The week fich out force Summary - The number of employed persons in Canada fell by 29,000 between July and August, to a total of 8,272,000. A similar reduction occurred between July and August 1969 but in most recent years employment expanded in this period. The labour force in August, at 8,720,000, was 99,000 lower than in July. This was a much larger-than-usual drop for the time of year. There was also a larger-than-usual reduction in unemployment, down by 70,000 from July to a total of 448,000 in August.

Unemployment was 5.1 per cent of the labour force in August. The seasonally-adjusted rate of unemployment in August was 6.7 per cent, the same as in July. The seasonal adjustment is an analytical method to remove the effects of seasonal fluctuations from the data.

Compared to August 1969, employment rose by 101,000, or 1.2 per cent. The labour force was larger by 231,000, or 2.7 per cent. The year-to-year increase in unemployment was 130,000.

Employment - There was the usual slight reduction in employment in agriculture between July and August but a larger-than-usual fall (24,000) in the non-agriculture sector. Large decreases in community, business and personal services (30,000) and in trade (19,000) were partly offset by small increases in other nonagricultural industries.

Employment among persons under 25 years dropped by 40,000 during the month, a bigger-thanusual reduction between July and August. Employment for men 25 years and over increased by 33,000 and employment of women 25 years and over fell by 21,000.

The seasonally-adjusted level of employment fell by 12,000 from July, to 7,859,000 in August. This followed a 64,000 drop between June and July. The largest regional changes between July and August were a 22,000 drop in seasonally-adjusted employment in Quebec and an increase of 16,000 in Ontario.

The statistics in the Joint Press Release come from The Labour Force, a monthly publication by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics. The analysis is by the Department of Manpower and Immigration.

Unemployment - The decline of 70,000 in the number of persons unemployed in August was much larger than usual, mainly on account of a big drop in unemployment among younger persons aged 14-24. Small changes in unemployment among men and women 25 years and over were largely offsetting. Compared with August 1969, the number of unemployed persons aged 14-24 years was 75,000 higher in August 1970. The year-to-year rise for persons 25 years old and over was 55,000.

Declines in unemployment between July and August were larger than usual in all regions except the Prairies.

<u>Seasonally-adjusted Unemployment Rates</u> - The seasonally-adjusted unemployment rate at 6.7 per cent in August was unchanged from July. The adjusted rate for persons 25 years and over was slightly lower than in July due to a reduction in the adjusted rate for men in this age group. The adjusted rate for 14-24 years old continued to rise.



Regionally, the generally rising trend in the seasonally-adjusted unemployment rates was levelled off in August in all regions except the Prairies where there was an increase between July and August.
