



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ESTIMATES OF HOUSEHOLDS AND FAMILIES IN CANADA, 1953

The estimated number of households in Canada on June 1, 1953 was 3,675,000, an increase of 114,000 or 3.2 per cent since June 1, 1952. The average size of households in Canada in 1953 was 4.0 persons, showing no change from the 1952 figure or the average size recorded at the 1951 Census. The average size of household was largest in Newfoundland, at 5.2 persons, followed by Quebec and Prince Edward Island at 4.5 persons per household. British Columbia showed the smallest average size of household at 3.3 persons.

The estimated number of families in Canada in June, 1953 was 3,477,000 an increase of 64,000 or 1.9 per cent since June 1, 1952. The highest rate of family increase between 1952 and 1953 was in Manitoba at 7.3 per cent, Prince Edward Island and Nova Scotia showing declines of 4.3 per cent and 1.3 per cent respectively. Average size of family in Canada in 1953 was 3.8 persons as compared with 3.7 persons in 1952. Average size of family was greatest in Newfoundland, at 4.6 persons per family and lowest in British Columbia at 3.3 persons per family. In this report a family is defined as a group of two or more persons living in the same household and in the relationship, of husband or wife, with or without unmarried children, or as parent and child.

The household and family estimates for 1953, as shown in this bulletin, were derived from the data on these subjects collected in conjunction with the June, 1953 Survey of the Labour Force, covering a sample of approximately 30,000 households throughout Canada. The survey does not include institutional households, representing only a small number of the population. In addition, although the Labour Force Survey does not cover a few inaccessible areas in the northern parts of the country and Indian reserves, allowance is made for the population living in these areas in the household and family estimates shown in this report.

Definition of Household.— A household in the Labour Force Survey is defined as a group of persons living in the same dwelling, irrespective of whether they are related to one another by ties of kinship. A dwelling is defined as a structurally separate set of living premises with private entrance from outside the building or from a common hallway or stairway inside.

Definition of Family.— For purposes of comparison with the 1951 Census statistics on families, a family in the sample survey was defined as a group of two or more persons living in a dwelling related to one another either as husband or wife,

NOMBRE ESTIMATIF DE MÉNAGES ET DE FAMILLES AU CANADA, 1953

Le nombre estimatif de ménages au Canada, le 1^{er} juin 1953, était de 3,675,000, soit 114,000 ou 3.2 p. 100 de plus qu'au 1^{er} juin 1952. Le nombre moyen de personnes dans le ménage en 1953 était de 4.0, soit le même qu'en 1952 ou le nombre moyen observé lors du recensement de 1951. Ce sont les ménages de Terre-Neuve qui comptent le plus grand nombre de membres, soit 5.2; ils sont suivis de ceux du Québec, et de l'Île-du-Prince-Édouard, avec 4.5 personnes. C'est en Colombie-Britannique qu'on rencontre les ménages moyens les plus petits, soit de 3.3 personnes.

Le nombre estimatif de familles au Canada, en juin 1953, était de 3,477,000, augmentation de 64,000 ou 1.9 p. 100 sur le 1^{er} juin 1952. C'est le Manitoba qui déclare le taux le plus élevé d'augmentation de la famille entre 1952 et 1953, soit 7.3 p. 100. L'Île-du-Prince-Édouard et la Nouvelle-Écosse, signalent des diminutions respectives de 4.3 et 1.3 p. 100. La famille canadienne comptait en moyenne, en 1953, 3.8 personnes, comparativement à 3.7 en 1952. C'est Terre-Neuve qui a la famille moyenne la plus nombreuse, soit 4.6 personnes, et la Colombie-Britannique, la moins nombreuse, soit 3.3 personnes. Pour les besoins du présent rapport, la famille est un groupe de deux personnes ou plus vivant dans le même ménage et ayant une relation d'époux à épouse (avec ou sans enfants non mariés) ou de parent à enfant.

Les estimations de 1953 sur les ménages et les familles, ainsi que l'indique le présent bulletin, sont tirées des données recueillies sur ces sujets lors du relevé de la main-d'œuvre de juin 1953 et qui brassent un échantillon de quelque 30,000 ménages. Le relevé ne tient pas compte des ménages dans les institutions, qui ne représentent qu'une petite partie de la population. En outre, bien que le relevé de la main-d'œuvre ne s'étende pas à certaines régions inaccessibles du Canada septentrional, on fait la part, dans les estimations des ménages et des familles contenues dans le présent rapport, des populations qui les habitent.

Définition du ménage.— Aux fins du relevé de la main-d'œuvre, un ménage est un groupe de personnes, apparentées ou non, vivant sous un même toit. Un logement est une série de pièces d'habitation distincte au point de la structure et qui a son entrée particulière de l'extérieur de la maison ou sur un corridor ou un escalier commun à l'intérieur.

Définition de la famille.— Pour les besoins de la comparaison avec la statistique du recensement de 1951 sur les familles, une famille est un groupe de deux personnes ou plus vivant sous le même toit et ayant une relation d'époux à épouse, avec ou sans

with or without children, or as parent and child. Other relatives living in the same dwelling, including married children, were not counted as members of the family. However, where a married son (or daughter) and children were living with their parents in the same dwelling or household they were counted as a second family in the dwelling.

enfants, ou de parent à enfant. Les autres membres de la parenté qui vivent dans le même logement, y compris les enfants mariés, ne comptent pas parmi les membres de la famille. Toutefois, là où un fils marié ou une fille mariée et ses enfants vivent avec leurs parents dans le même logement ou le même ménage, ils sont comptés comme seconde famille.
