

Canada Year Book 1997 Classroom Activity: 1

This Land - Canada

Purpose

This activity is intended to focus attention on Canada's physical presence and to translate facts into an attractive interactive educational display.

Learning Outcomes

The following activity will enhance the skills listed below:

- Research skills
- Organizational skills
- Information management skills
- Cooperative learning skills
- Reading across the curriculum
- Reporting techniques
- Computer research skills (CD-ROM version only)

Grade Levels

This research and display activity is designed to be used at <u>Junior to Senior High School</u> levels and can be adapted to individual classroom realities. Alterations and enrichment suggestions are included.

Subject Areas

This research and display activity can be used across the curriculum with particular emphasis in the following subject areas:

- Geography
- Social Studies
- Mathematics
- Language Arts/English
- Art/Media/Creative Expression

Lesson Format

The activity involves two tasks. Students define Canada by collecting research data that focuses on the vital statistics of Canada as found in Canada Year Book 1997 and/or Canada Year Book 1997 on CD-ROM. The second task involves the creation of an interactive display on a wall or bulletin board.

Time Allocation

Although the activity usually takes approximately 3 hours of class time, the time necessary to complete this activity will depend on the following factors:

- Class size and system used to assign the research task
- Research capabilities of the students
- Number of topics to be researched
- Complexity of the display

Materials Needed

The following items will be needed to complete the activity at its most basic level:

- Canada Year Book 1997 and/or Canada Year Book 1997 on CD-ROM
- Copies of the Student's Research Chart (Text version or CD-ROM version)
- Wall map of Canada
- Art and display materials

Getting Started

The outline of the activity given below is intended as a guide for classroom teachers. It is understood that teachers will have "rehearsed" the activity before introducing it to their classes. Classroom realities may require alterations to be made in the method(s) used to complete this activity. This is especially true when determining the number of items to be included on the Student's Research Chart.

- 1. Introduce the class to the concept of defining Canada statistically: length, width, extremes (northernmost point, warmest spot, highest mountain, etc.) as well as identifying some of the country's notable characteristics (endangered birds, forest fires, total area, etc.).
- 2. Introduce Canada Year Book 1997 and/or Canada Year Book 1997 on CD-ROM as (a) research tool(s). Note that this activity will be restricted to using Section 1: THE ENVIRONMENT.
- 3. Describe the activity as a research and display project. Students will be looking up information requested on the Student's Research Chart. They will then devise an appropriate method to display their findings as part of a class-created display built over a wall map of Canada already attached to a bulletin board. The display could be called: This Land Canada.

- 4. Distribute copies of the Student's Research Chart. (NOTE: Page numbers, or chapter titles and locators in the CD-ROM version, are provided to assist in the location of information. These can be removed if desired.) Discuss the "Information about Canada" to be researched. Divide and conquer the list or assign who finds what. The research items can be assigned by subject, province, topic-areas, endangered species, page number, etc. Students using Canada Year Book 1997 on CD-ROM should have both the Library (click on the Books icon) and Outline (click on the Lines icon) Windows active when they start to collect their information.
- 5. Determine the method to be used to provide each student and/or group with access time to research their answers in Canada Year Book 1997 and/or Canada Year Book 1997 on CD-ROM. Some methods that work are:
 - Arranging the class in alphabetical order, or vowels then consonants, using the first or last name.
 - Selecting groups randomly using a draw or roll of a die.
 - Using birthday order starting on a randomly selected month.
- 6. While the researchers are using Canada Year Book 1997 and/or Canada Year Book 1997 on CD-ROM, those waiting can begin to create the display system they will be using. Suggestions are provided on the Student's Research Chart. Materials can be made ready while the actual data is being retrieved. They can be making their sign, preparing a blank graph, etc.
- 7. Once a researcher or research team has found their information, they can then complete their display and attach it in an appropriate location on the wall map of Canada on the bulletin board. Those who have competed their task can assist others.

Student Materials

The Student's Research Chart is provided as a guide. It can be altered to adapt it to the classroom reality. Blank spaces are provided to add regional and/or local topics.

Answers

Completed versions of the Student's Research Chart are provided.

