases, highway traffic in most categories was at a higher lever than in November, 1950.

The following notes define briefly the classifications used in the tables:

- 1. "Commercial Vehicles" are trucks used for commercial purposes.
- 2. Highway Traffic not classified as commercial vehicles consists of automobiles, taxis, motorcycles and bicycles.

3. Foreign Vehicles Inward

(a) Non-Permit Class consists of local vehicles which do not require Customs permits. They are restricted to travel within the jurisdiction of the port and may not remain in Canada more than 48 hours.

Also included are the repeat trips of commuters and others who cross the border frequently on commuting permits. (See below).

(b) Traveller's vehicle permits are issued to foreign vehicles which remain in Canada longer than 48 hours or which travel beyond the jurisdiction of the port or entry. (Thus a motorist who intends to leave the country at a point other than that of entry must apply for a traveller's vehicle permit).

These permits are usually valid for periods of 60 days or 6 months, but more than 50 per cent of all permits issued each year are used for visits of less than 48 hours.

Also included in this class are commuting permits which entitle the holders to cross the border frequently during the tenure of their permits. Repeat trips after the first, however, are included in the non-permit class, as mentioned above.

4. Canadian Vehicles Inward

Canadian vehicles returning to Canada are classified by length of stay depending upon whether they are abroad for more or less than 24 hours.

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Publication is made possible through the co-operation of Customs and Immigration officials across Canada.
