

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## TRAVEL BETWEEN CANADA AND THE UNITED STATES

#### FEBRUARY, 1952

## I. HIGHWAY TRAFFIC - FEBRUARY, 1952

The volume of highway traffic entering Canada from the United States in February was 29 per cent higher this year than in the same month a year ago. Foreign traffic increased by 19 per cent, and Canadian traffic returning from the south by 46 per cent. Total border crossings during the month numbered 610,900 compared with 472,800 in February, 1951. Of these, 343,800 were United States vehicles and 267,100 Canadian vehicles returning. The United States traffic consisted of 52,500 on traveller's vehicle permits, 269,300 local or non-permit vehicles and 22,000 in the commercial classification. The Canadian traffic comprised 18,500 units remaining abroad over 24 hours, 216,600 remaining for shorter periods, and 32,000 of a commercial type.

#### Foreign Vehicles

Foreign vehicles entered Canada on traveller's vehicle permits in 35 per cent greater volume than in February a year ago. All parts of the country shared in the gain. This is in marked contrast to the showing of a year ago, when there was a slight drop from the level of February, 1950 and to that of January this year, when there was a 7 per cent lower volume. For the first two months of this year combined, traffic in this division was 13 per cent heavier than in 1951. Local or non-permit traffic increased by 16 per cent in February, gains being general except in some parts of the West.

## Canadian Vehicles

Canadian vehicles returning in February from trips of more than 24 hours' duration increased this year by 61 per cent. The number of cars - 18,500 - is the highest on record for this month. The average for the previous three Februarys

was 8,500. There were slight decreases in some provinces, but substantial gains in the others. There was a similarly high percentage rise in the number of cars absent for periods of one day or less. Here the volume was up about 50 per cent, with all provinces except Alberta sharing in the gain.

## II. TRAFFIC BY RAIL, THROUGH BUS, BOAT AND PLANE - DECEMBER, 1951

The number of non-resident travellers entering Canada from the United States by rail, through bus, boat and plane in December was 10 per cent higher than in the corresponding month a year ago. For the whole year, 1951 the gain was 8 per cent. For the cumulative period the highest relative increase was in boat travel, while for the month of December the gain in rail traffic was notable.

About 4 per cent fewer Canadians returned by these modes of transportation in December, while for the year as a whole there was an increase of 6 per cent. Travel by plane showed the greatest relative gain in both cases.

The following notes define briefly the classifications used in the tables:

- 1. "Commercial Vehicles" are trucks used for commercial purposes.
- 2. Highway Traffic not classified as commercial vehicles consists of automobiles, taxis, motorcycles and bicycles.

## 3. Foreign Vehicles Inward

(a) Non-Permit Class consists of local vehicles which do not require Custom permits. They are restricted to travel within the jurisdiction of the port and may not remain in Canada more than 48 hours.

Also included are the repeat trips of commuters and others who cross the border frequently on commuting permits. (See below).

(b) Traveller's vehicle permits are issued to foreign vehicles which remain in Canada longer than 48 hours or which travel beyond the jurisdiction of the port of entry. (Thus a motorist who intends to leave the country at a point other than that of entry must apply for a traveller's vehicle permit).

These permits are usually valid for periods of 60 days or 6 months, but more than 50 per cent of all permits issued each year are used for visits of less than 48 hours.

Also included in this class are commuting permits which entitle the holders to cross the border frequently during the tenure of their permits. Repeat trips after the first, however, are included in the non-permit class, as mentioned above.

#### 4. Canadian Vehicles Inward

Canadian vehicles returning to Canada are classified by length of stay depending upon whether they are abroad for more or less than 24 hours.

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Publication is made possible through the co-operation of Customs and Immigration officials across Canada.