Alterations and Enrichment Suggestions

- 1. The Bulletin Board Challenge: Classes may challenge each other to produce particularly outstanding displays. Patriotism might be a judging criterion. A sense of fun is a must here.
- 2. A cross-curricular activity could be attempted where the math students create the graphs from the data collected by a geography class and an art class could illustrate the concepts that have been identified.
- 3. Students could divide into provincial groups, collect the pertinent information for "their" province and add it to the display.

4. A system of removable display items could be devised. This would allow the class to play a game called: "Pin the Facts on Canada". Groups might select 5 to 10 items and then challenge each other to replace them correctly.








Canada Year Book 1997 Classroom Activity: 2

I've Got The Answer!

Purpose

This activity is intended to encourage the discovery and discussion of Canada's dynamic population, past, present and future.

Learning Outcomes

The following activity will enhance the skills listed below:

- Computer research skills (CD-ROM version only)
- Cooperative learning skills
- Information management skills
- Organizational skills
- Research skills

Grade Levels

This research activity is designed to be used at <u>Junior to Senior High School</u> levels. It can be adapted to suit a variety of classroom realities. Alterations and enrichment suggestions are included.

Subject Areas

This research activity can be used across the curriculum with particular emphasis in the following subject areas:

- Geography
- Social Studies
- Mathematics

- Language Arts/English
- Art/Media/Creative Expression

Lesson Format

The activity involves defining Canada by dividing up the task of researching data found in Section 2: THE PEOPLE in Canada Year Book 1997 and/or Canada Year Book 1997 on CD-ROM. Members of the class find answers to a series of randomly selected questions and create a quiz game called "Talking About Canadians".

Time Allocation

Although the activity usually takes approximately 3 hours of class time, the time necessary to complete this activity will depend on the following factors:

- Class size and system used to assign the research task
- Research capabilities of the students
- Frequency of playing "Talking About Canadians"

Materials Needed

The following items will be needed to complete the activity at its most basic level:

- Canada Year Book 1997 and/or Canada Year Book 1997 on CD-ROM
- Copies of the question slips: "I've Got The Answer!"

Getting Started

The outline of the activity given below is intended as a guide for classroom teachers. It is understood that teachers will have "rehearsed" the activity before introducing it to their classes. Classroom realities may require alterations to be made in the method(s) used to complete this activity. This is especially true for the number of questions to be included in the research portion of this activity.

- 1. Introduce the class to the concept of finding interesting information about Canadians. Read a few of the questions provided on the "I've Got The Answer!" slips.
- 2. Introduce Canada Year Book 1997 and/or Canada Year Book 1997 on CD-ROM as (a) research tool(s). Note that this activity will be restricted to using Section 2: THE PEOPLE.
- 3. Describe the activity where members of the class will select one or more "I've Got The Answer!" slips of paper featuring a question about Canada's population. The answer(s) can be found in Section 2: THE PEOPLE of Canada Year Book 1997 and/or Canada Year Book 1997 on CD-ROM. The answers to the questions are to be written on the slips of paper. These answers are used to create a set of questions to be used in a quiz game called "Talking About Canadians".

- 4. Distribute the "I've Got The Answer!" slips. Review the process for finding the answers. Determine the method to be used to provide each student and/or group with access time to research their answers in Canada Year Book 1997 and/or Canada Year Book 1997 on CD-ROM. Some methods that work are:
 - Arranging the class in alphabetical order, or vowels then consonants, by first or last name.
 - Selecting groups randomly using a draw or roll of a die.
 - Using birthday order starting on a randomly selected month.
- 5. While some students are using Canada Year Book 1997 and/or Canada Year Book 1997 on CD-ROM, others can decorate the reverse side of their "I've Got The Answer!" slips with appropriate illustrations (photo, drawing, etc.) that can act as a clue to the general topic their questions address (urban population city photo, farm population drawing of a farm house; baby boom baby photo, etc.).
- 6. When individual researchers or research teams have found their information, they can assemble the completed and decorated "I've Got The Answer!" slips and place them in a container. The "Talking About Canadians" quiz now begins. The class divides into two teams. The quiz coordinator draws an "I've Got The Answer!" slip and holds it so that members of both teams can see the illustration. The question is read and, after a 30-second team meeting is held by each team simultaneously, both groups are asked for their answer. (The order of the first answer is decided by a coin toss and then alternates with each question.) The team with the "BEST" answer wins a point. Of course, the judge's decision is final. The accurate answer is read aloud and the slip is returned to the container. It may be drawn again! Slips continue to be drawn and the game continues as long as the class enjoys the activity.

