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

Includes felts of all kinds, such as boot and shoe felts;

pulp and paper makers felts; shoddy, mungo and wool extract; wool pulling and miscellaneous woollen textiles, but excludes felt hats.

Includes fabrics, yarns and thread of natural and artificial silk, and their mixtures with other file such as cotton and wool, but does not include built artificial silk, and their mixtures with other fibres such as cotton and wool, but does not include knitted goods as principal product.

Hosiery and Knitted Goods -Includes establishments whose chief product is knitted goods whether of cotton, wool, silk or other yarns.
