## TRAVEL BETWEEN CANADA AND THE UNITED STATES

#### NOVEMBER, 1952

#### HIGHWAY TRAFFIC - NOVEMBER, 1952

The volume of highway traffic entering Canada from the United States was 22 per cent higher in November, 1952, than in the same month in the previous year. Foreign traffic increased by 15 per cent and Canadian traffic returning by 32 per cent. Total border crossings during the month numbered 836,700 vehicles, of which number 471,000 were foreign, comprising 88,000 entering on traveller's vehicle permits, 356,600 non-permit or local entries, and 26,400 commercial vehicles. The Canadian traffic consisted of 297.500 vehicles remaining abroad for one day or less, 40,600 remaining over twenty-four hours, and 27,600 commercial vehicles.

November's percentage gain is higher than the average for the first eleven months of the year, during which United States traffic increased by 4 per cent and Canadian traffic returning by 22 per cent - the overall gain being 10 per cent.

#### Foreign Vehicles

The number of foreign vehicles entering Canada in November on traveller's vehicle permits was 16 per cent higher in 1952 than in 1951, reflecting heavier traffic in most provinces. This rate of gain is the highest since May. Totals for the period of January to November in this type of traffic were 2 per cent higher this year.

Non-permit or local traffic showed an increase of 15 per cent in November. There were gains in all but one province. There was a 4 per cent rise in this type of traffic for the eleven-month period.

#### Canadian Vehicles

In the case also of returning Canadian vehicles which had remained abroad for over twenty-four hours November was above the average in percentage gain over last year. Recorded entries in this class were 35 per cent more numerous, the increases being relatively highest in the west. For the first eleven months of 1952 the rate of gain was 27 per cent.

In the case of Canadian short-term traffic there was also a 35 per cent greater number of entries in this month. All provinces reflected higher rates. The corresponding figure for the eleven-month period was 21 per cent.

# II. TRAFFIC BY RAIL, THROUGH BUS, BOAT AND PLANE - NOVEMBER, 1952

Travel by the above means of transportation did not show the same statistical pattern as travel by automobile where the percentage increase was higher in November than in the eleven-month period. The overall increase in entries by rail, through bus, boat and plane amounted to less than one per cent for November whereas the rate of increase for the eleven-month period was over 4 per cent. In the case of United States passengers November showed a decline of 6 per cent, with travel by plane being the only exception to this trend. This may be compared with an overall gain of 2 per cent in the cumulative period.

In the case of Canadian passengers the November volume of travel was 5 per cent above that of last year, while the eleven-month volume was 6 per cent greater. Increases in the number of Canadians returning by boat and plane were higher than the increase recorded for rail traffic. There was a slight decrease in the number of Canadians returning by through bus, compared with November 1951, whereas the decrease in this type of transportation for the eleven-month period amounted to 7 per cent.

The following notes define briefly the classifications used in the tables:

- 1. "Commercial Vehicles" are trucks used for commercial purposes.
- 2. Highway Traffic not classified as commercial vehicles consists of automobiles, taxis, motorcycles and bicycles.

#### 3. Foreign Vehicles Inward

(a) Non-Permit Class consists of local vehicles which do not require Customs permits. They are restricted to travel within the jurisdiction of the port and may not remain in Canada more than 48 hours.

Also included are the repeat trips of commuters and others who cross the border frequently on commuting permits. (See below).

(b) Traveller's vehicle permits are issued to foreign vehicles which remain in Canada longer than 48 hours or which travel beyond the jurisdiction of the port or entry. (Thus a motorist who intends to leave the country at a point other than that of entry must apply for a traveller's vehicle permit).

These permits are usually valid for periods of 60 days or 6 months, but more than 50 per cent of all permits issued each year are used for visits of less than 48 hours.

Also included in this class are commuting permits which entitle the holders to cross the border frequently during the tenure of their permits. Repeat trips after the first, however, are included in the non-permit class, as mentioned above.

#### 4. Canadian Vehicles Inward

Canadian vehicles returning to Canada are classified by length of stay depending upon whether they are abroad for more or less than 24 hours.