Student Materials

A number of "I've Got The Answer!" slips are provided as well as a blank form that can be used by teachers to add regional and/or local questions. All questions can be altered or adapted to suit the classroom reality.

Answers

Complete answer sheets are provided.

Alterations and Enrichment Suggestions

- 1. The "Talking About Canadians" Challenge: Classes may challenge each other to a master quiz based on their combined sets of slips. Both accuracy and/or creativity might be interesting judging criteria. A sense of fun is compulsory!
- 2. A board game version might be created and traded between schools. An e-mail questioning system could be used to twin classes and play an "across-Canada" round of games using boards located in the participating schools.

- 3. A desk calendar called "Do You Have The Answer?" could be created using the "I've Got The Answer!" slips with a question for each school day.
- 4. The "I've Got The Answer!" slips could be used to provide questions for the daily announcements made in the school. Entrants could submit their answers in a box in the Main Office or the Library. The winner(s) could be announced before the next question is asked. Prizes could be awarded.



Did You Know?

Canadian Economic Insights

Purpose

This classroom activity is intended to direct students to use Canada Year Book 1997 and/or Canada Year Book 1997 on CD-ROM, particularly Section 3: THE ECONOMY, by having students read a brief information item concerning Canada's economy, prepare a presentation and present their new information to the class.

Learning Outcomes

The following activity will enhance the skills listed below:

- Research skills
- Information management skills
- Cooperative learning skills
- Presentation skills
- Computer research skills (CD-ROM version only)

Grade Levels

This research and presentation activity is designed to be used at <u>Junior High</u> (with direction) to <u>Senior High School</u> levels and can be adapted to individual classroom realities. Alterations and enrichment suggestions are included.

Subject Areas

This research and presentation activity can be used across the curriculum with particular emphasis in the following subject areas:

- Geography
- Mathematics
- Economics
- Performing Arts

Social Studies

Lesson Format

The activity involves the completion of a Did You Know...? Student Activity Sheet after reading an information box in Canada Year Book 1997 and/or Canada Year Book 1997 on CD-ROM. The student is then challenged to prepare and present a brief presentation based on the assigned information box.

Time Allocation

Although the activity usually takes approximately 3 hours of class time, the time necessary to complete this activity will depend on the following factors:

- Class size and system used to assign the research task
- Research capabilities of the students
- Number of information boxes to be read and presented
- Complexity of the discussion concerning the students' results

Materials Needed

The following items will be needed to complete the activity at its most basic level:

- Canada Year Book 1997 and/or Canada Year Book 1997 on CD-ROM
- Copies of the information boxes (for page numbers and/or CD-ROM search locator references, see the **Did You Know...?** Student Activity Sheet)
- Copies of the Did You Know... ? Student Activity Sheet

Getting Started

The outline of the activity given below is intended as a guide for classroom teachers. It is understood that teachers will have "rehearsed" the activity before introducing it to their classes. Classroom realities may require alterations to be made in the method(s) used to complete this activity. This is especially true when determining the number of items to be included using the Did You Know...? Student Activity Sheet.

- 1. Introduce the class to the concept of defining a family's financial resources and economic situation. Use the family income analogy. Ask questions like "What are the major income sources in a typical family?" (e.g. salaries, tips, pension cheques, welfare cheques, etc.) and/or "What is most of the family income spent on?" (e.g. housing, food, transportation, etc.).
- 2. Develop the same line of thought and have the class suggest the national sources of income (taxation, exports, etc.) and expenses (education, health care, etc.) for Canada.
- 3. Introduce Canada Year Book 1997 and/or Canada Year Book 1997 on CD-ROM as (a) research tool(s). Note that this activity will be restricted to using Section 3: THE ECONOMY.

