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
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UNIFORM CANADIAN CLASSIFICATION OF RAILWAY EMPLOYEES

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FOREWORD

This Uniform Canadian Classification of Railway Employees is intended for use as a guide to railway officials in reporting employees, their service hours and compensation to the Dominion Bureau of Statistics and the Board of Transport Commissioners for Canada. It is a revision of an earlier edition issued in 1956 and embraces a number of changes considered desirable to facilitate a greater degree of uniformity and reliability in statistical data.

The principle of the classification structure represented herein is to classify all rail occupations, primarily on the nature of work done, into major and minor occupational classes within functions. It also incorporates new occupations which have come into being since 1956 because of changes in the railway industry. The flexibility of the Classification will permit subsequent additions of new occupations as they evolve or the deletion of any which may become obsolete with the passage of time.

In this respect, it is important that any enquiries relating to new occupations or titles, resulting from further technological or organizational changes within the railway, be referred to the Company's head office for proper coding instructions. Definitions of certain occupational classes used in the earlier edition of this classification have been revised in accordance with the classification principle. Minor changes have also been made in the rules governing the reporting of employees and their service hours.

The Uniform Canadian Classification of Railway Employees has been developed solely for the purpose of establishing a uniform basis of reporting data on railway employees, their service hours and compensation in reports to the Dominion Bureau of Statistics and the Board of Transport Commissioners for Canada and is not intended to affect in any way the working agreements between the railways and the employees nor the rates of wages.

This revised classification has been prepared by a Working Committee comprising officers of the Railways, the Dominion Bureau of Statistics and the Board of Transport Commissioners for Canada and approved by a Sub-Committee of the Railway Association of Canada. The members of the Sub-Committee gratefully acknowledge the time and effort contributed by others who have taken part in this project.

CLASSIFICATION AND CODE

The railway occupations in this classification are identified by a two-digit division number and a three-digit code number. The division numbers represent a simplified list in sequential order of numbers from 1 to 83, while the three-digit code is designed to reflect the structure of this classification in which all railway functions, major occupational classifications and, where appropriate, minor occupational classifications, are arranged in classes and identified.

Any numbering system may be used by the individual carriers for internal coding and control purposes. For reports to the Dominion Bureau of Statistics and the Board of Transport Commissioners for Canada, however, only the above-noted two-digit division numbers or three-digit code numbers appearing on the prescribed reporting form illustrated on page 9 shall be used.

A comparative example of the two numbering or coding systems follows:

Division No.	Code No.	Occupational classification
16	144	Section foremen

The division number "16" above, represents the 16th consecutive occupational classification in the form of report, while the "144" represents a code number constructed in the following manner:

(a) Railway function is designated by the first digit as:

- 0 General
- 1 Road maintenance

- 2 Equipment maintenance
- 3-5 Transportation (non-train and train)
- 6 Express
- 7 Highway transport (rail)
- 8 Telecommunications
- 9 Outside operations

(b) Major occupational classification is designated by the second digit as:

- 0 Managerial and supervisory
- 1 Professional, technical, and staff assistants
- 2 Clerical
- 3 Running trades
- 4 Working foremen
- 5-6 Craftsmen, tradesmen, lead hands, service workers and helpers
- 7 Labourers including building attendants and coach cleaners
- 9 Floating equipment employees (railway) and employees in "other" operations.

(c) Minor occupational classification, where appropriate, is designated by the third digit. (If major occupational classifications are not further divided into minor classifications, a "1" will appear as a third digit).

All employees must be classified by function regardless of the employee location or type of work performed. This includes certain employees at general offices previously reported as "General" which are now classified in other functions. For instance, employees working in the head office of the chief of motive power and rolling stock are now classified in the "Equipment Maintenance" function.

RULES GOVERNING THE UNIFORM CANADIAN CLASSIFICATION OF RAILWAY EMPLOYEES THEIR SERVICE HOURS AND COMPENSATION

1. Classification of Employees

All employees shall be classified with respect to occupation and assigned to their proper function and occupational class in accordance with the following procedures:

- (a) Determine the function in which the occupation is to be classified from the "Definitions of Railway Functions" appearing on page 11.
- (b) Select in accordance with the "Definition of Occupational Classifications" listed on pages 12 to 22 the appropriate occupational class from the function in which the occupation has been classified as per paragraph (a) above.
- (c) The "Alphabetical Index of Railway Occupations" (page 23) may be used as a guide in classifying occupations in accordance with paragraph (b) above.

Managerial, supervisory, professional, technical and clerical employees formerly reported in General, but who are assigned to Road Maintenance, Equipment Maintenance or Transportation are to be

reported in their respective function. All details are to be reported annually on the prescribed form illustrated on page 9. If an employee works in more than one function or occupational class he should be counted in the one indicated by the greater part of his duties. His service hours and compensation should be distributed between the other occupational classes in which he has worked.

2. Definition of Employees

The word "employees" as used herein, is intended to include every person in the service of the reporting carrier, whether on a full-time or seasonal basis and subject to the carrier's continuing authority to supervise and direct the manner of rendition of his service. Persons engaged to render only specifically defined services and not subject to the continuing authority of the carrier to supervise and control their acts, such as customhouse brokers, lawyers retained only for specific cases and not under general or continuing retainer, etc. are not employees in the meaning of the term herein.

3. Counting Employees

The number of employees shall be the average of counts made each month throughout the year. These monthly counts are to be derived in such a manner as to accurately reflect the average level of employment. Recommended bases for determining this count are as follows:

- (1) A mid-month count of employees on payroll. Employees performing service in more than one classification during the month shall be counted in the classification occupied at the middle of the month.
- (2) The sum of the total number of employees who work a specified number of days in the first semi-monthly pay period and the total number of employees who work the same number of days in the second semi-monthly pay period divided by two, plus all employees paid once a month. Employees performing service in more than one classification shall be counted in each classification in proportion of days paid for to the number of working days in the pay period. Classification totals shall be rounded out to the nearest whole employee.

