Survey of Family Expenditures, 1947-48
(Expenditure by Size of Household)

In the fall of 1948 the Dominion Bureau of Statistics conducted a survey of family expenditure in Canada which covered the twelve months ending August 31, 1948. This reference paper presents some of the results obtained from that survey. It covers the major items of expenditure by region and by family type for the non-farm population. Newfoundland is not included in the report as the survey was initiated before the union of Newfoundland with Canada.

The main purpose of the survey was to provide a picture of the pattern of family expenditures in the post-war period. To describe correctly the way in which families spend their income is a difficult task. A household buys as large a variety of goods as many businesses, and yet, unlike businesses, families rarely keep records of their expenditures. The difficulty of interpreting such data matches the difficulty of securing them; the following notes are presented to assist interpretation.

Expenditure headings in the tables of this paper follow the headings of the questionnaire which was used in the survey. This arrangement is not necessarily the most suitable for analytical requirements but was designed to facilitate accurate and complete recording. Following are definitions of expense data required under some of the principal headings of the questionnaire:

Rent: the amount of rent paid in the 12 survey months ending August 31, 1948. In interpreting the rent figure it must be borne in mind that the survey covered all types of Canadian spending units, including single persons living in lodgings.

The figures of another survey, carried out in February, 1948, on 30,000 non-farm dwelling units (single homes, duplexes, apartments, etc., but not including single rooms) may be cited here. From this large sample an estimated distribution of the rents of all rented non-farm dwelling units is available:

It will be seen that approximately 80% of these dwellings fell below \$40 per month rental. The largest class, 31%, was the \$20 to \$29.99 range. The average rental for Canada was \$27.50, since the lower ranges exercise a predominant influence.

In the 1941 Census, it was shown that the average rent of dwelling units was \$24.00.

Expenses of owned home: the expenses of the home for the months it was owned and lived in by the family in the 12-month survey period. These included current expenses only, such as taxes, interest, etc., but not down payments on new homes, or instalment payments on mortgage principal. These latter were considered as savings.

THE HISTORY OF THE
CITY OF BOSTON

In the fall of 1780, the British evacuated the city of Boston and moved to New York City. The Continental Army, under the command of General George Washington, followed them and fought the Battle of Red Bank on December 19, 1780. The British then moved to Philadelphia and then to Lancaster and York, where they were finally evacuated to New York City on January 2, 1781.

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Furnishings and equipment: expenses in the 12 survey months included the full purchase price of items purchased on the instalment basis, but not instalment payments on goods bought prior to that time. This rule applied to clothing and any other time purchases, health bills, etc.

Net price of cars bought: cost of car purchases during the year minus trade-in allowances on used cars.

Additional detail on the content of the groups in the expenditure patterns will be found in Appendix A to this publication.

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A complete survey of the expenditures of all Canadian families would not only have been prohibitively expensive but very cumbersome. Within certain limitations information derived from a properly designed sample reliably represents a population; as among the items purchased by households however, those less frequently bought will be given less accurately than those regularly bought. The number of schedules tabulated for the several tables of this report is shown in Appendix B.

The households interviewed in the family expenditure survey were part of the sample designed originally to measure the labour force, and used quarterly since the autumn of 1945. Since it was designed to measure any subject which is widely distributed throughout the country's households, it comprised a representative group for a survey of family expenditure.

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The 1947-48 family expenditure survey is the second budget study made by the Bureau. The primary use of the expenditure patterns obtained will be to check and revise the weights for the goods and services included in the cost-of-living index. It is essential to know the pattern of consumption for a representative sample in order to select the items which should be included in the cost-of-living index and to give them their proper weight. This applies to weights for the main groups into which the cost-of-living index is divided, and also to information on the important items which fall in these main groups.

The figures in this paper are based on the sample of spending units including all types of families and individuals in the non-farm population. Spending units are economic families - groups of persons who pooled their income and met living expenses from a common fund.

The most common group was a family consisting of mother, father, and children; but if persons who were not members of the family shared their income or living expenses, they were counted as part of the "economic family". Grown sons and daughters who were working and living at home were included in the parents' economic family where their finances, especially living expenses, were mingled, either formally or informally, with those of their parents. The term "single person" used in the tables refers not to marital status but to financial independence; a "single person" is one whose budget is kept separately from any other person's. Because spending units consisting of single persons are included in the survey, the size of the spending unit on the average was considerably smaller than the census family.

The number of households selected to be interviewed for the family expenditure survey was approximately 13,500. From these 6,000 questionnaires were received, and 4,200 were sufficiently complete for use in compiling the results.

The following tables show average expenditure for non-farm families and single persons for Canada and five regions. They also provide expenditure patterns for Canada for single persons, two adult families, medium-sized families and large families. Medium-sized families are defined as those consisting of two adults and

one to four children, or three or four adults. In view of the preponderance of medium-sized families, average expenditure for this group is also shown for the five regions.

Study of the data obtained in the survey is continuing and further tabulation and analysis will be made available later.

