## Introduction

This report presents the results of the monthly labour force survey covering the weok ended July 23, 1955. The survey is a continuation of the series begun in November, 1945, and carried out at quarterly intervals until November, 1952, when the first survey on a monthly basis was taken. About 30,000 houssholds chosen by area sampling, methods in some 115 different areas in Canade are visited each month. The labour force surveys provide estimates of the employment characteristics of the civilian noninstitutional population of working age. Persons are classified according to current activity during the specific weeke covered by the surveys.

Results of previous labour force surveys may be obtained from Reference Paper No. 58, "The Labour Force, November, $1945-\mathrm{January}, \mathrm{1955"}$. appeared in Reference Paper No. 35 and subsequent bulletins have been revised to cover the entire ten provinces of Canada including the ramote and more inaccessible areas (See section on Covarage, page 4).

## Definitions and Explanations

(a) Labour Force - The civilian labour force is composed of that portion of the civilian noninstitutional population 14 years of age and over who, during the survey weoks did some work; had jobs but did no work; or did not have jobs and were seeking work.
(b) Persons ath jobs and st work - This category includes those who during the survey week did any work for pay or profit or who did unpaid work which contributed to the running of a farm or a business operated by a related member of the household.

While variations in the estimates of the total number of persons at work provide a valuable indicator of economic conditions, significant changes in the employment pattern may be concesled unless attention is focussed on the extent to which people worked less than full-time. Table I provides an analysis of the reasons for which persons worked less than 35 hours in the survey weok. Estimates of weekly hours of work are contained in Table 7.
(c) Porson: with fobs but not at work - This category includes those who had jobs but did not work during the survey week because of vacation, illness, bad weather, industrial dispute, or tomporary layoff. Persons who had jobs but dil not work during the survey week and who also looked for work are inciuded in "Persons without jobs and seoking work".

Persons on temporary layoff are those who were laid off from their job with definite instructions to return to work within 30 days of the date of layoff. Persons with jobs but not at work are classified in Table 8 by the reasons for their absence Irom work.
(d) Persons fithout iobs and seoking work - This category Includes those persons who were looking for work in the survey week and who did no work. Persons who were temporarily away from their jobs during the whols of the survey week and were seeking work are considered as without jobs and are included in this category.

In addition to those who actively looked for work, this classilication includes persons, who would have looksd for work, except that they' were teraporarily ili; were on indefinite or prolonged layooff or bolieved that no work was availablo.

Persons who worked part of the survey week and also looked for work are not included in this classification but are show as with a fob and at work.
(e) Persons not in the labour force - The non-working part of the population 14 yaars of age and over consists of those who are outaide the labour force in the sense that they are not working for pay or profit or as unpaid workers in family enterprises such as farms or businesses nor are looking for work. This category includes those: going to school; ke日ping house; too old or otherwise unablo to work; and voluntarily idle or retired. Housewives, students and others, who vorked part-time are classified as "persons with jobs". If they are looking for work, they are classified as "persons without jobs and eoking work".

## Roliabilitr of the estimater

The estimates are subject to sampling error. The chances are about 19 out of 20 that the difference between the estimate and the figure which would have been obtained from a complete count is less than that shown below.

The sampling variability associated with estinates of 108 than 10,000 is relatively larger.

## Coversge

The sample used in the surveys of the labour force has been designed to include all persons 14 years of age and over who reside in Canada with certain specific exceptions. No estimates are made for: residents of the Yukon and Northwest Terri= tories; members of the armed services; Indians on reservations; and inmates of institutions. The totals of persons 14 years of ago and over show for these categories In the 1951 Census were 17,000, $71,000,62,000$ and 117,000 respectively. In surveys preceding February, 1955, certain remote and relatively inaccessible areas vere not included in the estimates. The ample design was altered so that totals would include estimates for these areas in Ontario, from May, 1954, and for the remaining areas in Quebec, the Prairie Provinces and British Columia from February, 1955. The adjustmonts for Canada as a whole amounts to about 1.0\% from November, 1945, to Apri1, 1954, and to about $0.4 \%$ irom May, 1954, to January, 1955. Revised estimatos are comtained in Reference Paper No. 58.