- 4. Steer discussion to the concept that economic activities are varied. The definition can be very broad, such that tours to see the Northern Lights and watching television can be identified as economic activities. Using Canada Year Book 1997 and/or Canada Year Book 1997 on CD-ROM, point out a number of the information boxes and distribute the list provided in PART 1 of the Did You Know...? Student Activity Sheet. Review the information box titles to be researched. Divide and conquer the list by assigning the boxes on the list to the students. Note: The information boxes are called Supplements on Canada Year Book 1997 on CD-ROM.
- 5. Distribute copies of the information boxes or determine another method to be used to provide each student and/or group with access time to research their answers in Canada Year Book 1997 and/or Canada Year Book 1997 on CD-ROM. Some methods that work are:
 - Assigning boxes by the numbers listed on the **Did You Know...** ? Student Activity Sheet.
 - Dividing the class by alphabetical order, or vowels then consonants, using the first or last name.
 - Randomly selecting groups using a draw or roll of a die.
 - Using birthday order starting on a randomly selected month.
- 6. After having completed PART 1 of the Did You Know...? Student Activity Sheet, students or groups can move on to PARTS 2 and 3, formulating a plan to prepare and present their information.
- 7. Allow sufficient time for each presentation and emphasize the need for students to tie each presentation to Canada's economy and to their own lives.

Alterations and Enrichment Suggestions

- 1. A Local Information Box: Seek input from the class on interesting local facts that could be put into an information box and ask students to write their own boxes -- individually, in groups or as a class. Think of ideas that make your area notable: biggest?, smallest?, annual event or feature (County Fair, the Volunteer Fire Brigade, etc.).
- 2. Meaningful Pursuit: Students could produce a series of information cards and build up a game based on the information they discover. The game could be centred on a map identifying the various places where the information is located. When a player has visited 8 to 10 sites, for example, that player wins.

Canada Year Book 1997 Classroom Activity: 4

Who Looks After What?

Purpose

This activity is intended to focus attention on Canada's political and legal system by having students complete a series of three flow charts concerning our governmental and legal systems. Students are then given a series of situations which they are to assign to the correct jurisdiction(s).

Learning Outcomes

The following activity will enhance the skills listed below:

- Research skills
- Problem solving skills
- Cooperative learning skills
- Understanding of the legal and political systems
- Sense of how Canadians interact with their legal and political systems

Grade Levels

This research and problem solving activity is designed to be used at <u>Junior to Senior High School</u> levels and can be adapted to individual classroom realities. Alterations and enrichment suggestions are included.

Subject Areas

This research and problem solving activity can be used across the curriculum with particular emphasis in the following subject areas:

- Geography
- Social Studies
- Civics, Government and Law
- Language Arts/English
- Citizenship

Life Skills

Lesson Format

The activity involves two tasks. Students fill in boxes taken from a series of three flow charts found in **Canada Year Book 1997** which illustrate how Canada's governmental and legal systems work. They then assign situations from the **Some Situations** Activity Sheet to their proper jurisdiction(s).

Time Allocation

Although the activity usually takes approximately 3 hours of class time, the time necessary to complete this activity will depend on the following factors:

- Class size and system used to assign the research task
- Research capabilities of the students
- Number of situations to be assigned

Materials Needed

The following items will be needed to complete the activity at its most basic level:

- Canada Year Book 1997
- Copies of: The Canadian Government Flow Chart*
 Canada's Legal System Flow Chart*
 Canada's Court System Flow Chart*
- Copies of: Some Situations Activity Sheet*
 (*1 copy of each sheet per student or group)

Getting Started

The outline of the activity given below is intended as a guide for classroom teachers. It is understood that teachers will have "rehearsed" the activity before introducing it to their classes. Classroom realities may require alterations to be made in the method(s) used to complete this activity.

- 1. Introduce the class to the numerous complexities of governing a country the size of Canada. Ask the class for a set of different governing bodies that affect their lives (federal, provincial/territorial, municipal, school board, students' council, etc.). Why do we need so many? Do they all perform the same tasks? Why would they carry out different tasks? How was it decided who would do what?
- 2. Introduce Canada Year Book 1997 as a research tool. Note that this activity will be restricted to using Section 4: THE NATION.
- 3. Describe the activity as involving research and problem solving. Students will be completing a series of three flow charts. They will then be assigning a series of situations to the appropriate

jurisdiction(s) that would deal with these situations.

