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## THE LABOUR FORCE

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## Introduction

This report presents the results of the monthly labour force survey covering the weok onded August 22,1953. The survey in continuation of the series begum in November, 1945, and carried out at quarterly intervals until November, 1952, when the first survey on a monthly basis was taken. About 30,000 housoholds chosen by area sampling methods in approximately 110 different areas in Canada are visited each month. The labour force surveys provide estimates of the employment characteriatics of the civilian noninstitutional population of morking age. Porsons are classified according to current activity during the specific weeks covered by the surveys. The ifgures for 1953 are not strictly comparable with those for previous years because of revisions based upon new age and sex distributions obtained from the 1951 Consus. The figures for oarlier years are now boing revised, the revision amounting to slightly more than one per cent of the sampled population.

Tables 1 to 9, inclusive, of this report present data for Canada a whole, Tablo 1 sumarising labour force charactoristics and the romaindor dealing with particular classifications. All regional data are brought together in Tablo 10. Dofinitions and explanations with reforence to these tables are contained in the section following this introduction.

Results of previous labour force surveye may bo obtained from Roforence Paper No. 35, "The Labour Force, November 1945 - March 1952", the regular quarterly reports for the weeke onded May 31, 1952 and August 16, 1952, and the regular monthly reports starting with the week onded November 22, 1952.

The estimatea are ubject to sampling orror. In general, the smeller the estimato, the largor is the relative ampling orror. Any estimate of less than 10,000 is replaced throughout the tables by an asterisk, as an indication that the sampling orror associated with it is relatively large and that it should not bo used without careful reservation.

It has not so far beon possible to include in the labour force surveys persons living in certain inaccessible areas and Indians living on reservations, an estimated total of 180,000 .

## Dofinitions and Explanations

(a) Labour force - The civilian labour force is composed of that portion of the eivilian noninstitutional population 14 yeare of age and over that had jobs or that did not have jobs and were seoking work during the survey weok.
(b) Persons with jobs - For the purpose of the labour force survey, "persons with jobs" are grouped into two categories:
(1) Persons at work - those who did any work for pay or profit or who did unpaid work which contributed to the running of a farm or business operated by a relative;
(ii) Persons with jobs not at work - those who had jobs but did not work because of illness, bad weather, vacation, industrial dispute, or temporary layoff with definite instructions to return to work within 30 days of the time of being laid off. (Persons who had jobs but did not work during the survey week and who also looked for work are included in (c) below, "Persons without jobs and seeking work ${ }^{n}$.)

While varietions in the estimates of the total number of persons ith jobs provide a valuable indicator of economic conditions, significant changes in the employment pattern may be concealed unless attention is focussed on the extent to which people worked less than full time. Table 1 provides on analysis of the reasons for which persons worked less than 35 hours in the survey week. Estimates of weekly hours of work are contained in Table 5. Persons with jobs who did not work during the survey week are classified in Table 6 by the reasons for their absence from work.
(c) Persons without jobs and seeking work - This category includes those persons who were looking for work in the survey week and who did no work. Persons who were temporarily away from their jobs during the whole of the survey week and were seeking work are considered es without jobs and are included in this category. In addition to those who actively looked for work, this classification includes persons who would have looked for work, except that they were temporarily ill, were on indefinite or prolonged lay-off, or belleved that no work wes availsble.

Persons tho worked part of the survey week and also looked for work are not included in this clessification. However, the number of such persons is shown in Table 2 which presents estimates of all persons looking for work.
(d) Persons not in the labour force - The non-working part of the population 14 years of age and over consists of those who are outside the labour force in the sense that they do not work for pay or profit or as unpaid workers in family enterprises such as farms or businesses and are not looking for work. Persons not in the labour force include, therefore, such groups as those going to school or keeping house, persons who are too old or are permanently unable to work or some other reason, and persons who are voluntarily idle or retired. Persons, such as housewives, students and others, who worked part-time are classed as persons with jobs, or, if they are looking for work, they are classed as persons without jobs and seeking work.
