

CANADIAN RESIDENTIAL RENTALS, OCTOBER, 1931.

(Building Materials Prices Appended)

The decline in Canadian residential rentals which has been apparent since the fall quarter of 1930, accelerated between May and October of 1931, as indicated by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics rental index which fell 3.9 per cent. during this period. From a peak of 106.5 touched in May, 1930, this series has dropped steadily to the present level of 99.3 (1926=100).

Between May, 1931, and October, 1931, declines for indexes representative of various types of dwellings have been as follows: Middle grade houses 2.8 per cent., duplexes 3.7 per cent., flats 3.4 per cent., and apartments 3.5 per cent. Rentals paid for workmen's dwellings averaged 4.4 per cent. lower, pointing to a noticeably weaker condition in rentals of this type of dwelling than for middle grade homes.

PERCENTAGE OF ESTIMATES SHOWING RENTALS AS HIGHER, THE SAME, OR LOWER

Estimates of rental movements for middle grade dwellings were based upon 161 quotations for houses, 125 for duplexes, 129 for flats, and 154 for apartments. From Table "B" it will be seen that percentages of reports showing decreases in rentals have become appreciably larger than May percentages. It is also apparent that apartments generally have been subject to more widespread cuts than have other types of dwellings.

RENTALS AND OTHER LIVING COSTS

It is estimated that the fall in average residential rentals for the year ended October, 1931, was about 6 per cent., while living costs as a whole declined almost 11 per cent. Foods and clothing were chiefly responsible for the greater recession shown by a general budget. Within the year, retail food prices have dropped 23 per cent., while an index for clothing prices at retail, fell 14 per cent. Items for fuel and light were less than 2 per cent. lower than a year earlier, and the decline in miscellaneous expenditures including a large proportion of service costs, amounted likewise to between 1 and 2 per cent.

REGIONAL COMPARISON OF RENTALS

As has been the case for some time past, rental figures given for Maritime cities were well maintained and showed little disposition to follow the downward movement which has been apparent elsewhere. In Quebec and Ontario declines appeared to be somewhat greater than those indicated for the preceding survey. Rental concessions to tenants of prairie province cities, however, were still more marked than in any other area, averaging slightly more than those for cities in British Columbia. Rental cuts reported in larger centres throughout the Dominion were greater in October, 1931, than in any recent survey.

SUMMARY OF TABLES

TABLE "A" shows the percentage of reports which stated rentals were higher, the same as, or lower than in May, 1931, for houses, duplexes, flats, and apartments of medium grade. It also shows the total number of reports used in compiling rental index numbers for these groups.

TABLE "B" gives percentage comparisons of the number of reports received, which were higher, the same as, or lower than at the time of the preceding investigation. These comparisons date back to October, 1928.

TABLE "C" gives index numbers of rentals for various Canadian cities based upon a weighted average of quotations for middle grade houses, duplexes, flats and apartments. Rentals in October, 1928, equal 100.

TABLE "D" gives actual monthly rental figures for middle grade dwellings in specified Canadian cities.

TABLE "E" gives index numbers of general wholesale prices and of building and construction materials costs for January, June, and October, 1930, and for January, March, May to December, 1931, inclusive, (1926=100).

TABLE "F" gives actual quotations for building materials--annual averages for 1926, 1929, and 1930, and monthly quotations for January, 1931, and from June to December, 1931, inclusive.

BUILDING AND CONSTRUCTION MATERIALS PRICES COMPARED WITH  
GENERAL WHOLESALE PRICES

Wholesale prices in general have continued to decline faster in 1931 than prices for building and construction materials. The most significant fact in recent months, however, regarding this movement, is that both groups have shown a decided tendency to resist further recession. The Bureau's wholesale price index number struck its lowest level of the year in September at 70.0, and has subsequently remained fairly steady just above this figure. The building and construction price index continued to give ground gradually until December, when it advanced fractionally for the first time in many months from 79.9 to 80.0. The miscellaneous section of the building and construction group which includes structural steel, brick, concrete, etc., has shown decided firmness during the year. Its index has advanced from 89.6 in January, to 91.4 in December, 1931. Painters' Materials dropped from 70.1 in January to 66.1 for October, but had risen again to 68.0 in December. Lumber so far has been unable to show any recovery, having fallen steadily from 81.8 in January to 71.2 in December.

RESIDENTIAL BUILDING CONTRACTS

The value of residential building contracts awarded in 1931 was between twelve and thirteen per cent. below 1930 figures according to MacLean Building Reports Ltd. Apartment construction figures were slightly higher than in 1930, but the value of house contracts dropped about 16 per cent. According to calculations of the General Statistics Branch of the Dominion Bureau of Statistics, the value of building permits issued in Canada during 1931 was \$110,971,410, as compared with \$166,379,325 for 1930. This was the lowest total in over ten years.