The count should not be restricted to personnel actually on duty but should include all other regularly assigned employees and those on vacation or sick leave with pay. Persons on leave without pay or under suspension should be excluded.

4. Service Hours

The number of hours **paid for** is to be ascertained and reported separately by occupational classification. The number of hours **actually worked**, or held for duty, is to be ascertained and reported for the following totals shown on Form of Report, pages 9 and 10: General, Road Maintenance, Equipment Maintenance, Transportation, Other Operations and Grand Total.

Hours actually worked, or held for duty, for enginemen and trainmen paid on the basis of trips or miles run shall reflect actual time on duty reported on individual trip tickets (time reports) and **not** time presently constructed by dividing pay miles by 12½ miles in freight service and 20 miles in passenger service. Hours actually worked or held for duty will include preparatory time, initial and final terminal time and inspection time.

Hours paid for include time actually worked plus time for such items as vacations, holidays, leaves of absence, etc., when paid for, and applies to all employees including enginemen and trainmen paid on the basis of trips or miles run and employees paid at piece rates.

Time on duty for officers and employees who do not receive payment for over-time should be ascertained by multiplying the number of days worked during the month by 8 hours per day.

5. Compensation

The compensation shall be the gross amount paid to employees and charged to operating, capital, other accounts and other companies and individuals including vacations, holidays, leaves of absence,

etc., with pay and before deductions for income tax, unemployment insurance contributions, etc. and shall be reported separately by occupational classification. Compensation should not include retro-active wage increases which, although paid during the current year, pertain to a prior period. Such compensation should be shown separately in the column provided for that purpose.

6. Part-time Workers

All persons, such as caretakers and similar classes of workers paid stipulated amounts for performing duties requiring only a few hours each day and whose compensation is not intended to be their chief means of livelihood, are to be considered as part-time workers. (Seasonal workers are not to be reported as part-time workers).

Time worked need not be compiled, but part-time workers shall be counted once each month and the twelve-month average of these counts along with the total annual compensation shall be reported in the space provided at the bottom of the form.

7. Joint Employees

Each person jointly employed shall, if carried on the payrolls of the several joint employers, be counted by each employer and represented in its return of number of employees by a fraction based on the number of employers reporting him; if a person, for example, is reportable by three employers, each should include him in its number of employees as one-third of an employee. When the entire compensation of a joint employee is shown on the payroll of a single joint employer and is paid to the employee by that employer such employee should, for the purpose of statistical returns, be treated as if employed solely by such employer.

8. Maintenance of Uniformity in Reporting

New occupations and changes in job titles which evolve as a result of changes in the railway industry are frequently being introduced. In order to maintain uniformity in reporting by all carriers, a continuing Committee, composed of representatives of the Dominion Bureau of Statistics, the Board of Transport Commissioners for Canada and the Railways, chaired by the representative of the DBS, has been appointed. This committee will convene semi-annually to review and ratify the classification of new railway occupations and to recommend appropriate revisions to the rules and occupational classifications.

Officials responsible for railway employee records and statistics for each Common Carrier Railway operating in Canada will provide each committee member with a complete list of all occupational **titles** with their assigned division and/or code numbers. Additions, deletions or other changes to these lists will be provided two weeks prior to a scheduled meeting date of the committee.

A revised master list of occupational titles and codes superseding all other such lists shall be submitted annually by the two Class I Common Carrier Railways to each Classification Committee member.

DEFINITIONS OF RAILWAY FUNCTIONS

Code No.	Function
0	GENERAL—Includes all functions or departments except those separately defined below. Included in this group are such departments as; Research and Development, Accounting and Finance, Personnel and Labour Relations, Purchases and Stores, Sales, Traffic, Investigation, etc.
1	ROAD MAINTENANCE-- This function is responsible for the construction and maintenance of all track and structures and signal installations.
2	EQUIPMENT MAINTENANCE—This function is responsible for the maintenance and servicing of all motive power, car, shop and power plant equipment.
3 - 5	TRANSPORTATION(NON-TRAIN AND TRAIN)—This function is responsible for scheduling, dispatching and operating trains and other ancillary services, the operation of terminal facilities and the distribution of cars and motive power. This function is also responsible for the movement of merchandise by means of the integration of express and less carload operations.
6	EXPRESS—This function is responsible for non-integrated express operations.
7	HIGHWAY TRANSPORT (RAIL)-- This function is responsible for non-integrated cartage and highway services ancillary to rail operations.
8	TELECOMMUNICATIONS-- This function is responsible for all telecommunications operations.
9	OUTSIDE OPERATIONS—This function includes such operations as hotels which are operated both as to revenues and expenses separate and apart from actual rail operations.

APPENDIX A

This appendix shows the relationship between reporting divisions in the Canadian Classification of Railway Employees and Their Compensation (1956) and occupational classes in the Uniform Canadian Classification of Railway Employees, effective January 1, 1964.

While many of the individual occupational classes in the various functions are directly comparable, it has been necessary to arrange certain other categories in groups to afford the best possible bridge between the two classification systems. This is especially apparent under "General" where certain supervisory and clerical classes, normally included in the Road Maintenance, Equipment Maintenance and Transportation functions, had to be incorporated for reconciliation purposes.

In view of the alternative methods now permissible for counting employees, and the different classification principles involved in the construction of this key, some caution should be exercised in its use for historical comparisons of railway employment statistics.