- 4. Distribute copies of the three flow charts:
 - A. The Canadian Government
 - B. Canada's Legal System
 - C. Canada's Court System
- 5. Begin the process of completing the boxes on each flow chart using the lists of terms provided on the charts and the completed charts found in Canada Year Book 1997. This task is best done orally with the whole class. The boxes are numbered to assist in identification. Try to emphasize how the logical flow of responsibilities shown on the flow charts is reflected in our governmental and legal frameworks.
- 6. Once all three flow charts have been completed, it is time to assign situations to the proper jurisdiction. Distribute copies of the Some Situations Activity Sheet. Read the first situation to the class. Have individual members of the class or groups of students assign the situation to the appropriate jurisdiction. Once the concept of assigning situations to their rightful jurisdiction is understood, allow time for the students or groups to assign the remaining situations. Move from student to student and respond to questions. Don't be surprised if questions arise that you cannot answer! Discuss how the rather simple flow charts can appear as a jurisdictional maze in real life as the system of government tries to cover every possible situation. As new problems arise, like computer copyrights, the governmental process is expected to respond by amending the legal processes. Seek ideas on streamlining the legal and government systems. Suggest and discuss the myriad complications that can create bureaucratic nightmares even in your local area! Clarify the students' role in simplifying government by acting responsibly and legally, and by VOTING.

Alterations and Enrichment Suggestions

- 1. "Good Morning. How May I Help You?": Students are to create spin-off situations modeled on those already discussed. Form a team of student "Information Officers" to handle enquiries from the "public" (i.e. other students) by directing them to the proper jurisdiction(s). The roles can be reversed without notice to add a sense of fun.
- 2. Follow the Case: Invite a local lawyer, police officer or other knowledgeable official to take the class through a typical court case and process.
- 3. I Do Have Rights! Invite a legal expert to answer the students' questions concerning their rights at school, at home and in the community.
- 4. Dear Member of Parliament: Invite a local member of Parliament (or other governing body) to show the class the processes necessary to have a legal situation dealt with, as well as how we can alter the rules we live by.

Canada Year Book 1997 Classroom Activity: 5

Canada Year Book 1997 on CD-ROM Scavenger Hunt: A CD-Roam

Purpose

This activity is designed to encourage an active exploration of Canada Year Book 1997 on CD-ROM. It features a modified scavenger hunt, or CD-Roam, using a CD-Roam Collector's Sheet to review a wide variety of information by following a series of suggested subjects linked to a player's search word. A number of variations are suggested to adapt the challenge level of the activity. The CD-Roam can be adapted to utilize the text version of Canada Year Book 1997.

Learning Outcomes

This research activity will enhance the skills listed below:

- Research skills (computer and/or text)
- Reading, comprehension and condensation skills
- Literacy across the curriculum
- Organizational skills
- Cooperative learning skills (if working in groups)
- A sense of fun while learning

Grade Levels

This research activity is designed to be used at <u>Junior to Senior High School</u> levels. It can be adapted to individual classroom realities. Alterations and enrichment suggestions are provided.

Subject Areas

This research activity can be used across the curriculum with particular emphasis in the following subject areas:

- Canadian Studies
- Geography
- Language Arts/English
- Social Studies

Lesson Format

After discussing the use of reference materials for research purposes, the group reads a CD-Roam Instructions sheet and establishes the rules to be used in the CD-Roam. Players select a search word and begin their CD-Roam using Canada Year Book 1997 on CD-ROM. Although the subject categories are pre-set, each CD-Roam is unique since the items found by the players vary according to the letters in the players' search words and the players' choices of topics found during their search. The activity can be altered in a number of ways to adapt it to most classroom situations (see: Alterations and Enrichment Suggestions).

Time Allocation

Although an individual player or team usually takes about 30 minutes to complete this activity, the time necessary will depend on the following factors:

- Class size and system used to assign the research task
- Research capabilities of the students
- Familiarity with using CD-ROM technology
- Number of categories selected

Materials Needed

The following items will be needed to complete the activity:

- Canada Year Book 1997 on CD-ROM and/or Canada Year Book 1997
- Copies of: The CD-Roam Instructions Sheet*

 CD-Roam Collector's Sheet*

and/or

CD-Roam Collector's Sheet (blank version for local use)*
(*1 copy of each sheet per student or group)

Getting Started

The outline of the activity given below is intended as a guide for classroom teachers. It is understood that teachers will have "rehearsed" the activity before introducing it to their classes. Classroom realities may require alterations to be made in the method(s) used to complete this activity.