DEFINITION OF EXPENDITURE CATEGORIES USED IN THE TABLES

In the expenditure sections of the questionnaire families were asked to enter the full purchase price of any goods bought, and the cost of services received whether or not they were paid for in the year under consideration. However, the purchase of a house during the survey year, or principal payments on a house bought previously, were not included on the expenditure side because these payments were regarded as an increase in assets, not an expense for current consumption. Sales and excise taxes were included in the price of goods bought.

Some of the expenditure items appearing in the tables, are explained in more detail below:

1. RENT

This item covers rents paid for all kinds of accommodation, including single rooms. The payment may cover various services beyond actual shelter, such as furnishings, heat, light, water and so on. Where rooms and board were paid for in a lump sum amounts were allocated to rent and to board on the basis of the number of meals per day covered by the total payment.

3. EXPENSES OF OWNED HOME

Included here are property taxes or special assessments due in the year covered (but not back taxes), insurance premiums due on the home, interest due on mortgage (not principal payments), repairs and replacements (not improvements), and such miscellaneous expenses as upkeep of driveway, transfer of title, resurvey of property, etc.

8. FUEL

Coal, wood, sawdust, coke, kerosene, gasoline (not for use in a car), and fuel oil are included.

9. OTHER HOUSEHOLD EXPENSES

This category covers expenses for ice, water, gas, electricity, telephone, laundry sent out, moving, freight, postage and telegraph, wages, uniforms and gifts for paid household help, and small items such as freezer lock, post-office box, garbage disposal, ink, etc.

10. MISCELLANEOUS

This item includes laundry and toilet soap, bleaches, scouring powder, polishes, floor wax, paper supplies, cigarettes, tobacco, pipes and other smoking supplies.

11. FURNISHINGS AND EQUIPMENT

This covers such items as kitchen equipment, cleaning equipment, laundry equipment, furniture, floor covering, glass, china and silverware, household textiles and the servicing, repairing, cleaning, insurance and rental of such furnishings and equipment.

23. CLOTHING MATERIAL AND SERVICES

Yard goods, yarn, pins, needles, thread, dry cleaning, storage of clothing, seamstress and tailor charges, watch and jewelry repair, dyeing, and clothing repair are included in this category.

24. OTHER CLOTHING EXPENSE

This category includes the infrequent items of clothing which could not be classified under the headings used in the questionnaire.

25. NET PRICE OF CARS BOUGHT

Trade-in allowances, if any, were deducted from the price of cars bought. If a car was bought to be used partly for business, the appropriate fraction of its cost was subtracted from family living expenses and transferred to increase in investment in business.

26. AUTOMOBILE OPERATION

The costs of automobile operation include tires, tubes, gas and oil, repairs, parts, servicing, automobile insurance, car and drivers' licences, parking and

garage rent, tolls, heaters, seat covers, fines, and accessories. If the car was used partly for business the appropriate fraction of its operation costs was subtracted from family living expenses and treated instead as a business expense to be deducted from gross business income.

27. OTHER TRANSPORTATION

Included here are taxi fares, rent of car, purchase and upkeep of motorcycle, bicycle or boat if these were used mainly for transportation rather than recreation, street-car, bus and ferry fares, train, bus, plane or ship fares.

28. MEDICAL AND DENTAL CARE

This category covers professional services by a doctor, osteopath, chiropractor, optometrist or optician, cost of eye glasses and repairs to them, dental care including x-rays, hospital and nursing care, physiotherapy, medicines and drugs and appliances and supplies such as thermometers, syringes, adhesive tape, etc.

29. PERSONAL CARE

This item includes the cost of haircuts, shaves, permanent waves, shampoos and finger waves, shaving soap, hair preparations, tooth-paste, cosmetics, combs, toothbrushes, razors, hair pins, cleaning tissues, etc.

30. RECREATION, READING, EDUCATION, GIFTS

Recreation expenses include movies, admissions to plays, concerts, dances, fairs, etc., the cost of children's toys and equipment; equipment, fees and licences for games and sports, dues to social and recreational clubs; hobbies, pets, radios, phonographs, records, musical instruments, cameras and films. The expenses of a vacation do not all appear here but were entered under housing, transportation, and the other appropriate headings. Education expenses include school books and supplies, tuition for students and special lessons in music, dancing and so on. Under gifts were included gifts to persons outside the economic family, and contributions to the support of relatives outside the economic family. Gifts exchanged by members of the family were not entered here, but in the appropriate expenditure section of the questionnaire.

31. PERSONAL INSURANCE PREMIUMS, TAXES, CHARITABLE CONTRIBUTIONS, etc.

This item includes income taxes, personal property taxes, succession duties, contributions to charitable, religious and educational organizations, personal insurance premiums (minus dividends received), payments for group medical care and group hospitalization, health and accident insurance premiums, unemployment insurance, payments to retirement or pension funds, poll taxes, duty, etc.

32. OTHER EXPENSES

This covers interest on personal loans, bank service charges, funeral expenses, personal legal expenses, money lost or stolen, expenses of garden, contributions to cooperatives, political organizations, alumni associations, etc., union dues, business and professional association dues, and tools, supplies and equipment required by wage workers in their jobs.

33. UNCLASSIFIED EXPENSES

As the heading implies, this was a category for expenses which did not fit under any other heading or for expenses which the respondent could not allocate to the various sections (wedding expenses for instance). The category was used infrequently.
