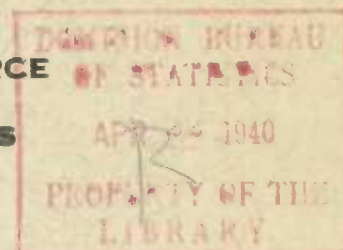

FINANCIAL STATISTICS OF PROVINCIAL GOVERNMENTS, 1930 and 1931.

(Subject to Revision)

The Bureau herewith presents its annual preliminary bulletin of summary tables dealing with financial activities of the various provincial governments. The analysis in this instance is for the fiscal years ending in 1930 and 1931 which covers the latest available information.

The report consists of seven main tables. The first table shows the total ordinary and per capita revenues and expenditures. The second table analyzes the principal items of taxation revenue while the third shows other leading sources of revenue. The fourth table shows the channels through which the bulk of governmental expenditures flow while the remaining tables deal with bonded debt, treasury bills, direct and indirect liabilities, sinking funds and assets.

In making comparisons as between provinces, it should be noted that the fiscal year endings vary as shown in Table I.

TABLE I - TOTAL AND PER CAPITA ORDINARY REVENUES AND EXPENDITURES:-

The per capita total revenues and expenditures are not shown with a view to comparison as between provinces, but rather for a study of financial conditions of the individual provinces themselves. There are economic conditions peculiar to some provinces which do not similarly affect others, such as the possession of valuable natural resources. Some provinces which possess large mineral areas or forest and timber lands derive considerable revenues from such resources and maintain large administrative staffs to control and direct activities connected with them. The ownership of public utilities such as hydro-electric power, railways, telephones and such like services is more highly developed in some provinces than in others and while very heavy expenditures are necessarily involved to maintain them, the investments for the public benefit must be considered in any comparative discussion as between provinces.

Comparing the year 1931 with 1930 it will be seen that the total ordinary revenues of the combined provinces were less by \$9,011,430. This is the first year in which the combined revenues have fallen off since 1916. In the provinces of Prince Edward Island and Nova Scotia the 1931 revenues were increased over those for 1930, but in each of the other provinces the prevailing depression was in part responsible for a reduction of provincial ordinary receipts.

Reviewing the expenditure column it will be seen that the combined ordinary expenditures of all provinces which amounted to \$177,542,192 in 1929 increased to \$184,804,203 in 1930 and to \$190,754,202 in 1931. The provinces of Ontario and New Brunswick showed a reduction of ordinary expenditure in 1931 as compared with 1930 but in each of the other provinces expenditure was increased.

TABLE 2 - PRINCIPAL ITEMS OF TAXATION: The first column shows the ordinary receipts from taxes on land, real property, income, financial and commercial corporations. Analysis reveals a falling off by the combined provincial governments in 1931 as compared with 1930 of over \$400,000.

The second column deals with Succession Duties which are always of an indeterminate character as a source of revenue and for obvious reasons fluctuate from year to year. The total provincial revenues from this source were less by over \$1,600,000 in 1931 than they were in 1930.

The combined provincial revenues from licensing of motor vehicles in 1930 were less than those of 1929 by over \$1,400,000 while those for 1931 were less than 1930 revenues by over \$300,000.

Gasoline tax which is now imposed by all provinces shows an increase of over \$3,000,000 for all provinces for 1930 over 1929 and \$2,900,000 for 1931 over 1930. The rates have shown an upward tendency throughout all provinces within the past two or three years.

The total provincial revenues from Amusement taxes showed a reduction of over \$700,000 in 1931 as compared with 1930.

TABLE 3 - OTHER PRINCIPAL ORDINARY REVENUES: The first column deals with Dominion Government subsidies and allowances under the terms of the British North America Act and subsequent amendments.

The second column deals with the ordinary revenues accruing to provincial treasuries from the operation of liquor traffic control, now in vogue in all provinces with the exception of Prince Edward Island which is still under prohibition regulation. It is not possible to draw accurate comparisons as between provinces owing to the varied systems of control which have been adopted.

The administration of provincial liquor acts is usually under a Commission or Board and the revenue returns as shown represent the sums of money turned over annually to the provincial treasuries. The total receipts by all provinces from this source was less in 1931 than in 1930. The balance of the table shows an analysis of ordinary revenues from legal fees, public utilities (such as water powers, railways, hydro-electric, telephones, toll bridges, etc.), forests, timber and woods, and mines and mining.

It will be seen that a new source of revenue has been opened up for the prairie provinces due to the return by the Dominion Government of timber and mining resources.



TABLE 4 - PRINCIPAL ORDINARY EXPENDITURES:- Fluctuations in expenditures for legislation are mainly accounted for by general election charges. Civil Government charges increased generally throughout the provinces. This is due to expansion of governmental activities.

Interest charges for the combined provinces showed a slight increase in 1931 over 1930. Ontario and Quebec expended less for interest in 1931 than in 1930, but in each of the other provinces there was an increase.

Sinking funds expenditure for all provinces increased in 1931 by \$518,154 over 1930; public buildings and roads decreased by \$857,021 in 1931 as compared with 1930 while education charges for all provinces increased by \$1,242,069 in the same period. Education expenditures have steadily increased each year since 1916 when the total was \$9,964,552.

The balance of the table consists of expenditures for agriculture, legal administration, mothers allowances, old age pensions, colonization, health and sanitation, hospitals, charities and correctional institutions.

TABLE 5 - BONDED DEBT AND TREASURY BILLS:- The bonded debt outstanding for all provinces increased by \$97,504,260 in 1931 over 1930 while treasury bills increased by \$14,791,747 in the same period. A recent report of the Bureau analyzes the growth of provincial bonded debt and treasury bills from 1916 to 1930, and outlines the purposes of direct revenue producing, indirect revenue producing, and non-revenue producing debt.

TABLE 6 - DIRECT AND INDIRECT LIABILITIES:- Direct liabilities constitute bonded debt together with current and floating liabilities. The combined provinces increased their direct liabilities in 1931 by \$135,675,592 over 1930.

Indirect liabilities constitute principally guarantees by provincial governments for loans to or bonds issued by railways and municipal institutions.

TABLE 7 - ASSETS AND SINKING FUNDS:- In comparison with the direct liabilities it will be seen that the assets are sufficiently sound enough to take care of debt requirements. While assets include sinking funds the latter are shown separately for convenience in making estimates of net debt. The province of Ontario has the largest bonded debt and in comparison their sinking funds are comparatively small but the province has adopted a debt retirement policy of annual payment instalments over the periods for which debt may be incurred.