1. Introduce the class to the concept of having an entire reference book, plus music and videos, on a compact disc with Read Only Memory, a CD-ROM. Discuss the need for a search system that duplicates the traditional techniques used to find information in a standard print reference book (referring to the Table of Contents, Index, Glossary, etc.). Canada Year Book 1997 on CD-ROM uses a window called Library to present a Table of Contents and a window called Outline which provides a series of topic titles. Clicking on the titles in these windows calls up the information available on the CD-ROM. Although this activity is designed to focus on the resources found on Canada Year Book 1997 on CD-ROM, it can be adapted to be used with the print version of Canada Year Book 1997 as well.

- 2. Describe the activity as a computer-based scavenger hunt, a CD-Roam. The players will be trying to find information as quickly and as accurately as possible. Players must prove that they have read and understood the material they found by describing it concisely on the CD-Roam Collector's Sheet. Each search begins by writing a 6 to 10 letter word that acts as a code for finding answers. The person or team with the shortest time (considering the number of searches as set by the length of the word i.e. 6 to 10 letters) and the most accurate descriptions of the material found will be declared the winner. Of course, the judge's decision is final and a sense of fun is essential!
- 3. Once Canada Year Book 1997 on CD-ROM has been installed and is operational, distribute copies of the CD-Roam Instructions sheet. Decide the method of play as individuals and/or teams. Review the instructions using the computer to demonstrate the research process.
- 4. Distribute the CD-Roam Collector's Sheet to players only when they are ready to start. Timing begins as they write their name(s) on the sheet.
- 5. Once all of the players or teams have completed their CD-Roam Collector's Sheets (including the Tie Breaker), ask them to review and exchange their answers orally and encourage students to appreciate the wide variety of information available on Canada Year Book 1997 on CD-ROM.

Answers

CD-Roam Collector's Sheet: Since every completed version of the CD-Roam Collector's Sheet will be unique, answers cannot be provided!

Alterations and Enrichment Suggestions

- 1. Cover to Cover: The scavenger hunt can be completed using Canada Year Book 1997. Revise the instructions to refer to the <u>Table of Contents</u> and <u>Index</u> rather than the CD-ROM's **Library** and **Outline** windows.
- 2. A Contest Within A Contest: Have two teams of players. One team uses Canada Year Book 1997 on CD-ROM while the other team uses the print version of Canada Year Book 1997. Is the CD-ROM a faster research tool? Why or why not? What are the pros and cons of each?
- 3. A Word to the Wise: Begin by having the class create a list of 6 to 10 letter words that might appear on a map of Canada. This can shorten the time taken by players when selecting their search word. They could be required to use one of these words as their search word on the CD-Roam Collector's Sheet.
- 4. <u>A Mad Scramble!</u> Allow players to scramble the search word on their CD-Roam Collector's Sheet and invite others to decode the word as part of the timed exercise.
- 5. A Local Look: Use the blank version of the CD-Roam Collector's Sheet and reverse the

process. Have students find articles about their own community, province or territory and write descriptions of the content of the article, table, graph, map and/or video. Have others sort the articles into the appropriate chapters, based on the descriptions provided.

The CD-Roam Instructions

This scavenger hunt, or CD-Roam, will ask you to collect a variety of information found on Canada Year Book 1997 on CD-ROM. Once Canada Year Book 1997 on CD-ROM is running, refer to the Toolbar at the top of the screen and turn on the Library window (Books icon) and the Index window (Lines icon), if they are not already available.

You will be recording a series of searches on the CD-Roam Collector's Sheet. Each search will be determined by the category requested in Column 1: Search No. and Category, and by the letters of the search word you write in Column 2: Search Word. Use the letters of any 6 to 10 letter word (e.g. your name) in the Search Word column. In the sample CD-Roam Collector's Sheet below, searches were completed by following Search No. and Category titles 1, 2 and 3 given in Column 1 and by inserting the first 3 letters of the 7-letter Search Word PENcils vertically in Column 2.


